Wilson and Marshall.

The democratic National convention at Baltimore did not complete its labors until Wednesday of this week, being in session eight days. It was without doubt one of the most remarkable conventions ever held. Forty-six ballots were taken before Governor Woodrow Wilson, of New Jersey, was nominated for the presidency, which occurred Tuesday afternoon—after the convention had been in session one week.

Governor Thomas R. Marshall, of Indiana, was nominated for the vice-presidency on the third ballot.

The platform adopted is thoroughly progressive as are the candidates nominated, and notwithstanding the hard struggle during the convention both have received the unanimous endorsement of all factions and democracy goes into the battle with a united and enthusiastic party.

Gov. Willson is conceded by all men and all parties to be one of the ablest American statesmen, a man of high character and exceptional ability. That he will receive the support of thousands of progressive voters of other parties who believe the interests of the common people can best be protected by a man like Gov. Willson has already been assured him and his election next November seems well nigh certain.

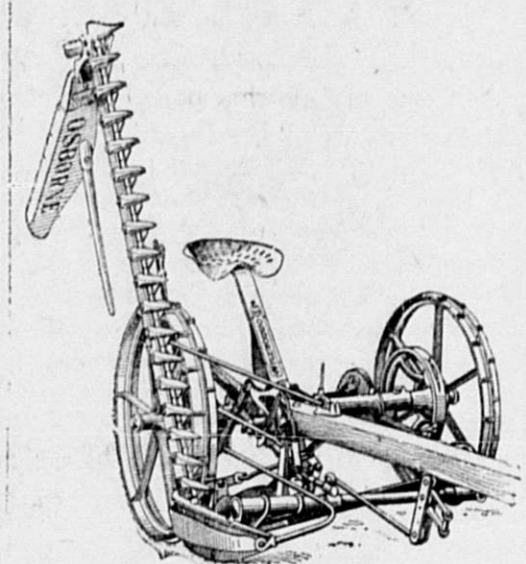

Notes from the Secretary's Office

On the Institute Train we were pleased
to receive many samples of alfalfa.
We believe that each and every county
in Northeastern Michigan can now show
as good alfalfa as any place in the state
of Michigan. Furthermore much of
alfalfa cannot be surpassed no matter
where grown. While perhaps California
can raise a greater tonnage per acre
yet it is also true that they receive a
correspondingly lower price for their
alfalfa and out there it is grown on land
that costs from three to five times as
much as the land in Northern Michigan.
Our smaller tonnage is more than made
up for by the extra value and cheaper
lands. We believe there should be
much more alfalfa grown and while the
secretary does not wish to make wild
predictions, yet he feels very confident
that alfalfa can be made to grow on
land which at this writing is considered
by many as being worthless. Perhaps
the time is not ripe to make it worth
while to go to the expense necessary to
put this land in shape, but we believe
the time will come when it will be and
that a crop, whether alfalfa or some-
thing else, will be found which will
make this land profitable.

Once more we wish to urge upon
those having good material for agricul-
tural exhibits, the necessity of sending
samples to the bureau. This year
every article will be labeled with the name
of the grower and his address with such
other information as to the yield, num-
ber of acres, etc., as can be obtained
from the grower. We have a fine sup-
ply of alfalfa but really need more of
the other grasses. It is not necessary
that the sample to be sent in must excel
and be phenomenal, for while we wish
as creditable a showing as possible we
are rather more anxious to secure a
goodly supply of fair samples from each
of the various counties within the ter-
ritory of the Development Bureau.
Where expense is necessary to secure
these samples the Development Bureau
is of course perfectly willing to pay the
same but there are many in the district
who from a spirit of helping are willing
to do all they can to assist in the work.

Our advertising is certainly causing
some people to hear of Northeastern
Michigan for we receive quite a goodly
supply of letters scattered more or less
over the United States, stating that they
have seen our booklet and desire us to
send it to others. We do not list these
names which are given us until we hear
from them personally that they are in-
terested but it is encouraging to find
that we are becoming better known
continually.

A Question Answered

On the suggestive question for the
Sunday school lesson of May 26, the
Rev. Dr. Linscott gives a reader the fol-
lowing answer. The lesson for that
date was from Matt. v., 33-36, and the
question was No. 5: "Many men take
God's name in vain habitually without
any thought of God. What is moral
quality of such a habit?"

