





Too strong a light is just as trying to the eyes as too weak an illumination. A north light is the best, being soft and steady. All desks near windows should be so placed so that the light comes from the left side. The old rule given for reading and writing that the light should come obliquely over the left shoulder, well illustrates ordinary requirements. In the modern home the incandescent electric lamps hold first place as an illuminant. 


