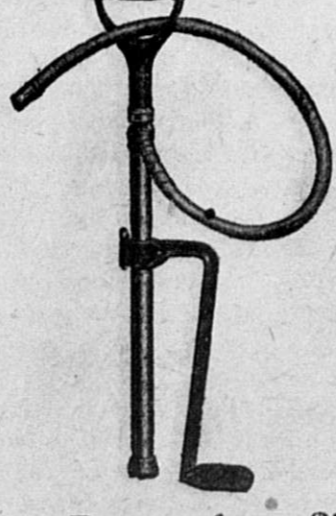

Republicans Have Not Learned Lesson of 1910.

When congress convened last December much was expected from it in the way of tariff legislation. It was regarded as certain that the wool schedule would be revised, and possibly the cotton, steel and chemical schedules. The democratic house set to work promptly upon the work of revision. It first disposed of the steel bill, making substantial reductions in such duties. This measure was passed January 29. It next passed the chemical schedule on February 21 and a month later revised the sugar rates. The wool bill was passed by the house April 1st.

All of these measures were immediately transmitted to the senate and were referred by that body to the finance committee, of which senator Penrose is chairman. There they have since reposed, with the exception of the steel bill, in which the Pennsylvania senator's constituents are especially interested, which has been reported adversely. Nothing has been heard from the wool bill, which the administration is committed to in principle by the report of the tariff board.

It was principally dissatisfaction with the Payne-Aldrich tariff act that caused the voters of the country less than two years ago to turn a republican majority in the house into a democratic majority of seventy. Three weeks ago the voters of Pennsylvania repudiated Penrose, who voted for this bill and defended it. Similarly the voters of Illinois have repudiated Senator Cullom, who also voted for this bill and defended it, and who is ranking member of the finance committee. Yet these stand-pat senators block the way to a tariff reform, the refusal of which all but turned the administration out of legislative power and which threatens to roll up the tide of popular distrust in complete retirement of the party from control of the government.

Possibly the democrats in the senate prefer the tariff as an issue of legislation, but that is no excuse for the republicans falling into a blunder that is suicidal. Evidently the party has not yet learned the lesson of the congressional elections of 1910.—Saginaw News.

Another Skin Game.

Time but emphasizes old P. T. Barnum's statement that the American people liked to be fooled and that a sucker is born every minute. Last week a well dressed agent canvassed the farm country north of Oxford, says the Leader, ostensibly taking orders for tailor made clothes for ladies and gents. Several unsophisticated Oxford farmers signed their names to orders for suits. The same day the agent was endeavoring to sell local banks promissory notes for \$25.00 signed by the above parties. Whether he succeeded or not is a story thirty or sixty days will tell, unless the banks awaken to what has happened or some anxious farmer, waiting for a dreamed of tailor suit, takes a tumble to the fact that he has, in spite of this land of free schools and newspapers, bitten again on the old, old gilded hook for suckers.

The executive committee of the Iosco County Farmers Institute Society have decided to offer the following very liberal prize for the best corn placed on exhibition at the annual "round-up" institute next winter:

Men's Contest: For the best dozen ears of dent corn, 1st prize, \$5.00; 2nd prize, \$3.00; 3rd prize, \$2.00. The same prizes will be given for the best flint corn.

Children's Contest: Best dozen ears of dent corn, 1st prize, \$5.00; 2nd prize, \$3.00; 3rd prize \$2.00. Five \$1.00 prizes will also be given children in addition to the three above.

For the best corn on exhibition, all entries competing, a sweepstake prize of corn, except that plowing, harrowing and cultivating with horse may be done by some older person. Each child must plant at least one-eighth acre.

Seed will be supplied children only. The men must supply their own. For seed apply to William Latter, Reno township, R. D. 2, Whittemore.

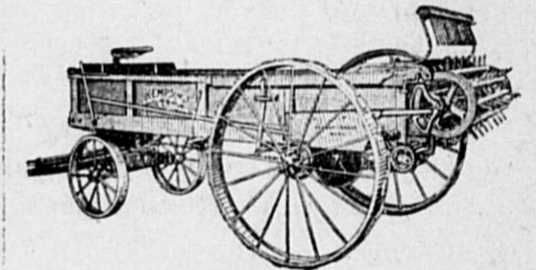

Northeastern Michigan Development Bureau

Notes from the Secretary's Office

There is one thing we would like to call to the attention of the merchants and citizens generally of Northeastern Michigan, and that is, if they themselves do not feel that they are in a position to financially assist the bureau, they could at least patronize or endorse and help those who do lend financial assistance. It would be no great hardship to suggest that you are pleased to note that the firm you are doing business with were members of the Development Bureau. A case in point: A certain traveling man representing a line of goods, having Northeastern Michigan as his exclusive territory, felt sufficiently interested to take a membership in the bureau, rightly figuring that this would certainly give him some standing, but shortly afterwards called on one of the Development Bureau's directors trying to secure an order, only to be turned down and to find that within three or four days said director gave an order to the traveling man's competitor; same line of goods, price and all equal. Naturally this traveling man does not believe quite so fully in the advantages of belonging to the Northeastern Michigan Development Bureau.

