THE NATION GOES DEMOCRATIC

Almost Unanimously. Wilson is Elected by the Largest Majority Ever Given a President. Democrats Will Control After March 4th.

Michigan Elects Woodbridge N. Ferris Governor by at Least 25,000 Majority. Result on Balance of State Offices Probably Split Between Democrats, Republicans and Progressives

Woodruff, Progressive, Leads for Congress, Coumans Second and Loud Third.—Close Race for Sheriff with Johnson Two Ahead.—County and Other Results.

Governor Woodrow Wilson, of New Jersey, and Gov. Thomas Marshall, of Indiana, democratic candidates for President and vice-President were given the greatest majority ever received by candidates for these positions.

Forty states with 415 electoral votes are conceded to the democracy. Several others are still doubtful, with the indications favoring Wilson.

The democrats have increased their majority in congress, and all indications are that they will have a majority in the U. S. senate.

The democratic landslide carried with it the state officers and legislatures in almost every state carried by democracy.

New York gives Wilson over 200,000 and elects the entire democratic state ticket. Ohio does the same.

The only states Wilson failed to carry were Illinois, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Washington, Idaho, Utah, and Vermont. In Minnesota, South Dakota and Wyoming the result is still in doubt, with indications favoring Wilson. Pennsylvania is given to Roosevelt by a small plurality, but later returns favor Wilson. The same condition exists in Illinois.

Taft carried Vermont, Idaho and Utah.

Michigan has evidently been carried by the bull moose candidate by a majority of 30,000.

Ferris, democrat, carries Michigan by not less than 20,000 plurality, with Musselman, republican, next, and Watkins, the progressive, a close third.

No returns have been received that indicate who has been elected to the state offices below governor, and the chances are that the results will be split.

In the tenth congressional district Woodruff, progressive, is evidently elected, with Coumans second and Loud third. Woodruff's majority is less than 1000.

Pat Kelly, republican, seems to have been the successful candidate for congressman-at-large from Michigan.

In Michigan returns are too incomplete to determine how the state legislature stands. At the present time it looks as tho the republicans had elected 17 state senators, the democrats 7, and the progressives 4, with eight in doubt. Returns indicate the election of 30 republicans to the lower house, 31 democrats, eight progressives, with 40 doubtful.

Senator William Alden Smith's re-election to the U. S. senate seems to be in doubt.

In this, the 28th senatorial district, no returns are at hand on which to base a prediction as to who is successful.

E. B. Follett, of Hale, is undoubtedly elected to the legislature from this district.

Michigan democrats gain two, if not three, of the congressmen in the state. The progressives elect two—Woodruff in this district and McDonald in the Upper Peninsula.

Iosco county elected the entire republican ticket. The race between Collie Johnson and John Jordan for sheriff is very close, Johnson having but two majority on the face of the returns. The county majorities are somewhat larger than two years ago.

The bull moosers carried the county for all their candidates above the legislature, except on governor. Ferris had 43 plurality over Watkins. Roosevelt's plurality was 284. The progressive strength was a big surprise, and while drawn largely from the republicans, it is very evident that many Democrats also went to the new party.

The amendment to the state constitution giving to women the right of suffrage seems to have carried in the state. The vote in Iosco county was 942 for, and 741 against, a majority of 201.

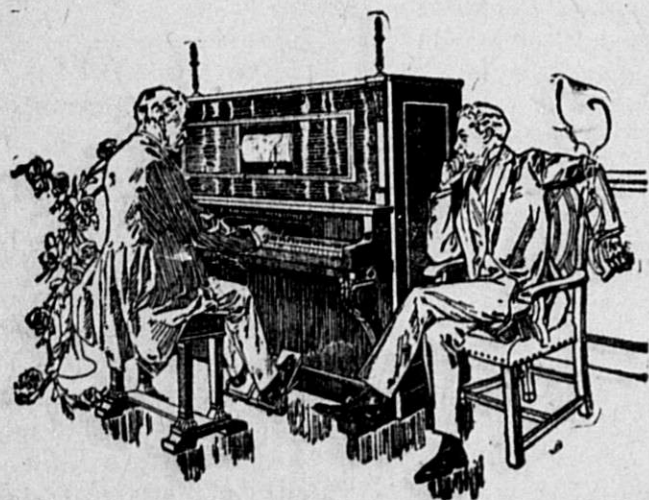
