Road Bee Day.

That a large percentage of the people of Northeastern Michigan are interested in good roads was manifested last Monday when hundreds of men and teams turned out all along the line from Bay City to Cheboygan and devoted the day to improving the roads in their locality. Hundreds of miles of road which were before well nigh impassible are now in shape to be used, and though the work accomplished will not be lasting without further improvement in the shape of gravel or stone, the results are well worth the labor and time expended. In Tawas township and Tawas City about 25 teams and double that number of men turned out. The efforts of the day were expended upon that portion of the Hemlock road lying between Geo. Hadwin's farm and the corner at John Her's blacksmith shop. This road was turned up and clayed and when it gets worked down will be in much better shape than before. On another page we print the names of the men who turned out with teams and hand labor and assisted in boosting the good roads proposition. The work was in charge of Ernest S. Anschuetz, overseer of District No. 3, who expresses himself as well pleased with what was accomplished. It is altogether probable that another "bee day" will be held in the near future and those who are interested be given another chance to prove their efficiency in this line. It is a matter in which every man and woman in the country should be interested and ready to give their best effort. Good roads will do more for the advancement of a community than any other one thing, and the quicker we can get a system of good roads throughout the state the sooner we will be able to reap the benefits which they bring.

Improving Bay Street.

At the last meeting of the city council it was decided to make some needed improvements on Bay street and when the work is completed we will have an excellent thoroughfare and the appearance of the business part of the city will be much improved. The plan is to grade, curb and gravel that portion of the street between the corner of First street, and to provide suitable gutters and drains to prevent the water overflowing the sidewalks with every hard rain as it has done heretofore. L. H. Belknap and son, Leslie, of Whittemore were engaged to lay out the grade and have been engaged on this work during the week. The probability is that it will not be possible to gravel the entire stretch at once, as the money to finance the work is limited, but a beginning will be made at all events and the work finished as fast as possible.

A Fine Entertainment.

The R. C. Entertainment at the G. A. R. hall, East Tawas, Tuesday evening was very well attended and those present expressed themselves as very well pleased with the program rendered.

The principal part of the entertainment consisted of some exceptional blackboard work by L. H. Emerson of Tawas City. Mr. Emerson demonstrated his versatility by writing words backward; writing two different words at the same time, one in the usual manner and the other backwards; writing a verse of Mary's Little Lamb from the last letter of the last word backward while repeating a four verse poem entitled "Schust der Same," and completing the writing of the verse while singing "Uncle Ned."

High School Field Meet.

Under a cloudless sky on a best possible day Oscoda won the field meet and relay race of the annual Iosco County Schools Athletic Association last Saturday at Tawas Beach.

It was Oscoda from beginning to end, the only variance being in the running high jump. Louks of Tawas City tying Trigger of Oscoda for first. In this event Mr. Trigger very courteously offered Mr. Louks the medal for first without drawing for it. Trigger of Oscoda won the gold medal for individual work, getting 29 points. He was closely followed by McKenna with 23 points. Jerry Marks garnered 13 points. Tawas City and Oscoda were the only schools to enter in the relay, Oscoda winning handily, though it was close enough to be interesting. This is Oscoda's third consecutive victory in the meet and her second in the relay race.

Although his team mates made 10 errors behind him he tightened up in the pinches and held them to three runs. Moore and Thompson pulled off a couple of spectacular running catches in the short field that brought the fans to their feet. McGuire of East Tawas made a sensational catch of Moore's hard hit drive in the third that cut off two scores and ended the inning. Crandall did the heavy hitting, his two hits being doubles. Fair Races.

The premium list for the Iosco county fair, which will be held Sept. 24, 25 and 26, has been revised and the amount of the purses and premiums materially increased.

The race program will consist of a farmers' running race and a colt race on the second day of the fair. The races are open to horses owned in the county only. The colt race is a new feature, and all colts four years old and under are eligible. There are many good colts of this age owned in the county, and a good field should be entered. On the last day of the fair there will be a free-for-all trot or pace and a free-for-all running race, both of which are open to horses owned anywhere. The premiums in the live stock and other departments have been increased, which should have the effect of largely increasing the entries over previous years. The premium lists will be out in the near future, and may be had on application to any of the society's officers.

The "arson squad" of the militant suffragettes in England is still busy and several valuable buildings have been burned through their efforts during the past week. By their acts of lawlessness and crime these women are disgracing and discrediting the cause of suffrage, not only in their own country but throughout the world. They should receive the same punishment for their acts that any other criminal would receive, for in using leniency with them the English government will only encourage them in further depredations. If, when imprisoned, they go on a "hunger strike," let a few of them starve rather than to en-

courage further violations of law by releasing them. Dangerous cases require strong measures, and the militant suffragettes of England are certainly dangerous. Even human life is not safe in their fanatical hands, as witness the unprovoked assault upon a Baptist minister a few days ago because he resembled Chancellor Lloyd-George. It is not strange that the English government refuses to give the ballot into the hands of fanatics such as these women have proven themselves to be.

