Saginaw Wholesalers and Manufacturers to Visit this City.

The Saginaw Wholesalers and Manufacturers Association are coming. The party will leave Saginaw on June 25th for a three day trip by railroad in a special train of Pullman cars travelling by daylight the entire route.

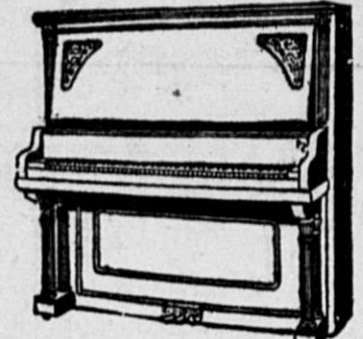
