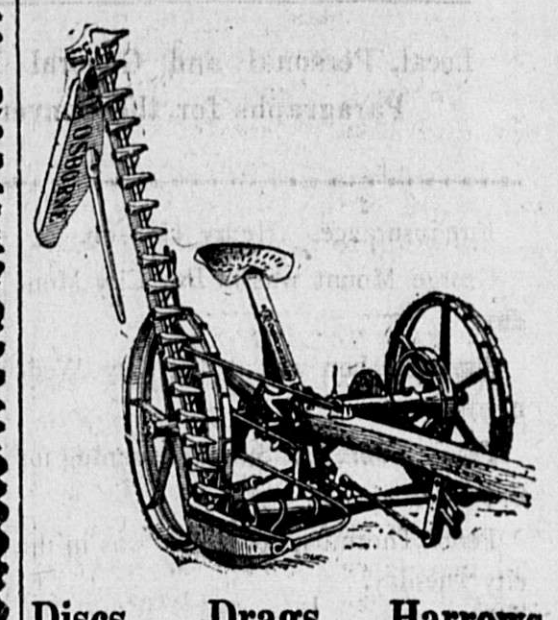

WHITTEMORE HONORED.

The following from the Weekly Almanac, of June 11, will be of interest to the many friends of the young man in this city:

By action of the Board of Regents of the University of Michigan the faculties of the respective colleges in the state authorized to nominate each year to the administrative offices of the Graduate school of the University some member of their respective senior classes, or one of their graduates of not more than four years standing, as a suitable candidate for a State College Fellowship, with a stipend of \$300.00 for the academic session. Such candidates when duly appointed by the Board of Regents will be placed on the same footing and be subject to the same regulations as other University Fellows. The fellowship to Alma college for the year 1912-13 has been given to Harlow O. Whittemore, of the class of 1909, and the alternate to Hazel S. Blair, class of 1910.

CAN VOTE TAXES.

Important changes in the school law make the election of suitable officers at the annual school meeting to be held this year on Monday, July 8, in the various districts throughout the state of vital importance. Under the law, as amended by the 1911 legislature, the school boards have almost complete taxing power, the electors of a school district being able legally to vote money only for the erection of school houses, buying of sites and the payment of tuition in excess of \$20 per pupil. Taxes for all other purposes are voted by the school board. The board is to use its own judgment as to the amount of taxes necessary for repairs on school property, new school equipment, fuel, teachers' wages, water supply, heating plant, appurtenances such as woodshed, fence, etc. The electors have no right to let contracts for fuel or anything else, nor to dictate as to the selection of the teachers or the amount of their wages. Such business is left entirely to the board.

This will be the first airship flights in Northern Michigan and will in itself be a feature worth going many miles to see. Other attractions will include parades, band concerts, unveiling the cannon from the battleship Maine in City Hall Park, horse, auto and motor cycle races, sports and ball games at the fair grounds in the afternoon and fireworks and an auto parade in the evening. THEY MUST APPLY SOON.

Many boys and girls in the state of Michigan were deprived of a year in high school because parents, guardians and school officers were not familiar with the free tuition law in which important changes have been made recently. In order to secure the tuition it is necessary for the parent, guardian or person who stands in parental control to make a written application to the board in the district of which he or she is a resident. The application is to state the name of the child for whom it is made and must be presented in writing on or before the fourth Monday of June. It must be made each year that the child desires to attend a high school situated outside of his own district.

When the proper application is made, the board of a district which does not maintain a high school must pay up to \$20 a year to any one of the three nearest high schools, the parents making the selection. The money must be paid by the treasurer of the district to the treasurer of the high school district at any time the latter district demands it. The law defines a high school as a graded district maintaining twelve grades of work with at least two teachers devoting their entire teaching time to the ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades, but also permits primary districts to pay tuition to graded schools maintaining ten grades of work with at least one teacher devoting his or her entire teaching time to the ninth and tenth grades. These are the only two classes of schools to which districts may pay high school tuition. The districts maintaining a ten-grade school do not have to pay tuition on their own pupils until the latter pass the tenth grade.

The students eligible for this tuition are only those under 20 years of age who have passed the eighth grade state examination conducted in each county and secured a diploma; those who passed the eighth grade in a graded school and have a written statement to that effect from the superintendent, and those who made application for tuition under the 1909 law.
