The Marines.

A recent visitor to the city was geant Joseph C. Petres, of the U-States Marine Corps, who calle men Dr. C. V. Crane, the local Official Mecical Examiner of the Marine Corps, and while here talked entertainingly of the service which he represents. He has been in the Marine Corps over twelve years, and has been in nearly every part of the world. He was a member of the force sent to China in 1900 to help quell the Boxer rebellion, and has taken part in numerous expeditions to Central America when the republics down there became obstreperous.

It does not take a war, however, to give these fellows strange experiences. Sergeant Petres said that a great many people have only the vaguest ideas of what the Marines are and what they do. The first authentic record of the Marine Corps in America bears the date of 1740. Their uniform was camlet coats, brown linen waistcoats and canvas trousers. Unique figures!

The United States Marine Corps was first called into existence on Nov. 10, 1775, and served throughout the Revolutionary War. It was disbanded at the close of the war, but was reorganized and permanently established July 11, 1798, the same year that the Navy Department was created, with Benjamin Stoddart as its first secretary.

To give a detailed history of the Maines with all of their feats and legends, would require volumes. They were before Mexico City with Scott; they first raised the American flag in Cuba, Porto Rico and the Philippine Islands; they manned the small batteries on the battleships that annihilated Cevera's squadron. They were with Dewey at Manila and camped with the Army of the Allies before Pekin. It was the Marines who charged side by side with the Little Brown Men of Japan that first went through the breach in the south wall of that city. They enforced the first semblance of order amid the debris of San Francisco at the time of the earthquake there, marching from their barracks in the Navy Yard at the first call for troops as they would have fallen into line and marched on the parade ground for inspection. They put in several sleepless nights patrolling the city before sufficient troops had been brought in to allow them to rest. Their more recent services during the Nicaraguan and Cuban troubles, the Mexican maneuvers, are still fresh in our minds. Nor are their teats on land alone. The Marine Corps is not desirous of enlisting men who are not excellent men in every sense of the word. A great majority of the applicants who apply for enlistment are of a manly, clean-cut type that can but reflect great

credit on America's manhood. The Ferguson, Marzinski, Groff. Nays-Marine Corps has a large field from none. which to draw; it does not work one town where, after the best material has been accepted, we have to accept a poorer quality in order to keep up our authorized strength. but a man can apply for enlistment in almost every town and village, as the Marine Corps has a system whereby they appoint some wellknown and reputable doctor as their Official Medical Examiner, These towns are known as Doctor Stations. When a man applies for enlistment at one of these Doctor Stations he is examined, and if the examination is successful, the doctor immediately telegraphs to the headquarters or the recruiting district of which he is a member, transportation for the applicant is immediately wired to the doctor, who then sends the man on to the headquarters office, where he is given the final examination and the service more thoroughly explained to him. They do not leave the headquarters office with the expectation of finding the service a life of perpetual ease and comfort, they have to do their share of frequent guard duty, regular police duty about the barracks or ship, attend the daily drills and inspections, they are given to understand that in time of war the hardships are many. Forced marches, exposure to all kinds of weather, uncomfortable sleeping accommodations, loss of sleep and insufficient food and water. But the hardships of war are unavoidable and must be expected. If, after the service has been explained to him and he understands what he can expect, he is satisfied, he is then transferred to a training station where he i put through a four months' course of training and instruction in the duties of
