Board called to order at 10:30 o'clock a. m. by Thos F Robinson, who ordered the clerk to call the roll.

The Hon. Board of Supervisors of Iosco County, Mich.:
Gentlemen:—This is to certify that at an adjourned regular meeting of the common council of the city of East Tawas, held at city hall, Friday, Oct. 10, 1913, Mr. John W Tait was appointed to represent the 31 ward of said city as supervisor for the term ending at the next election, in place of Albert Scriber, who is absent from the city.

The clerk placed before the board the auditor general's statement of Iosco county's proportion of the state tax to be raised. Same referred to committee on finance and apportionment.
To the Hon. Board of Supervisors:
Gentlemen:—You are hereby notified that at a meeting of the board of county commissioners of Iosco county held at the court house on Monday, the 22d day of September, 1913, the following resolution was passed:
Resolved, That the board of supervisors of Iosco county be requested to appropriate a sum of \$300.00 per one thousand dollars of the assessed valuation of Iosco county for the year 1912, on the several tax rolls of the county, for county roads, for the ensuing two years, at this session, and as a half cent drawing a salary of \$400.00 per year for the preceding two years, which is not a sufficient salary to pay for the amount of work attached to this office. Therefore, ask your honorable board to fix a reasonable salary for the office of county drain commissioner, and make it at least \$500.00 per annum.

ANNUAL REPORT OF COUNTY DRAIN COMMISSIONER.
To the Honorable Board of Supervisors, of Iosco County:
Gentlemen:—In compliance with the provisions of the Statute in such case made and provided, I have the honor to submit my Annual Report as County Drain Commissioner for the period from the 1st day of October, A. D. 1912, to the 1st day of October, A. D. 1913. The following named drains were left unfinished at the date of my last report to-wit: The County Line Drain, commencing on the west bank of the west branch of Au Gres river, on the north side of County line road between Turner and Sherman Twps., thence running west along said County line road a distance of 173.14 chs.
Said drain has all been completed except from Sta. 70 to Sta. 81, a distance of 90 rods, said drain has as yet been finished for the reason that the land owners along said drain made application to have that part discontinued, and have it tiled, applicants claiming that on account of it being a deep cut from Sta. 70 to Sta. 81 it would raise road bed too much by putting the excavations from an open drain on same.
Application was granted and we gave the contractor permission to put in 12-inch tile, and I expect contract will be completed by the 1st of November.
The following named Drains have been begun by me, during the year, and are only partly completed, to-wit: The Pringle drain, commencing at the Gregory drain on north side of highway between Secs. 21 and 28, T. 21 N., R. 6 East, thence running west along said section line to section line between Secs. 21 and 20, thence north along said section on east side about 100 rods, thence across Sec. 20 in a northerly direction to Sec. 21, N. E. Total length of drain is 11,853 feet. Drain will be completed by the 1st of Oct., 1913.
(No. 2). The East branch drain commencing at a point where D. & M. Railway crosses East Branch of Au Gres river in Sec. 10, thence southerly following course of river between Secs. 10, 15, 14 and 23, this part of drain is to have drift wood removed. Thence commencing at a point on the south side of Sec. 24, T. 21 N., R. 6 East, thence running in a southeasterly direction to place of ending, which is 1020 feet east and 300 feet north of the 14 post on the south side of Sec. 25; this part of drain is to be 20 feet to the bottom. I expect contract of taking out the drift wood on this drain, completed by the 10th of Nov., 1913, and the dredge cut on same drain has not been completed for the reason that the contractor, Mr. L. L. Hibbs, constructed a dredge and it proved out to be a failure, and since purchased a dredge, and has same set up and started work dredging on the 11th of Oct, and I expect contract completed by the 1st of Nov., 1913. Total length of dredge cut is to be 6889 feet.
(No. 3). The Burleigh Drain commencing on the west bank of the Au Gres river, the corner of beginning south 289 15 east 1500 feet of the 1-4 post between Secs. 30 and 2, T. 21 N., R. 6 East, thence running in a northerly direction to the corner of Secs. 34 and 27, that being place of beginning of Sherman and Burleigh Twps., thence across Sec. 36, 35, and Northeast corner of Sec. 34, Burleigh Twp., to section line between Secs. 34 and 27, that being place of ending. Contractor on same coming along nicely, has 120 rods completed. Total length of drain is 40,008 feet.
The following named drains have been applied for, but not established, during the year, for the reasons given in each instance, to-wit: The Alabaster Drain, commencing 20 feet east of section line common to Secs. 21 and 22, T. 21 N., R. 7 East, thence running south to the County line between Alabaster and Wilber Twps., thence west along County line of Secs. 1 and 2, Town 20 N., R. 7 East; thence south to the sec. corner of Secs. 1, 2, 11, and 12, thence south to the 1-4 post common to Secs. 11 and 12, and thence in a southeasterly direction to Saginaw bay, being in all 23061.7 feet.
Above mentioned drain has not been established for the reason that I could not get the Drain Comm. from Arenac county to act, as it is a joint drain between Iosco and Arenac counties, and the Committee on the counties must act jointly on all matters pertaining to said drain, it appears that the Commissioner of Arenac county would not act on Alabaster drain for the reason that some of the land owners of Arenac county are getting up an application for a drain to tap the same in Alabaster drain where it crosses the County line, said Comm. called a joint meeting of the Township Boards of the townships of Alabaster, Arenac, and Sherman, and acted on section application, and the boards by majority vote determined against the proposed drain, but agreed to act favorably on application for a branch drain from Alabaster drain running west to a point one-half mile east of the east branch River and applicants agreed to get up a petition for same, and I have been waiting for said petition, and the near future I will proceed to establish the Alabaster drain.
(No. 2). An application for a drain from Augustus, and others from Tawas Twp., was not located for the reason that some of the applicants asked me not to proceed to establish same until I got further notice from said applicants, and they were together and dig the drain, and save the cost of survey and advertising.
And I do hereby certify, That the above embraces a full and true report of all the drains constructed, finished, or begun under my supervision, or applied for during the year ending Oct. 1, 1913, and that the financial statement of each drain, submitted herewith is true and correct.