Former President Taft's plan to submit to arbitration all international questions on which the various countries could not agree, is not finding favor in these days. The questions of Panama canal tolls and Japanese exclusion have put a different aspect on the matter and the United States senate has refused to put its seal of approval on the renewal of arbitration treaties with Great Britain, Italy and Spain. There are about 20 other such treaties of the same character which will soon expire and it is probable that they also will not be renewed without difficulty.

As a warning to boards of review throughout the state that the tax commission would not stand for any tampering with the assessments as made by them, the commission reviewed the rolls of the city of Saginaw last week and replaced \$800,000 valuation which the board of review had cut from the assessments as made by the commission. The commission evidently does not mean to have its work undone by local authorities.

In order to make the parcel post more useful to its patrons a C. O. D. feature is to be added on July 1, and it is reported that the weight limit of parcels is also to be raised to 20 pounds. The postoffice department is striving to make the system more efficient as fast as possible and in the near future the United States will undoubtedly have the most complete system of parcel post in the world.

The lobby investigation now being conducted by a committee of the U. S. senate seems to have stirred up a hornet's nest and several of the senators are being "stung."

President Wilson has made a hit with the base ball fans in the capital by frequently attending the base ball games in that city.

If every day could be made a "bee" day, Michigan would soon have a system of roads of which she might be proud.

Co-ordination of the World.

In a recent address before the International Congress of Historical Studies, the Hon. James Bryce predicted that by the year 2000 more than nine-tenths of the human race will speak less than twenty languages. European races now own or control virtually the entire surface of the earth, except the territories of China and Japan; and a few European languages have already overspread all the countries, except Asia. Even there it seems probable that before long the learned classes will use European languages and come in closer touch with European ideas. The new forces of science have brought remote parts of the earth together, and the movements of politics, of economics, and of thought in each region seem destined to become more closely interwoven with those of every other region. — Youth's Companion.

Surveying Trunk Lines.

Preliminary surveying of the route of Michigan's proposed new 3,000 mile trunk road, which will traverse the state north and south and east and west, will be started by engineers of the state highway department about June 15. In order to handle the increased duties through the enactment of the trunk road measure, at least two other engineers will be engaged for the highway commissioner's staff.

It is not thought by the commissioner that much actual road building on the trunk line will be done this year. Work during 1913 will be chiefly devoted to mapping out plans for the furtherance of construction in 1914 and thereafter.

Radium in Spring Waters.

That nearly all spring waters are in some degree radio-active, is the opinion of Prof. Fisher of the Michigan College of Mines, who has experimented considerably with the radio activity of minerals and spring waters. There has been considerable interest of late years in this property of spring water and mine water, and many samples have been sent into the college for analysis. A simple test for the presence of radium is to expose to the material either a photographic or a special X-Ray plate. Of the forty minerals which Prof. Fisher and Seaman found to contain radium, or some of the allied elements—helium, thorium, etc., some affected the plate exposed to them in two seconds, some only after several hours. It is not probable that the radio-activity of any spring waters in this section is of any commercial significance.

Spraying Potatoes Pays.

Food products are high in price, with every evidence of their being still higher. Potatoes are one of the most staple articles of consumption. They are a profitable crop where properly grown. They will give a return upon the investment of time, money and labor more quickly than most other farm crops. The United States produce annually over three hundred million bushels. By spraying the vines with Bordeaux mixture at least three times during the season to prevent fungus diseases and to give the vines the necessary vigor to mature the large tubers and plenty of them—adding Paris green to the Bordeaux if the bugs appear—would increase America's annual production at least one hundred million of bushels. The consumption of potatoes is becoming greater each year, because of constantly increasing population and for the reason that potatoes as a food product contain a higher food value, in proportion to cost, than other food products.

In view of this array of positively undeniable facts potato growers should spray, and spray well, with Bordeaux mixture, adding Paris green if needed. The Michigan experiment station regards spraying as a proper and profitable procedure, which, if omitted, may result in the loss of the crop.

Spraying with Bordeaux mixture influences the crop in the following ways: The structure of the leaf shows a slight increase in thickness and in strength, and so offers more resistance to the growth of disease spores. The green coloring matter of the leaf stem is increased.

The transpiration of moisture is greater in sprayed plants. Food is moved from the roots to the leaves in water, the food is worked over and the water is given off, the more food laden moisture passing through, the greater the growth. Taking in of food from the air by the leaves is much greater.

The duration of the leaves and vines is greater. The tuber production is increased, due to increase in size of the tubers and the number of tubers per plant.

The dry matter is increased. It is important that potato growers study these results and decide to spray, and when doing so to secure the very best results use only properly prepared Bordeaux mixture, one that contains a high content of copper hydrate, the necessary element in Bordeaux mixture.
