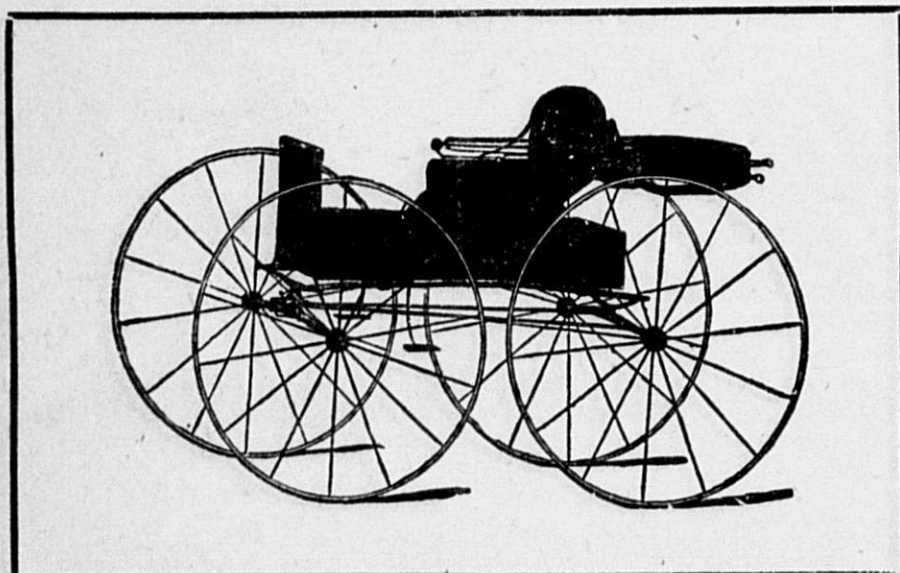

There were 1,620,766,000 pounds of butter valued at \$405,000,000 produced on farms and in factories in the United States during the census year 1909, according to a statement issued by the Census Bureau. The largest total quantity was produced by the west north central division. Among the states, Wisconsin ranks first as a butter producer, with Iowa second and Minnesota third, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Ohio, Illinois, New York, Texas and Indiana trailing along in the order as given. One and a half billion pounds of butter valued at over four hundred million dollars is going some along the butter route.

Helping The Democrats

The Washington Post, a good republican newspaper, serves up the present situation thus:

The personal conflict between President Taft and Col. Roosevelt cannot fail to have an injurious effect upon the republican party. If all that Mr. Taft says of Col. Roosevelt is true, and all that Col. Roosevelt says of Mr. Taft is true, it is evident that neither one of them can be elected president. In destroying each other, they are destroying the chances of the party. The republicans of the country, if they are able to retain their organization and work for success, will nominate a third man; but his chance of election will be exceedingly small, in view of the rending fight between the two principals.

The democratic party has the greatest opportunity presented in recent years to elect a president. Its opponents are practically working for its success. Every clash between Taft and Roosevelt is a stroke for the democratic party. If the republicans cannot heal their differences, they need not look for physicians and surgeons in the democratic party. The democrats ought to be well satisfied with the progress of the campaign. They behold the two strongest men in the opposition engaged in a death-grapple, from which neither can hope to emerge with the united support of his party.

Men who respect the high office of president of the United States cannot but deplore the exchange of personalities between the present occupant of that office and his predecessor. Republicans especially are concerned, because of the damage inflicted upon their cause through this irrepressible conflict. Apparently there is nothing that republicans can do to bridge the chasm. As for the democrats, while they may regret the tendency to degrade the dignity of the presidency, they cannot be blamed for taking advantage of the situation. If they are shrewd they will avoid similar conflicts in their own ranks, and will nominate a candidate who can attract the great element in the republican party that will be dissatisfied at Chicago as the result of the Taft-Roosevelt conflict.