ANNUAL REPORT OF COUNTY DRAIN COMMISSIONER.
To the Honorable Board of Supervisors, of Iosco County:
Gentlemen:—In compliance with the provisions of the Statute in such case made and provided, I have the honor to submit my Annual Report as County Drain Commissioner for the period from the 1st day of October, A. D. 1912, to the 1st day of October, A. D. 1913. The following named drains were left unfinished at the date of my last report to-wit: The County Line Drain, commencing on the west bank of the west branch of Au Gres river, on the north side of County line road between Turner and Sherman Twps., thence running west along said County line road a distance of 173.14 chs.
Said drain has all been completed except from Sta. 70 to Sta. 81, a distance of 90 rods, said drain has as yet been finished for the reason that the land owners along said drain made application to have that part discontinued, and have it tiled, applicants claiming that on account of it being a deep cut from Sta. 70 to Sta. 81 it would raise road bed too much by putting the excavations from an open drain on same.
Application was granted and we gave the contractor permission to put in 12-inch tile, and I expect contract will be completed by the 1st of November.
The following named Drains have been begun by me, during the year, and are only partly completed, to-wit: The Pringle drain, commencing at the Gregory drain on north side of highway between Secs. 21 and 28, T. 21 N., R. 6 East, thence running west along said section line to section line between Secs. 21 and 20, thence north along said section on east side about 100 rods, thence across Sec. 20 in a northerly direction to Sec. 21, N. E. Total length of drain is 11,853 feet. Drain will be completed by the 1st of Oct., 1913.
(No. 2). The East branch drain commencing at a point where D. & M. Railway crosses East Branch of Au Gres river in Sec. 10, thence southerly following course of river between Secs. 10, 15, 14 and 23, this part of drain is to have drift wood removed. Thence commencing at a point on the south side of Sec. 24, T. 21 N., R. 6 East, thence running in a southeasterly direction to place of ending, which is 1020 feet east and 300 feet north of the 14 post on the south side of Sec. 25; this part of drain is to be 20 feet to the bottom. I expect contract of taking out the drift wood on this drain, completed by the 10th of Nov., 1913, and the dredge cut on same drain has not been completed for the reason that the contractor, Mr. L. L. Hibbs, constructed a dredge and it proved out to be a failure, and since purchased a dredge, and has same set up and started work dredging on the 11th of Oct, and I expect contract completed by the 1st of Nov., 1913. Total length of dredge cut is to be 6889 feet.
(No. 3). The Burleigh Drain commencing on the west bank of the Au Gres river, the corner of beginning south 289 15 east 1500 feet of the 1-4 post between Secs. 30 and 2, T. 21 N., R. 6 East, thence running in a northerly direction to the corner of Secs. 34 and 27, that being place of beginning of Sherman and Burleigh Twps., thence across Sec. 36, 35, and Northeast corner of Sec. 34, Burleigh Twp., to section line between Secs. 34 and 27, that being place of ending. Contractor on same coming along nicely, has 120 rods completed. Total length of drain is 40,008 feet.
The following named drains have been applied for, but not established, during the year, for the reasons given in each instance, to-wit: The Alabaster Drain, commencing 20 feet east of section line common to Secs. 21 and 22, T. 21 N., R. 7 East, thence running south to the County line between Alabaster and Wilber Twps., thence west along County line of Secs. 1 and 2, Town 20 N., R. 7 East; thence south to the sec. corner of Secs. 1, 2, 11, and 12, thence south to the 1-4 post common to Secs. 11 and 12, and thence in a southeasterly direction to Saginaw bay, being in all 23061.7 feet.
Above mentioned drain has not been established for the reason that I could not get the Drain Comm. from Arenac county to act, as it is a joint drain between Iosco and Arenac counties, and the Committee on the counties must act jointly on all matters pertaining to said drain, it appears that the Commissioner of Arenac county would not act on Alabaster drain for the reason that some of the land owners of Arenac county are getting up an application for a drain to tap the same in Alabaster drain where it crosses the County line, said Comm. called a joint meeting of the Township Boards of the townships of Alabaster, Arenac, and Sherman, and acted on section application, and the boards by majority vote determined against the proposed drain, but agreed to act favorably on application for a branch drain from Alabaster drain running west to a point one-half mile east of the east branch River and applicants agreed to get up a petition for same, and I have been waiting for said petition, and the near future I will proceed to establish the Alabaster drain.
(No. 2). An application for a drain from Augustus, and others from Tawas Twp., was not located for the reason that some of the applicants asked me not to proceed to establish same until I got further notice from said applicants, and they were together and dig the drain, and save the cost of survey and advertising.
And I do hereby certify, That the above embraces a full and true report of all the drains constructed, finished, or begun under my supervision, or applied for during the year ending Oct. 1, 1913, and that the financial statement of each drain, submitted herewith is true and correct.
