heifer calves should be raised on the modern dairy farm. If a bull of firstclass breeding and good individuality costs too much, a number of neighbors may club together and buy a bull of better quality than any one of them alone could afford. In many localities bull associations have been formed to meet just such conditions. Dairying can never become highly profitable until the scrub bull is forever banished from our dairy farms. This includes the registered scrub.

If dairying is to provide either pleasure or profit, the unprofitable cow must be disposed of. The wellbred, high producer that takes her place must be properly and economically fed and cared for. Cow-testing associations have demonstrated that the feed of the dairy herd can sometimes be selected, balanced, and distributed among the individual cows in such a way as to decrease feed costs one-third and at the same time increase milk production.

No one should expect to derive either pleasure or profit from a scrub herd kept in a poorly lighted, unclean, and fly-infested stable, or from a herd which obtains its chief sustenance from a near-by stack of wheat straw. Fortunately such conditions are rapidly disappearing and in some localities have entirely disappeared.

Economy of production, however, is only half of the dairyman's problem. The truly efficient manager of a dairy farm must furnish a first-class product, then he must go a step further and get a price that corresponds to the quality of the article produced. Hightesting ilk should bring a higher price than low-testing milk, and it is not good policy to sell the former at a flat rate per hundred pounds, regardless of quality. High-grade dairy products should always command a price in accordance with their quality.

If a dairyman's business is well conducted it becomes highly interesting and fairly profitable. The successful dairyman drives his business, the business does not drive him; he does not merely keep cows, but makes the cows keep him. Such a dairyman may be expected to manage his farm the orchestra always worry people so that he and his family can get both pleasure and profit therefrom.

MOST DELICIOUS OF SOUPS French Preparations That Are Among the Best in the Catalogue of Cooks Who Know.

French Bouillie-An acceptable soup for early warm days is the French bouillie, made of thickened milk. Put in a saucepan two tablespoonfuls of wheat flour, a dessertspoonful of sugar and a teaspoonful of salt. Mix to a smooth paste and add a quart of hot milk. Cook in a double boiler until thickened and serve with crisp croutons and a dash of pepper. The hot milk will be found stimulating, yet delicate, proving just the soup one requires for a spring day. Potage a 'la Crecy-Scrape four

large carrots and cut fine. Add two potatoes peeled and diced, two onions and two stalks of celery cut fine and fry brown in good beef drippings. Then put into a saucepan with a quart of boiling water and cook until all the vegetables are tender. Press through a coarse sieve and re-

turn to the fire with the addition of a tablespoonful of butter, a half tablespoonful of salt, two cloves, pepper to season and a tablespoonful of minced scalded and thickened with a teaspoonful of cornstarch, add to the soup and serve with croutons.
