The following diseases are among The following are abstracts taken those that must be reported to the Health culosis, erysipelas, typhoid fever, infantile paralysis, meningitis and pneumonia.

Relative to the present epidemic of measles, the secretary of the State Board of Health writes me, in brief, as follows: 1st. "Children who have had measles may be permitted to attend school if isolated from the children allowed to go to school." 2nd, "In case of measles in a family it is not necessary to put an absolute quarantine on a household so the man of the house is unable to go to

After recovery or death from any of the above diseases, you are so to report leemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and to the Health officer, who will then proceed to disinfect, the city paying for same, as per a ruling of the attorney general of the state.

I further wish to have reported any violation of the Pure Food Laws, in which diseased meat or adulterated food or impure milk or milk less than that fixed as standard by law are knowingly sold or offered for sale.

With your co-operation we will enforce these laws, thereby improving public health, and protect our children as well as ourselves.

There's no law compelling owners to give up their property.

To Protect the Birds.

"The importation of aigrettes, egret plumes or so-called osprey plumes, and the feathers, quills, heads, wings, tails skins or parts of skins of wild birds, either raw or manufactured, and not for scientific or educational purposes, is hereby prohibited."

A Warning Sounded.

One of the state banking commis sioners gives a timely warning in connection with the promotion of various enterprises, especially in the smaller cities and villages of Michigan. People have been promoting enterprises who have no direct interest in the communities in which they dispose of stock, and after they get their commission, depart for new fields of labor to repeat their promotion work. Farmers have often met with considerable loss thru these promotion schemes, and banks have found themselves in possession of much poor or slow paper. No benefit has accrued to anyone except the promoters. The coal fields of Michigan occupy an isolated basin covering, approximately, 11,000 square miles in almost the exact center of the Lower Peninsula, They are estimated to have originally contained 12,000,000,000 tons of coal, from which the exhaustion to the close of 1912 has amounted to about 30,000,

The principal coal mining operations are in Bay and Saginaw counties, but a smaller production, chiefly from local mines, is made in Clinton, Ingham and by the Northeastern Michigan Devel-Tuscola counties.

The production of coal in Michigan in 1912, according to E. W. Parker, of the United States Geological Survey, amounted to 1, 206, 230 short tons, valued tons, valued at \$2,791,461, in 1911. In 1900 the lumber cut amounted to 3,462,152,000 board feet, and the state was second in rank of quantity of lumber cut. In 1905 the lumber cut of Michigan had declined to 2,006,670,000 board feet, and the state was third in rank. In 1910 Michigan's lumber cut had fallen to 1,681,081,000 board feet, and the state was ninth in rank. Formerly the refuse from the lumber mills furnished fuel, not only for their own operations but for the saltevaporating plants that were operated in connection with the mills. The exhaustion of the forests and the decline of the lumber industry have created a demand
