A Success.

One of the main attractions at the fair will be the fireworks. The main piece shows the Fall of Old Mexico, an apt subject just at this time. The Castle of Chahultepec, where President Diaz had his headquarters, is shown on its lofty mountain side location as is also Popocatepel, the mighty volcano that is plainly seen from the city of Mexico. Another feature display will be the battle among the clouds, showing a glimpse into the future. In this great spectacle will be seen the struggle of airships for mastery in the air and the picture is very realistic. Thousands of dollars

will be the expense of these splendid features at the State Fair.

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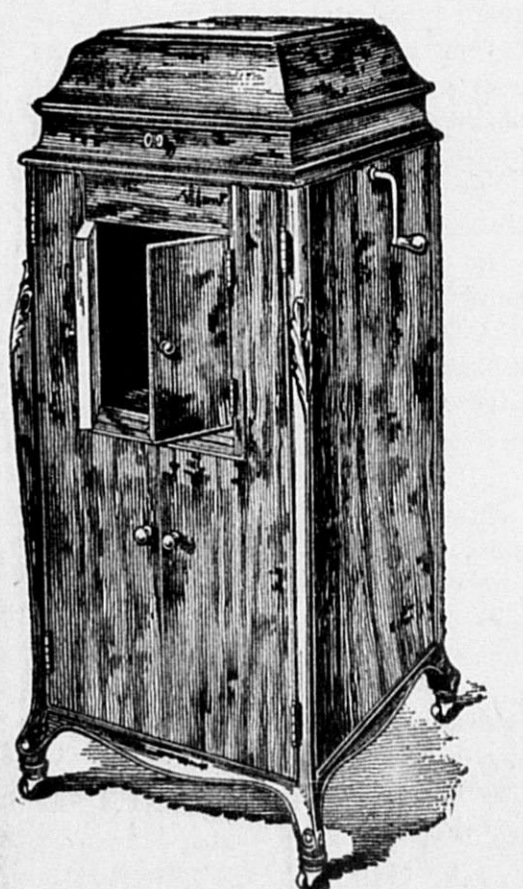

Modern Fraternal Insurance.

A recent compilation shows that fraternal insurance companies of the United States have since organization, paid benefits aggregating \$1,478,904,202.

This enormous sum indicates the importance of these organizations with a membership of 8,000,000, considerably more than half the voting population of the United States. The largest is the Modern Woodmen of America with a membership considerably in excess of one million.

The financial responsibility of these fraternal insurance societies is a matter of direct interest to over half the people of the United States. It is therefore the duty of public authority to require that they shall issue equitable contracts and make adequate provision for their redemption on maturity.

Hence the enactment of in many states of the Mobile law. This specifies no particular rates to be charged, but provides for valuation of policies, and for publicity of the valuation, so that the policy holder will be able to decide for himself whether his policy will be paid in full when matured by death.

The Mobile law recognizes that a policy of life insurance is a contract as sacred as the treasury note issued by the government of the United States, and that the obligation is upon those who issue the policy to make full provision for redemption at par on maturity. The modern beneficiary certificate is to the old as the modern bank note is to the wildcat currency of ante-bellum days.

The view no longer obtains that fraternal insurance is a gamble in which those who die first win, leaving their survivors to hold the bag. Post-mortem assessment insurance has gone the way of the Louisiana lottery, with which it compared well in its distribution of benefits, and the fraternities are gradually substituting the sound quality demanded by modern enlightenment.

Can Re-Enroll on Primary Day.

It is understood by many that voters who are enrolled with some one party, must vote his own ticket at the primaries or none at all and it is found to be true so far as any old parties are concerned. The law leaves a way open so that any person wishing to vote on the "Bull Moose" ticket can do so by changing on primary day.

The following is the clause in the 1911 amendment of the primary election laws of 1909:

"Amended 1911, act 279—Provided, further, that any enrolled voter may re-enroll on any party, and all qualified electors not enrolled with any political party may be enrolled on any primary election day as a member of a new political party."

Section 34 of the same act says: "He may vote for any person whose name is not printed on the ballot by inserting such name in such manner as shall make it a substitute for any name which is printed thereon or where no candidate's name appears upon the ballot."