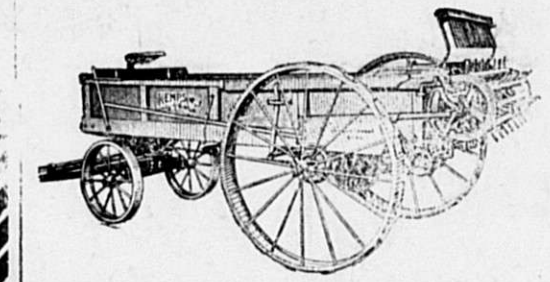

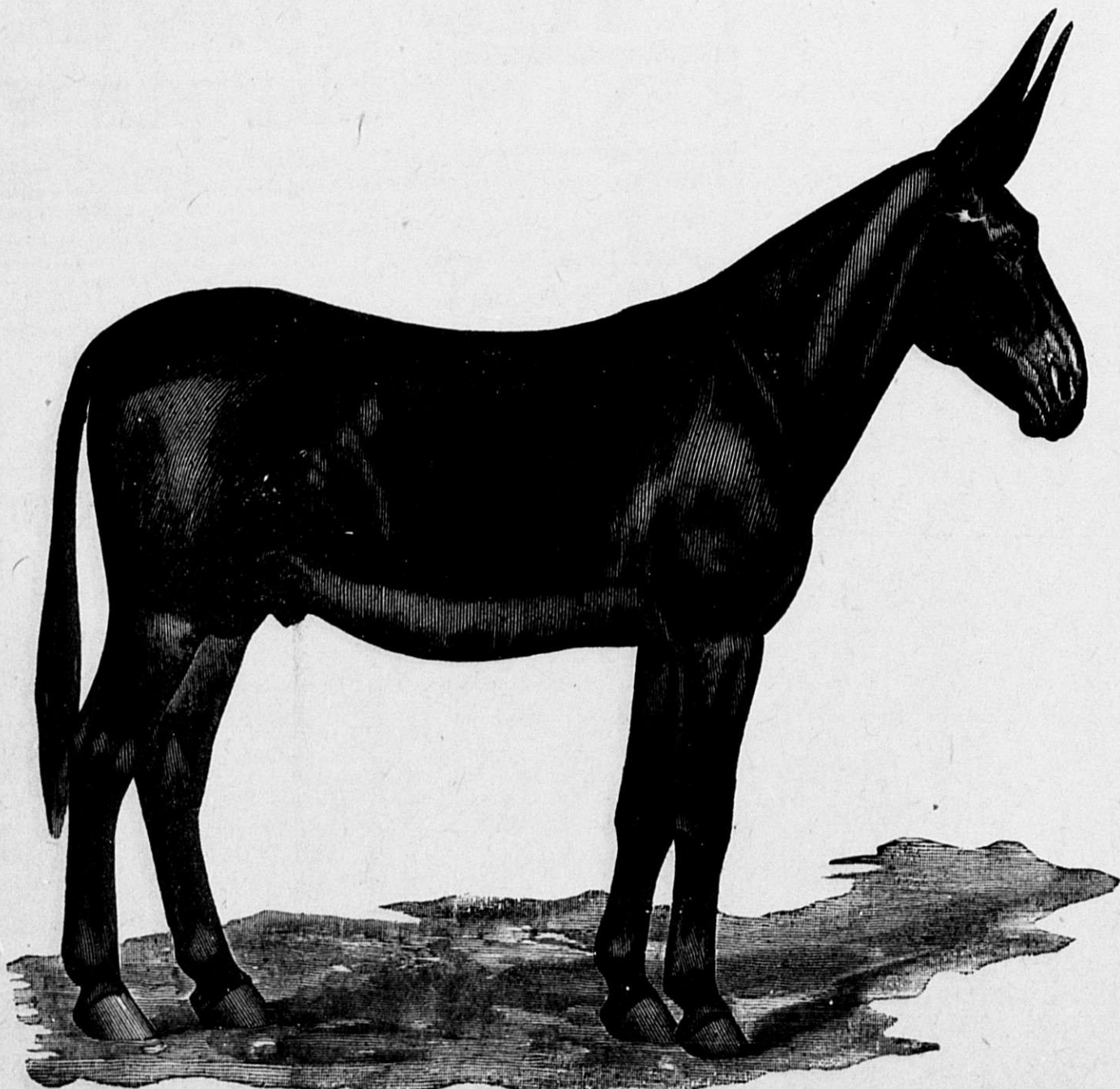

Mr. and Mrs. George Sase and children attended church at Whittemore Sunday and spent a few hours at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Moran.

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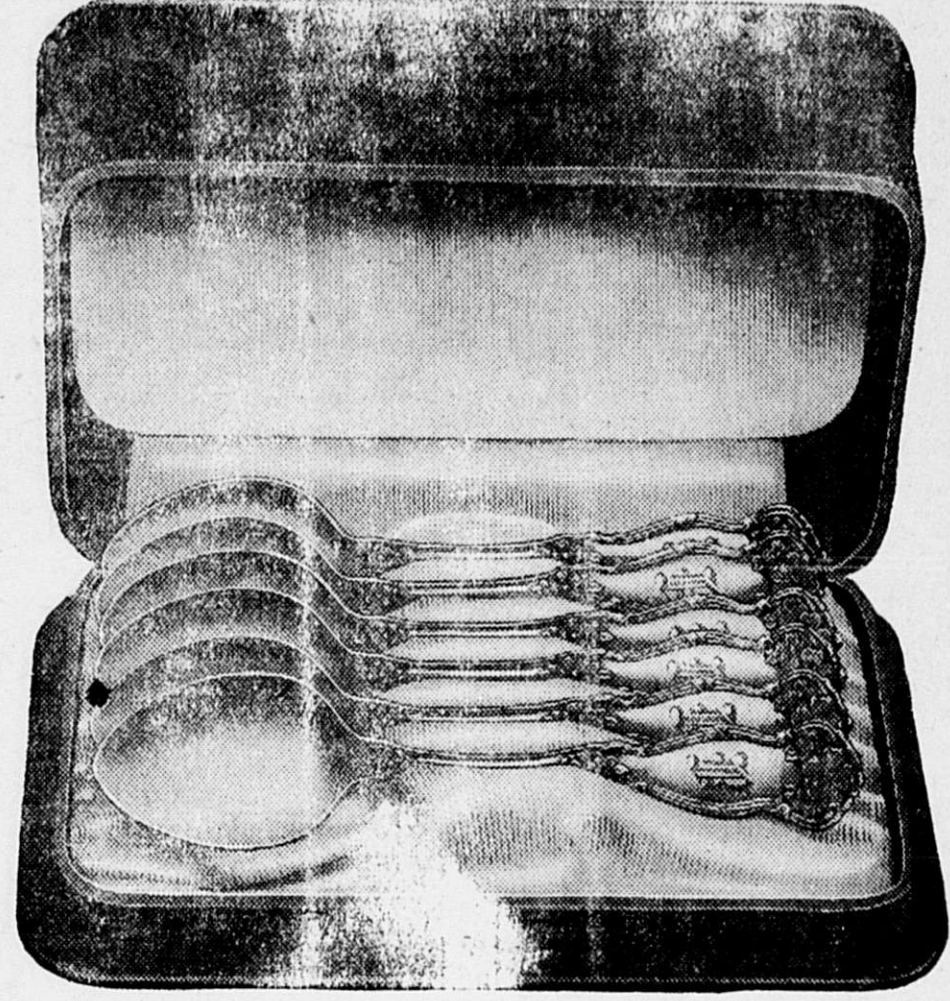
