This is his first visit here in 19 years. He is now in the employ of the state and making an inspection of the hotels of the state.

Much excitement prevails among women of Posen, Presque Isle county, over the arrival of quadruplets, two sons and two daughters at the home of Mr. and Mrs. E. Weneske. All four of the children are normal and in a healthy condition. The mother is doing well. The father of the children is a farmer. There is one other child in the family.

At a meeting of the Saginaw Presbytery held at Bay City on the 8th inst. Rev. C. W. Hastings, of Saginaw, formerly pastor of the Presbyterian church of this city, was elected commissioner to the general assembly of the Presbyterian church, U. S. A., which will be held at Louisville, Ky., May 15 to June 1. James H. Nisbet was elected alternate lay delegate.

Michigan Bean Jobbers Association through their secretary D. A. Garfield, has issued a small pamphlet on the subject of 'A Campaign for Better Seed and Larger Bean Crops.' The bean crop of Michigan amounts to about \$10,000,000 to the grower, and the association plans to double this. Better seed and different methods of harvesting are two of the ways in which this is to be done and the farmers of this vicinity will do well to look into this matter.

Dan Williams, a Reno young man who was confined in the county jail on the charge of abduction, made one of the cleanest get-aways on record a few days ago. While some repairs were being made on the cells he walked out and absolutely no trace of him has since been secured. He was missed within 15 minutes and thorough search at once instigated. So far as learned no one saw him after he left the jail.

Mrs. Provo is well known in Cheboygan county, having taught school here for the past few years.—Cheboygan Tribune.

## Boys Attention

Some Isosco county boy will be selected to attend the state fair at Detroit, September 16-21, and he will have all his expenses paid by the management of the state fair.

The selection will be made from among the boys of Isosco county between the age of 14 and 18 years, and depend on the standing made at the following two examinations: (1), the regular 8th grade examination to count as 50 per cent. (2), an examination on 20 questions prepared by the state fair management to count as 50 per cent.

The second examination will be taken by applicants on the afternoon of May 17th in connection with the regular 8th grade examination.

Remember that all wishing to compete must take the above two examinations and the committee will select one boy from those competing. This is a fine chance for some bright Isosco county boy to attend the state fair without expense.

Notes from the Secretary's Office

The regular meeting of the Executive Committee of the Bureau was called for April 16th, but inasmuch as most of the members were to be in Bay City during the convention, the meeting was changed to April 10th.

The traveling exhibit and stereopticon lecture, which at this writing is in Indiana, seems to be awakening considerable interest. While the exhibit has been out but little over four weeks, several hundred names of prospective purchasers of Northeastern Michigan land have been sent to the Bureau office.

A southern Michigan man who travels considerably reports that it is very peculiar that in Northeastern Michigan one never hears very much about the Development Bureau, but in lower part of the state and in Ohio and Indiana he hears considerable about Northeastern Michigan.

Hereafter it will be the policy of the Bureau to label all agricultural exhibits with the name of the grower and the county where in raised; tags being prepared for this purpose.

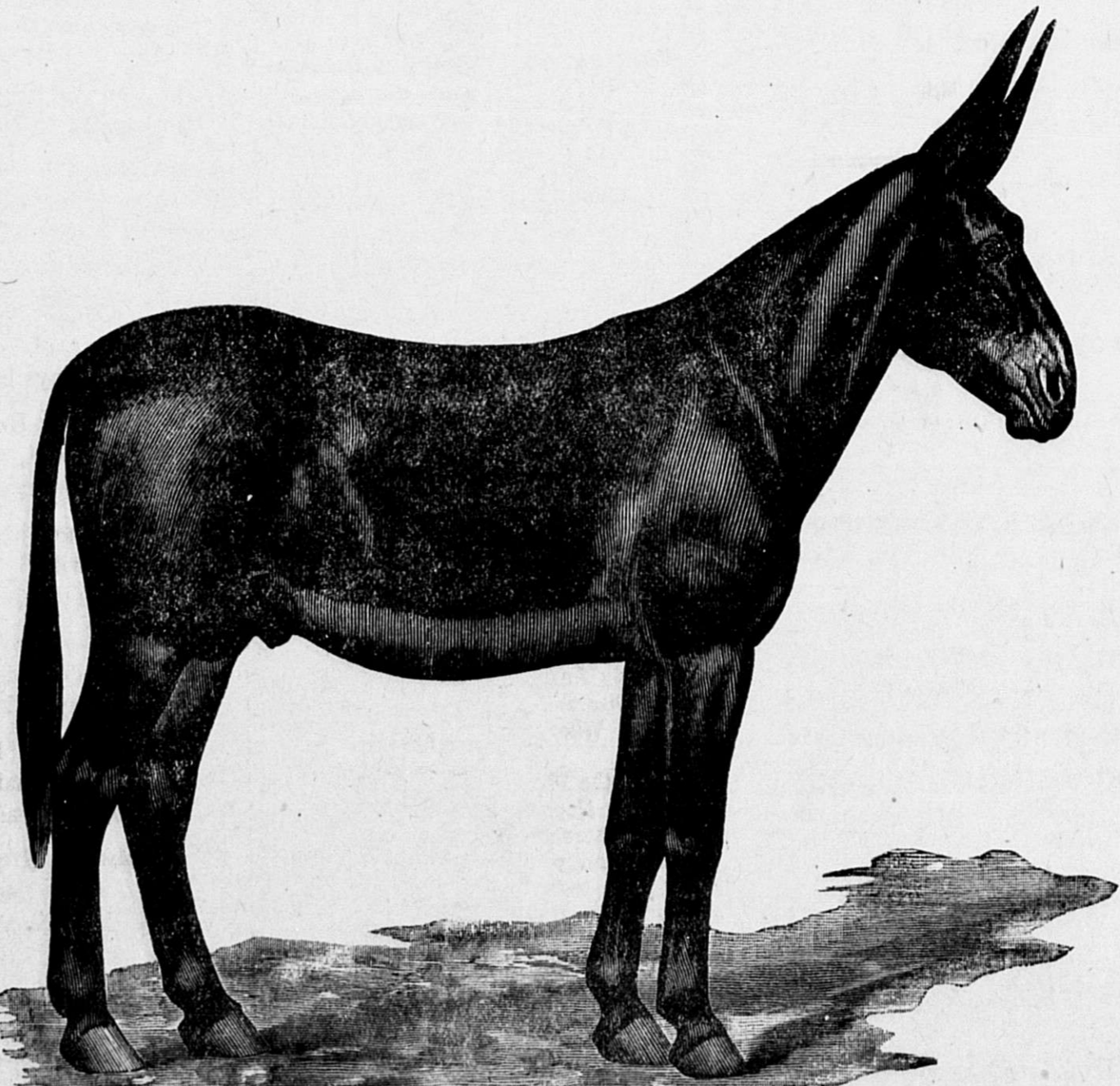

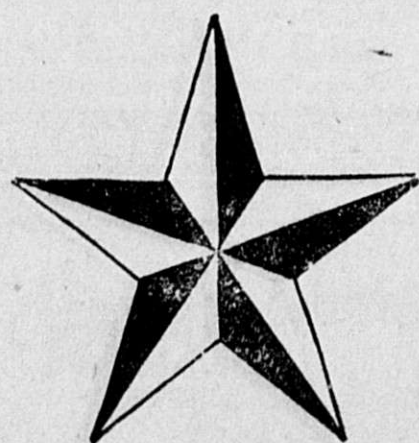