Founding of Beet Sugar Industry.

The process of making sugar out of beets is just one hundred years old. If it had not been for Napoleon's wars, probably nobody would be making that kind of sugar today. A French chemist, Oliver de Serres, discovered in 1660 that the beet contained a considerable sugar content, and in 1747 a Prussian chemist, Margraf, demonstrated that true sugar could be extracted from the beet. Then a pupil of Margraf, Achard, took up the work and made practical demonstrations in getting sugar from beets on a farm near Berlin. The emperor assisted Achard, but the industry did not flourish, and 1799 a committee of the institute of France was appointed to look into the possibilities of the work and report on Achard's experiments. This committee reported that Achard had overestimated the sugar possibilities of the beet, but that sugar could be made at a cost of 16 cents per pound, which was only one half the current price, so two factories were erected near Paris. They were financial failures and the scientists turned to the grape.

It was at this point that history stepped in. The battle of Trafalgar was fought and the control of the sea passed

from Napoleon, and Europe became the object of a blockade which soon resulted in the scarcity of all foreign importations, among them sugar. The latter article in the French market commanded fantastic prices. In the autobiography of Trelawney, called "Adventures of a Younger Son," the latter tells his experience in arriving at Cherbourg in a fast running American schooner which had managed to run the blockade, and he adds that although the vessel carried spices, silks and other articles of luxury and great price, the greatest profit was on the sugar, which yielded an immense return for the successful blockade runner.

The situation became intolerable and on March 25, 1811, Napoleon issued his first decree giving a bounty for the production of beet sugar, and supplemented it by another in January, 1812, enlarging the reward and founding factories for instruction in the art of making sugar from beets. Thus it was just one hundred years ago that the beet sugar industry was founded.—Saginaw News.

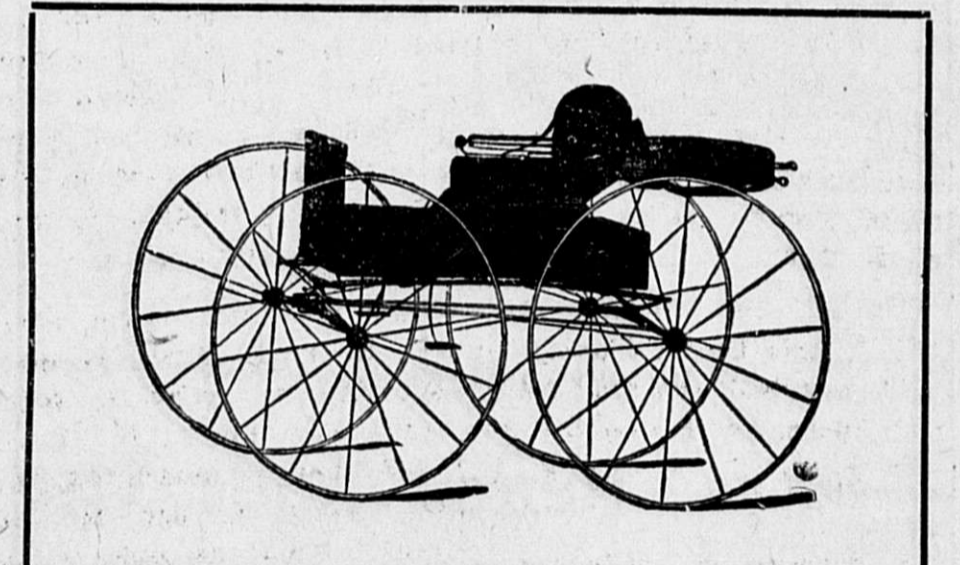

D. & M. Road May Not Appeal.
LANSING, AUG. 7.—The supreme court has refused the application of the attorneys of the Detroit and Mackinac Railroad company for permission to appeal the log rate case to the supreme court. The decision was made on the ground that the interests of the shippers would be jeopardized unless the company would put up a \$100,000 bond to protect the shippers. The court recently decided that the commission had jurisdiction over the freight rates of all roads in the state.

The case was begun after the action of the commission ordering the company to put mileage rates at all points on its lines. Previous to that the company had two sets of rates and shippers south of Alpena could ship through Alpena to northern points cheaper than Alpena people could.