ANSWER. In the lesson Jesus is con-
demning the habit of swearing. It seems
to have been prevalent in those days
the same as it is in the present day.
Swearing is a very bad habit, and pro-
fanity is always vile. It is doubtless
true that many men who swear, and
take God's name in vain, do not actual-
ly think of God while they are doing it.
They simply do not think of Him be-
cause swearing has become a habit, and
they use the vile words unthinkingly,
but all swearing is based upon rebel-
lion against God. You never hear a
godly man taking God's name in vain,
or using oaths in his common conver-
sation or otherwise. When you hear a
person cursing and swearing that is an
absolute proof that he is ungodly, and
the moral quality of the habit is vile
without any qualification. Even to
judge of the habit of swearing from an
ethical standpoint it is shocking and
indefensible. Men and women who
have any regard for the common decen-
cies of life, even without being religious
do not use profane language. It is true
that ceasing to swear does not go all the
way to constitute a man a Christian, but
avoiding profanity is one of the essential
conditions of leading a Christian life.

**Production of Coal in
Michigan**

The production of coal in Michigan
in 1911, according to the United States
Geological Survey, was 1,476,074 short
tons, valued at \$2,633,803. Michigan's
coal production reached its maximum
record in 1907, when a total of 2,035,-
858 short tons was attained. Since then
the production has decreased each year,
competition of higher-grade Pennsylvan-
ia coal brought by water to the Lake
ports being the principal factor in cur-
tailing the Michigan output.

The coal produced in Michigan comes
chiefly from Bay and Saginaw coun-
ties. One of the principal markets for
the product consists of salt-evaporation
plants that in former days were oper-
ated in connection with lumber mills, the
refuse from which furnished their fuel.
The decline of the lumber industry has
compelled the salt works to turn to coal
as a fuel.

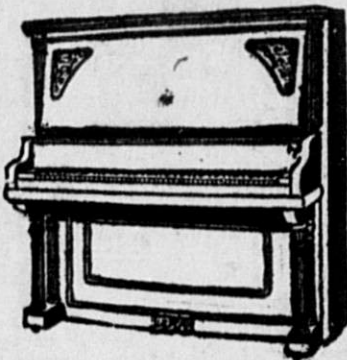

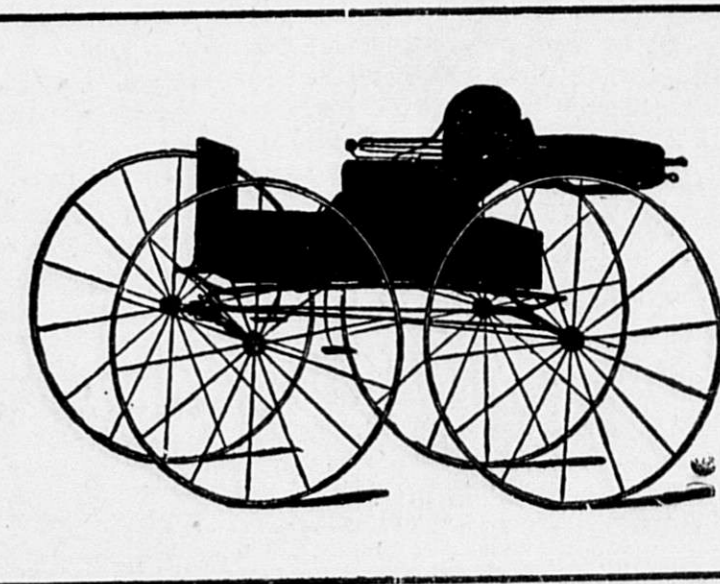

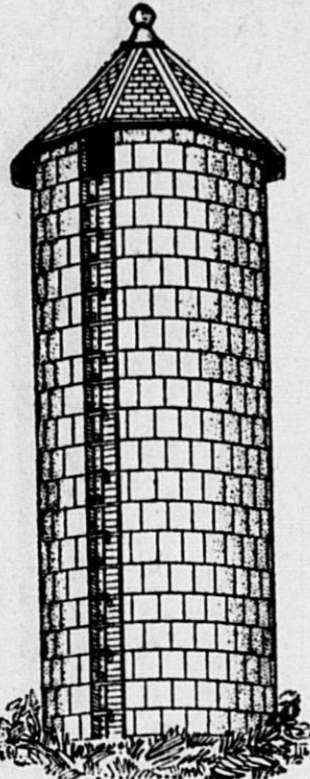
