

Small Owner is Sufferer. Lansing, Aug. 3 .- "It is the little owner, the fellow with property worth from \$500 to \$3,000, who is overated in this state. He is the fellow who is paying too much taxes, yet he is the last one to put up a holler," was the astonishing statement of W. B. Mershon of the state commission.

"This kind of a property owner is really the only one who has a kick coming, and we hear the least from him.

"The corporations of the state are greatly under-assessed but unlike the smal! projerty owner, we hear complaints from them. However we cannot go after the corporations and pick them out one by one, but on the contrary, have to take them as we review, county by county. At the present time there are two things to do-give small property owner justice and raise the corporations where they belong and this will equalize the railroad assessments.

"Another thing we are going to do, and have already taken legal advice or. is to compel corporations to give local assessing officers a sworn statement of determination to accomplish the thing all their properties early in April, as required by law. ### Tuberculosis Raises Insurance Rates.

While state commissions and other bodies are trying to find a method for reducing the cost of life insurance, Prof. James W. Glover of the University of Michigan, demonstrates that every policy support he is receiving from all parts of holder of a \$10,000 ordinary whole life policy could save about \$200.0 a year on his premiums if tuberculosis and typhoid fever were eliminated. Tuberculosis alone causes a loss to such a policy-holder of from \$16.70 at ege 20, to \$17.70 at age 60. At age 20, with the present high death rate from Tuberculosis, this one disease alone shortens the complete expectation of life by two years and 158 days. While the death rate from tuberculosis seems to be declining, the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis says that the combined effort of every ter of good roads should become a govman, woman and child is necessary to bring about a radical reduction in life insurance rates such as Professor Glover has indicated.
