Bodies of all Four are Found.

All doubt as to the fate of the four young people who were drowned from a rowboat off Linwood park on the occasion of the Pinconning high school picnic Monday afternoon of last week was dispelled Saturday morning, when the bodies were recovered from the beach a mile from the park. The bodies of Ion Lincoln, Milton Clark and Nellie Salmon were found on the shore. George Hartingh and Captain John Cotte, figured that the body of Eva Oullette must be near the same place, and 80 yards from shore set off a charge of dynamite. Her body rose to the surface at once.

Both Bay county coroners decided no inquest was necessary, but because the boat from which the young people was drowned was believed to be defective, Supervisor Hartingh insisted that one be held and the date was set for July 19 in Pinconning.