Now, on the other hand, the newspapers of the district kindly printed an item which the bureau circularized a while ago in regard to one of our members, and while it might be considered in the manner of a little free advertising yet this notice was also a distinct advantage to our citizens. Several clipped this notice and sent it to the manufacturer and the manufacturer feels sufficiently kind to the bureau so that he is willing to continue to assist financially.

We do not ask that people go out of their way or to pay more simply to deal with a bureau member, but where they

can do it without disadvantage to themselves they can see that indirectly it appears of considerable advantage financially to us.

A short time ago we suggested to the newspapers that in connection with the stereopticon lecture which at the present time is in Illinois, we would like to each evening present a slide stating some salient point or item of interest in regard to each county in the district and we urged that our public spirited friends would from time to time furnish us the information from which to make these slides. Up to date we have received only one reply.

We have heard that out west in one of the prosperous localities where they run a live board of trade that each and every citizen; the lawyer, the doctor and even the minister pay a membership of over \$25 a year.

Just supposing that Northeastern Michigan could show a spirit one-tenth of that. The development bureau could hire the best men on earth and could advertise so that the whole world would know of this district and we would get so many new people in that there would not be room for the old—Well, what's the use?

Various estimates by good authorities give the value of a settler to a community at from a few hundred to as high as twelve hundred dollars. Granting this the development bureau is returning good for the money expended but the development bureau cannot do it all. When protective settlers get to the point of wishing specific information and when that settler takes the pains to write to a special locality in which he has become interested and then cannot get a reply, it would seem that local people lacked in boost and enterprise.

Since organizing the bureau has maintained that local interests must clinch the nails the development bureau starts. Last week it was suggested that some way should be found so that the bureau could do more specific work in placing prospective settlers, but the fear of partiality prevented this.

The following letter explains the situation and we earnestly call your attention to improving these conditions if they exist in your locality:

Evidently the county is filled up and no more "outsiders" are wanted as I have yet to receive a reply or papers from either. In looking over the descriptions of the different counties I was favorably impressed with county and for the reason that I am a building mechanic and want to get a small farm close to a good town where I can be employed at either occupation.

If you as secretary can give me any information concerning the above, with a list of lands for sale with terms, you will confer a favor. Would also like to know whether a map of county can be procured and where.

