Not only does the extension of the free delivery service depend largely upon the condition of the public highways, but the cost of food products is regulated in a great measure by the facilities afforded for bringing them to market-

I believe in big business; therefore, I favor a fedral incorporation law which shall permit the massing of capital, but with proper federal inspection and adequate federal control, so that small business enterprises cannot be crushed by unfair competition or consummers be overcharged by monopolization.

One of my competitors declares that he is "absolutely opposed to reciprocity with Canada or any other country." On the contrary I believe in reciprocity with all nations, but under terms favorable to our interests. It is generally known that all our trade with European and Oriental nations, also with Canada and the Central and South American Republics, is conducted under treaties involving reciprocity. I opposed to the proposed Canadian reciprocity treaty. It devised purely in the interests of the great manufacturing trusts and its effect would have been harmful to our agriculturalists.

Up to the present the tendency of immigrants has been to congest our cities rather than locate in farming communities. I believe our




