Master Philip McCombs accompanied them for a weeks visit. Frank Buell, candidate for the republican nomination for congress, was in the city yesterday meeting the voters. Mr. Buell is very confident of his nomination next Tuesday, having received the most flattering encouragement from all parts of the district. The Detroit Journal begins the publication of Theodore Roosevelt's account of his African wanderings in search of jungle beasts and other wild animals, on Monday, August 26. This is the famous narrative for which Col. Roosevelt was paid \$1 a word. It is illustrated from photographs by Kermit Roosevelt and others. Thomas Wilson has completed the work of putting the cement foundation under his mill and elevator, and is now busy remodeling the interior and getting in shape to take care of the grain as rapidly as is ready for the market. He will erect a large hay and coal shed adjoining the mill at once, also an office building. When completed this will be one of the most complete and up-to-date elevator plants in this section of the state. Delegates to the county convention will be elected at the general primary election to be held in every township in the county August 27, and not by caucuses in the various townships as under the old law. The primary ballot contains no names for delegates and names must be written on the ballot or affixed on gummed slips. The main objection to the caucus system was the charge that all nominations were "fixed" in advance and that the ordinary voter had no chance to register his choice. Under the present system each individual voter has an equal opportunity to express his choice for delegates. Isaac Welton, a well-known pioneer resident of East Tawas, died Monday after a lingering illness from cancer of the stomach. The deceased was about 55 years of age and has been a resident of that city for 35 years. For the past 15 years he has been engaged in the livery business. There were few men in the Tawas who enjoyed a larger acquaintance than Mr. Welton, or who were more universally liked. He is survived by the widow and two daughters, Mrs. Bernice Welter, of Cleveland, and Mrs. Lottie Gardner, of Port Arthur, Ont. The funeral was held from the home Wednesday afternoon and was largely attended. Rev. W. A. Gregory, of the M. E. church officiated. Monday evening, S. H. Spencer, who has been thro Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Iowa for the Northeastern Michigan Development Bureau, gave a most pleasing talk on what he saw on his four month's trip and how it compared with Northeastern Michigan. He also showed the beautiful colored lantern slides of northeastern Michigan scenes and products which were used on his extensive advertising tour. The large audience present were favorably impressed with the evident good work that has been done in advertising this section, and are more convinced than ever that the Bureau is accomplishing a great work. Mr. Spencer states that the crop conditions in the states visited very poor and cannot compare with those here. He says that hundreds of men are turning toward Northeastern Michigan for homes and that the number is increasing all the time. It is to be regretted that every citizen of this territory could not see these views and become familiar with the great advertising feature they make.

Go into any old section of the country where things are being done and enquire how it all came about and you will at once begin to hear the pioneer tales of hardship and privation, of hard work and perseverance, just such as has been going on around Tawas for years. Progress is always built on the self sacrifice of the pioneer. Mr. and Mrs. G. G. Hood, of Hale, were in the city Monday. Mr. Hood will assume the management of the Michigan Cereal Co.'s elevator in this city, within a few days, and they were looking for a house in which to reside. Mr. Hood is a man of large experience in the elevator business, and a good citizen who will be a welcome addition to our city. An important question for the voters to remember at the primary election next Tuesday is the fact that they must put a cross in front of the name of one candidate for each office, even though there is but one candidate for the office. This is important for the fact that at least 15 per cent of each party vote must be cast for all candidates in order that their name may appear on the official ballot. Be sure that you place a cross in the square before the name of one man for each office, whether he has opposition for the nomination or not. The Tawas City creamery has been purchased by George Fahselt, of Tawas township, who will assume possession September 1. Carl E. Fahselt, who has been with the Tawas Butter Co. for the past two years, will assume the management. E. J. McCartney, who has so successfully managed this business since its establishment a few years ago will engage in business elsewhere. The new management are so well known here—especially among the farmers—that they need no introduction. That the business will be conducted on the same honorable and successful plan is assured. A battleship of the "Dreadnaught" type costs twelve million dollars to build and a million dollars a year to keep. This amount would build a macadamized road from New York to Chicago, or it would reclaim by irrigation 240,000 acres of land and provide for 8,000 families. And still the republican press of the country is trying to make political capital out of the fact that the democrats in the house of representatives at Washington are trying to trim the naval appropriation bill, and are apt to succeed in cutting off the building of one or two from the proposed plan. Now that certainly would be a calamity to divert this number of millions into channels where it might do the country more good. Wouldn't it? A Fatal Runaway. P. J. It seems that Mr. Shuster went to Jordan's mill in Sherman, after a load of lumber for his new residence, and as he drove up to the mill his horses became frightened and throwing him from the wagon and dragging him a few rods when his head struck a stump. The men at the mill immediately went to his assistance, but he was unconscious and lived about ten minutes. The deceased has been a resident of Emery Junction for a number of years and was most highly respected by all who knew him. We have not heard what the funeral arrangements are. **The Meeting of the Alpena Baptist Association.** The twenty-sixth annual meeting of the Alpena Baptist Association was held in this city last week, in connection with the first session of the Iosco Assembly. The attendance was all that could be desired, and was estimated to be twice as great as that of a year ago at Alpena. The program as published was carried out with a few substitutions. Among the features of more than ordinary interest, were the stereopticon views and lectures by Rev. B. H. Thomas. These formed the opening service of each evening session. Rev. Thomas has a set of views on nearly every country of the world. The views of the picturesque AuSable were of special interest to the people of Tawas. Rev. Thomas is a master in this line and probably has the best set of views to be found in our state. Dr. Lynch, who spent fifteen years studying the natives of the Congo, was to deliver one lecture on these people, but the hearers were so interested that they required no less than three. More than one address was also required of Miss Davis, field worker for the Foreign Missionary Society. Rev. Eugene Neubaum, of Bay City, and Rev. W. T. ## About Enrollment.

