Obituary.
 Elizabeth Ingardt was born in Switzerland, October 6, 1841. When 12 years of age she came to Canada with her parents and was united in marriage to Christian Hosbach in the fall of 1862. The family settled Tawas township in 1881, where they reside until a few weeks ago when they moved to this city. Mrs. Hosbach was the mother of twelve children, ten of whom survive her. They are John, of this city, Henry, of Tawas township, William, of Saginaw, Mrs. Gustav Graf and Mrs. Paul Kopp, of Tawas township, Christ, of this city, Mrs. John Zorn, of Saginaw, Mrs. Caroline Hartman, of this city, Mrs. Frank Keller, of Detroit, and Mrs. George Charters, of Reno township. There also survives her 37 grand children and two great grand children.

Rare and Valuable Books.
 Rev. C. C. Henning, of the Emanuel Lutheran church of this city, is the owner of a set of very rare and valuable books, which he received from Germany last week. The set is comprised of three volumes, from four to six inches in thickness, and bound in course pig leather, and are 231 years old. The works are "The Holy Scriptures" explained by Dr. M. Luther and D. Abraham Calovio, and were published in Wittenberg, Germany, by the University Press in 1681. The work is of great value as it is a verbal translation of the bible. For the past 15 years Rev. Henning has been searching the antiquarian book houses for a set of these works, and we have reason to believe that this set is the only one in Michigan if not in the United States.

Make State Forests into Game Preserves

A. C. Carton, state immigration commissioner, wants to see some of the land now in the state forest reserves utilized for game preserves and with this end in view has called a general conference of all the development companies and educational institutions to meet at Lansing in June and formulate, with the public domain commission, a plan whereby these state lands can be used for the preservation of game life in this state and for order purposes. Mr. Carton, who is a close student of wood life, has been working along this line for the past three years, and has formulated several plans to improve conditions.

Among other things advocated by him is that a permanent camp site for the Michigan National Guard can be donated by the state, several ideal locations being situated in the northern section of the state. Play grounds for children, on state lands, is another plan urged by Mr. Carton.

Produce Nearly All Our Own Salt

Michigan is the second salt-producing state in importance in the Union, being surpassed only by New York. The output of salt in the state in 1910, according to the United States Geological Survey, was 9,452,022 barrels, or 1,323,283 tons, valued at \$2,231,262. Our total salt production in 1910 was 30,305,656 barrels, against only 979,306 barrels imported, valued at \$370,922. At the same time we exported salt to the value of \$320,926.

The indications are that the salt production for 1911 will show an increase over the figures for the preceding year.

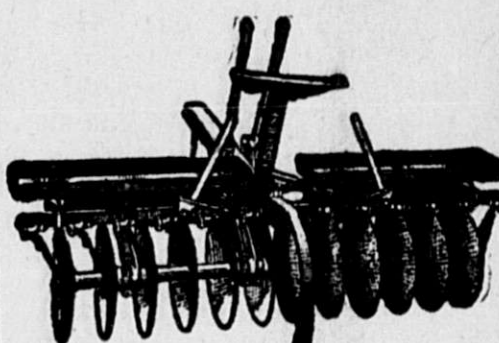
