Mayor Oscar Hurkett, of AuSable, Supervisor Abbott, of Wilber, and Supervisor Jordan, of Sherman, have been inspecting the county roads this week, preparatory to reporting to the county board next week.

The Monthly Bulletin of Vital Statistics reports 13 births and eight deaths from Iosco county during August. In Arenac there were 17 births and nine deaths, and in Ogemaw 18 births and eight deaths. In the state there were 5,262 births and 3,010 deaths.

Harry Whittemore, of Detroit, is visiting at the home of his mother, Mrs. Abbie Whittemore, for a few weeks. Mr. Whittemore has only visited this city three times in the past thirty-five years, and he is enjoying himself renewing old acquaintances and visiting old scenes.

According to the state crop report issued last Saturday, the estimated yield per acre of wheat this year was 11 bushel. The total number of bushels was 5,714,544. The per cent of acreage sown this fall as compared with last fall is 84. The estimated yield of potatoes in the state this year is 105.

Registration.

The last legislature made an important change in the law governing the registration of voters, which should be noted by all. Under the new law the regular registration for all elections occurs one week earlier than formerly. Instead of being the Saturday preceding the election it is now the second Saturday preceding the election, which this year falls on October 26th.

Boards of registration in townships are required to be in session on Saturday, October 26, between the hours of 9 a. m. and 5 p. m. No new registration is required in townships.

In cities of the fourth class an entire new registration is required every four years, presidential election years. The boards of registration are required to be in session on Saturday, October 26, from 8 o'clock in the forenoon until 8 o'clock in the evening, and on such other days previous to that date as the city council may direct, not exceeding three. In this city the council has set Thursday, Friday and Saturday, October 24th, 25th and 26th.

It will be necessary for every elector in this city who desires to vote at the election on November 5, to appear before the board in person, on some of the above days, and have his name enrolled on the register of the ward in which he resides.

Do not neglect this important duty, otherwise you will lose your vote.

Big Coast Paper for Wilson

The Buffalo Evening Times says: "The San Francisco Call, one of the leading republican newspapers of the Pacific coast, as well as one of the most influential papers in the country, is weary of the dissension, bickering and open rupture within the republican party, and editorially is urging its readers to vote for Woodrow Wilson."

Gaining Strength.
Favorable results are being noted from the safe and sane campaign which the Equal Suffrage association has been carrying on throughout the state in the interest of the amendment which will be voted upon Nov. 2.

From the fifty and more counties organized, the most encouraging reports are coming in. The women in each county are making a most favorable impression because of their dignified manner and utter absence of sensational appeals. That men appreciate this is shown by the increasing number of prominent men who are speaking and working for suffrage.

"Tag Day" will be observed the Saturday before election, as a final reminder to the men of Michigan that women want the ballot. This will not be done in a sensational manner, but all over Michigan the men will be presented with tags bearing "Vote Yes for Woman's Suffrage" on them. It is expected that over 200,000 male voters will be reached in this way, and that this silent appeal will surely win votes for the amendment.

Liquor and Insurance.
Uncle Sam's liquor bill is said to be \$15 per year per capita. The annual premium paid the old line life insurance companies on fifteen billion dollars of insurance is \$5 per capita above returns to policy holders. The fraternal societies have between eight and nine billion dollars of insurance outstanding, and the fraternal insurance tax of this nation is about 10 cents per capita per annum. So it would appear that for twenty-three to twenty-four billion dollars of life insurance the American people are paying about one-third of what their liquor costs them annually. We consume annually about one gallon of liquor for \$12 of life insurance in force.

If what the United States expends annually for liquor were invested in life insurance for the benefit of the whole people over 21 years of age, it would insure a fair estate at death for every adult citizen of the country. If every drinking man would balance his expenditures for liquor with his expenditures for life insurance, what would become of poverty in the United States?

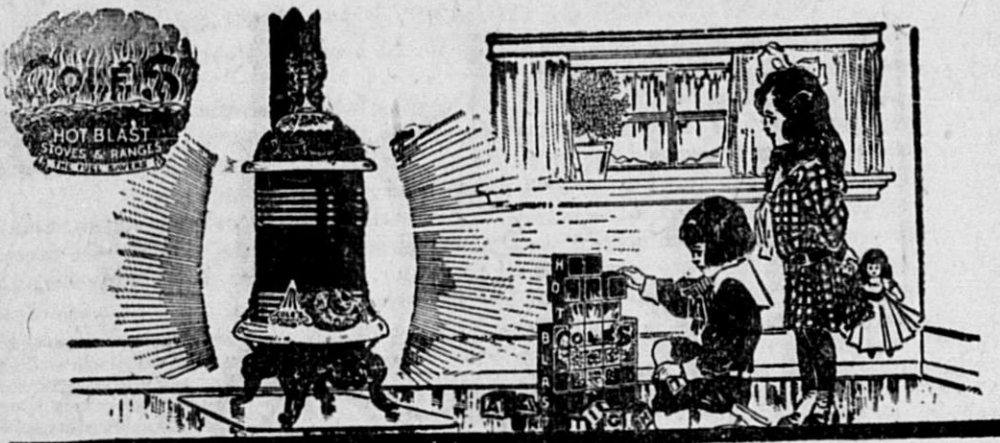