Only those voters who wish to join the new or national progressive party will be permitted to re-enroll primary day. All others who are enrolled and do not desire to become affiliated with the new party cannot change their enrollment, says Attorney General Franz Kuhn, in an opinion given this week.

In some manner a report was circulated that it would be possible for all enrolled voters to change their party affiliations primary day. This caused the attorney-general to issue the following:

"An enrolled voter may change his party affiliation and become enrolled with one of the old political parties only upon a regular enrollment day. This point is settled by section 11 of the general primary election act, which provides in part that:

"Whenever an enrolled voter has changed his party affiliations and desires to be enrolled as a member of another political party he may personally make application only on enrollment day for re-enrollment."

"The only exception to the above quoted rule in the case of a new political party. Section 28 of the general primary election act provides in part: "That any enrolled voter may re-enroll on primary election day as a member of a new political party." This exception would not however apply to a socialist, prohibition, democratic or republican party. August 27 is not regular enrollment day. Accordingly if you are enrolled as a member of one of the old political parties you cannot change your political party affiliation or become enrolled as a member of any other old political party."

April 1, was the last day on which a voter could legally change his party affiliations from one of the old parties to another of the old parties. Those who have endeavored to do so by affidavit are not legally entitled vote except as enrolled on April 1st last.

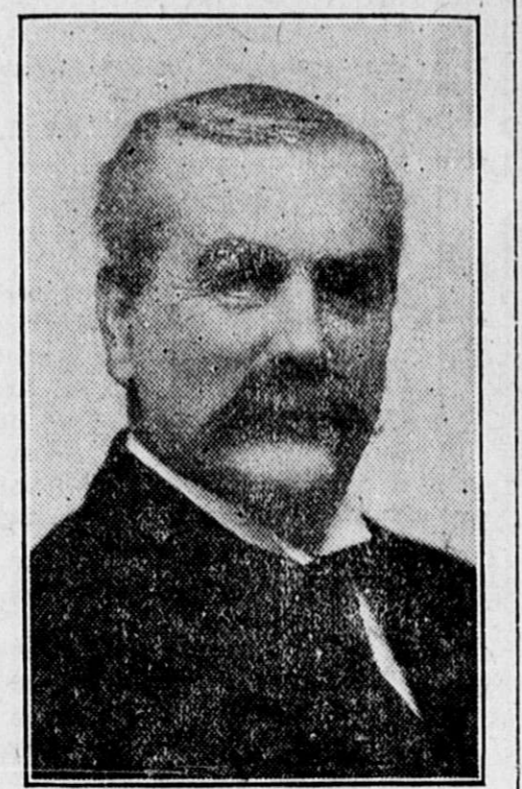

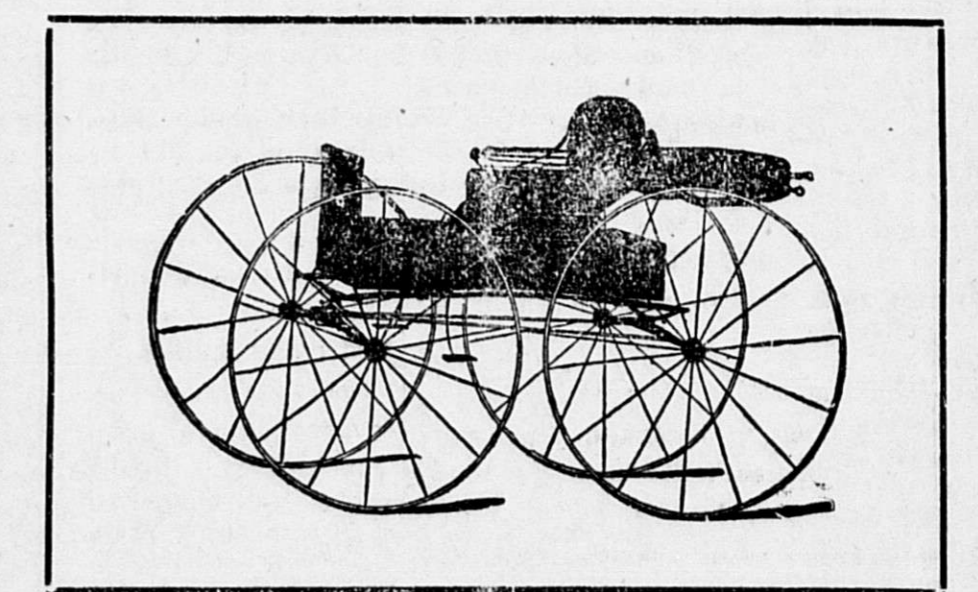

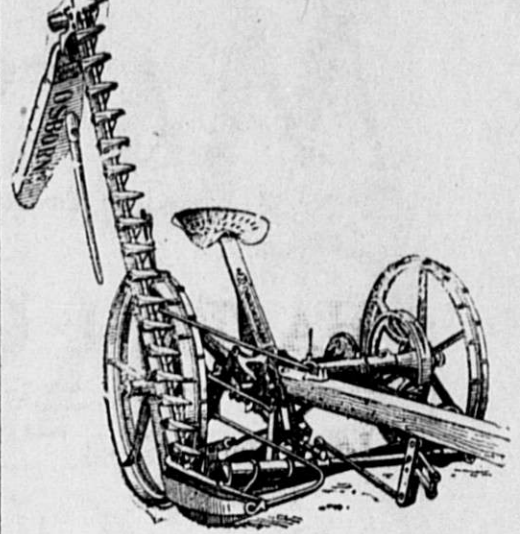
