1,312 Loose Their Lives.

Last Sunday evening as the White Star liner Titanic was bound from Liverpool to New York, she collided with an iceberg at 10:25 and at 2:20 Monday morning sank taking in the neighborhood of 1,500 people down with her. The disaster is the greatest in the history of navigation, both as to the loss of life and property.

The Titanic was the largest passenger steamer in the world and was making her first trans-Atlantic trip. There was 2,200 passengers and crew on board, including some of the best known people of the world. When the accident occurred and it was learned that the boat would go down wireless messages were sent for help and several of the large ocean liners which were within her zone immediately went to her assistance but none arrived until after she had sunk.

The Carpathia picked up in the neighborhood of 800 passengers, mostly women and children, who had succeeded in getting away from the wreck in life boats.

The most deplorable fact that has developed in connection with the catastrophe is that the great loss of life is the result of there being not enough life boats to care for the people carried.

Latest dispatches places the total number saved at 750, and the death list at 1,312.

The game was friendly scrap throughout, in which scientific basket shooting was matched against good fighting spirit. There's Money in Hay.

"Although we see a good deal about clover and other legumes as a means to gather nitrogen into the soil," said Mr. P. E. Goodrich, president of the National Hay Association, "everybody seems to have overlooked the fact that there is more money in hay than there is in any other one crop except corn. In other words, clover and alfalfa are not only means to an end, but no mean end themselves."

"Taking the United States as a whole, it does not produce per acre over half as much as it should, and it only has about half as many acres as the demand requires."

"Grass crops are less trouble than any other crop, and our association is very much interested in bringing up the hay production, not only in quantity, but eventually in quality."

"The price of hay is all out of reason, and inasmuch as the prosperity of other kinds of crops depends so much upon hay crops, our association is ready to join with the Crop Improvement Association of the Grain Exchanges in preaching a sensible rotation."

The Appointment of the Twelve. Mark iii:7-19; Matt. v:13-16.

(1) Verse 7—Why, in view of what had just happened, did Jesus "withdraw himself and his disciples to the sea?"

(2) When is it right to flee from our enemies, and when is it duty to stand our ground?

The Bay City convention should certainly have been strenuous enough to suit Teddy, even if he did come out second best.

Congressman Loud received a bump last week when the Otsego republicans, in their convention, voted almost unanimously against his re-nomination.

The Hon. Pat Kelly took one look at the republican circus at Bay City last week, and decided that he did not care to run for governor in Michigan this year.

As a result of the Illinois primary last week another of the old stand-pat senators—Shelby Cullom—will retire from the United States senate at the end of his present term.

With Gov. Osborn and Pat Kelly both out of the race the only candidates for the republican nomination of governor at present are Secretary of State Martindale and Amos Musselman.

Arthur Elmer Reimer, a ladies tailor of Boston, has been nominated as the candidate for the social-labor party for the presidency. Arthur is certainly in the race early enough to get a good start.

Attorney Clark Snyder, of this city, will contest the republican nomination for prosecuting attorney, with A. W. Black, the present incumbent. Albert Widdis will undoubtedly be the democratic nominee.

There promises a warm fight in the democratic state convention at Bay City next month over the question of an instructed delegation to Baltimore. If the better judgement prevails and an instructed delegation is sent Michigan democracy will be in a position to accomplish much good for the party. But if, on the other hand, the delegation is tied up to some particular candidate their influence is liable to be of but little account.

"The convention was a public disgrace," John Blodgett, of Grand Rapids, the Michigan member of the republican national committee, thus describes the republican state convention which met at Bay City last Thursday. Free-for-all fights and bedlam reigned therein. The result was the election of two sets of delegates to the Chicago convention, and two state central committees. That the republican party of Michigan has received a staggering blow from which it will take long to recover is the general opinion of the best element thereof.

Iron Ore Reserves of Michigan.

"Iron Ore Reserves of Michigan" is the subject of an advance chapter, by C. K. Leith, from mineral resources for 1911, United States Geological survey. The report shows an estimated reserve in the mines of 124,598,164 long tons of high-grade ore—that is, what is known under present mining conditions as commercial ore—and of 44,982,938 long tons in drilled areas, or a total reserve of 169,581,102 long tons. The estimate leaves out of consideration high-silica, low-phosphorus ores of even about 40 per cent grade which have been mined on both the Gogebic and the Marquette ranges.

A broad survey of the field, which covers the Gogebic, Iron River, Crystal Falls, Menominee and Marquette districts, was made by Dr. Leith in the summer of 1911. The probabilities of extension in every district but the Menominee are so strong that it is safe to estimate that for many years the ratio of reserve to total shipment will be maintained—in other words, that as much ore will be discovered yearly as is mined yearly. In fact, today the reserve probably bears a larger ratio to the total shipment than at any time in the past, and the possibilities of developing more ore are so great that ten years hence there will probably be greater reserve in proportion to shipment than now. The growing tendency of the larger interests to make sure their ore supply for years in advance is leading to the development of increasingly large reserves in proportion to past shipment. Enough facts might be sighted in relation to individual mines, explorations, and ranges to show that this forecast of the future is not based on vague surmises. Large extensions, both vertical and areal, are inevitable. Probably not more than 10 per cent of the area of the upper Huronian states of the Crystal Falls, Menominee, Iron River, and adjacent areas has been explored.

The total known area of iron formation is stated to be 29,267 acres, but in addition there are fully 20,000 acres of magnetic belt in which exploration has scarcely more than begun.

The general conclusion of Dr. Leith's report is that at no time in the past has the outlook for long life for Michigan ores been any better assured than it is now. In few other regions will expenditures for large explorations yield more certain results. The future size of the reserves will bear a more or less direct ratio to the money expended in exploration. There is yet no indication of diminishing returns from exploration. In fact, increased knowledge of the geolo-

gic conditions is bringing more certain results for a given expenditure of money. The reserve will cease to grow only when difficulties of exploration or outside economic influences begin to limit the amount of exploration.

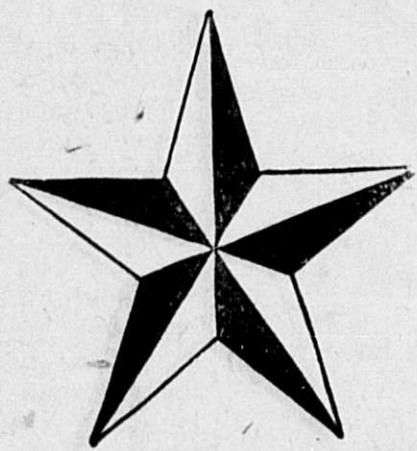