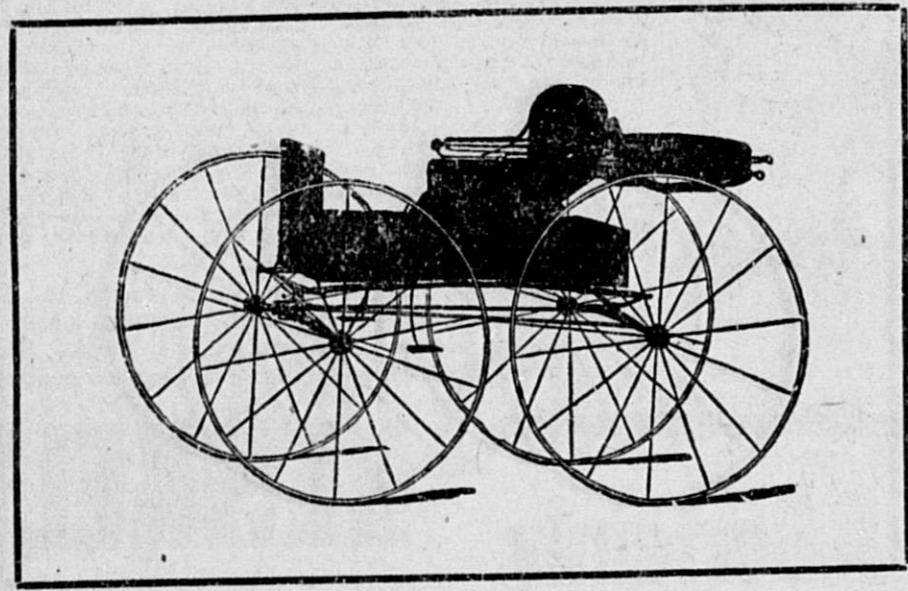

To the Hon Board of Supervisors: Gentlemen—If I am correctly informed at the January meeting of your board you allowed the treasurer the collection fee for one year amounting to about \$184.00, on a statement from him that he thought he was entitled to as much salary as the former treasurer. When I was first elected I received a salary of \$800.00 a year, also received about \$800.00 a year fees on liquor licenses, making a total of \$1600.00. From this amount I paid \$1000.00 a year for indemnity bonds, making a balance of \$600.00 per year and also received about \$200.00 for liquor license fees. Total received for 8 years salary, \$6400.00, plus \$1600.00 liquor license fees, making total of \$8000.00 received. From this amount I paid out of my own pocket \$3000.00 for indemnity bonds. This will leave a balance of \$5000.00, saying nothing about the \$700.00 I cost you are familiar with the time I coughed the amount up to the board of supervisors through the bank failure. But taking the \$2300.00 and dividing same by 8 years you will have an average salary of \$287.50. If these figures are correct, I don't see any reason why I am not entitled to one year's collection fees as is the treasurer. Below you will find bill for same.

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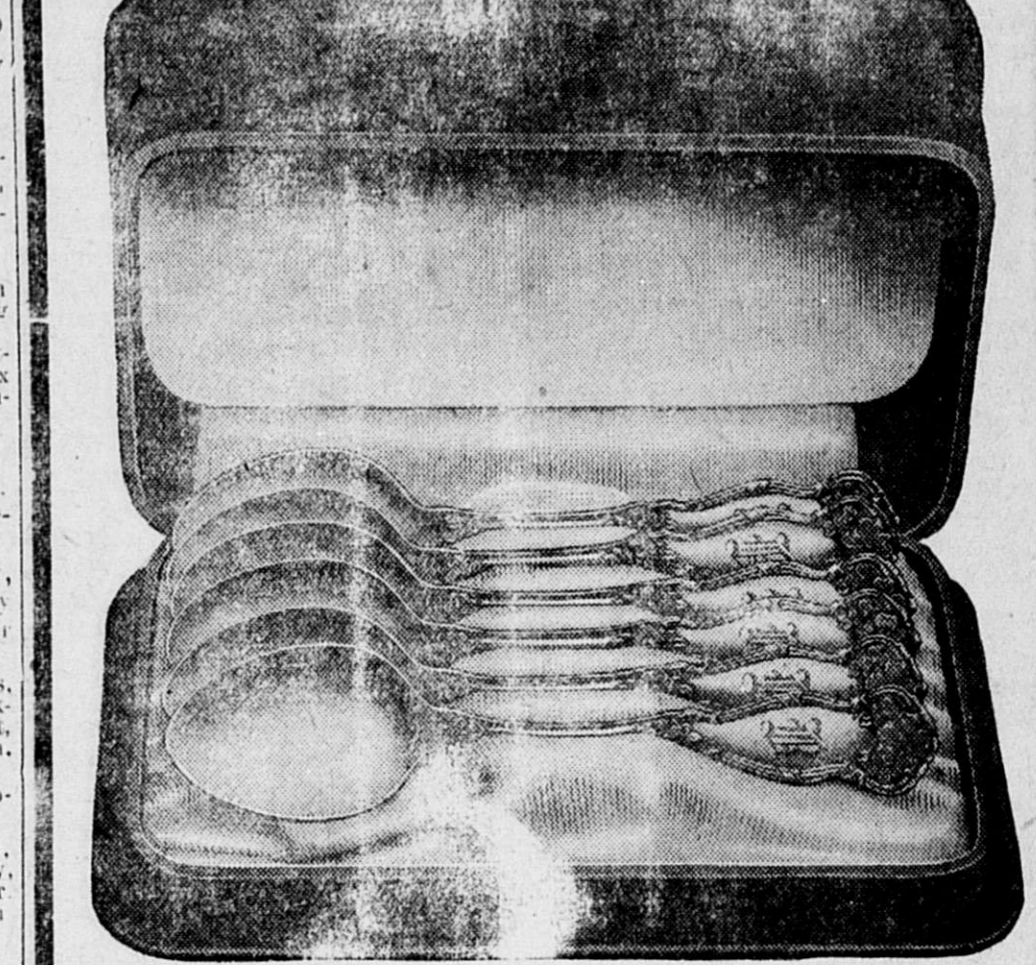
