

#### Beautiful Isle of Thasos.

Thasos is the most northerly and the most beautiful of all the Aegean islands. It has a purely Greek popu lation, but practically belongs to the khedives of Egypt. This dates from the days of Mohammed Ali, the common sailor who rose to a throne. He was a native of Thasos, for which he always cherished strong affection, and received his beloved island as a gift from the sultan. Formerly Thasos was famous for gold and marble, but latterly large quantities of timber from the khedivial fir forests have been exported to Egypt. In the present war Thasos occupies an important strategic position, commanding the port of Kavalla, on the opposite mainland, and the Germans, who "thought of everything," have tried to establish themselves there by the "peaceful penetration" of a strong colony.
