## PROHIBITION AND HOME RULE

There are really four propositions involved in that part of the forthcoming election which concerns prohibition. They are: The continuance of the present license system; the inauguration of state-wide prohibition; the continuance of the present county option law; the inauguration of "home rule."

Some misconceptions are abroad as to what these varying propositions mean. There is especially a confusion as to what constitutes "home rule." It may be worth while, therefore, to consider the four matters each under its own head.

1. A vote "No" on prohibition affects no other proposition than prohibition. It simply stands for a retention of the present license system. It simply means that the liquor laws and regulations shall remain as they are. It is nothing more nor less than a vote against state-wide prohibition.

2. A vote "Yes" on prohibition signifies that the person casting the vote wishes to abolish the present system of liquor license, thus abolishing the legalized liquor traffic in Michigan. It is a vote designed to wipe out license "home rule," county option and all other devices in one blanket prohibition affecting the entire state.

3. A vote "No" on so-called "home rule" is a vote that favors leaving the present county-option unit as it is. That is to say, under the present law each county is made the arbiter of its own liquor matters. If it wants saloons it can have them. If it does not want them, it can vote them out. The advocates of "home rule" want to break up this county-option unit. They want to reduce the voting unit to the townships, so that instead of an entire county being "wet" or "dry," the

various townships and villages in the county will be "wet" or "dry" as they choose.

4. A vote "Yes" on "home rule" means the breaking down of the present county option unit; it means a reduction of the territory involved in a vote—so that instead of one county being "dry" and another "wet" as now, one village in the county may be "wet" and the next village in the same county be "dry."

Observe, that a vote on "home rule" is a separate thing, from a vote on prohibition. The two propositions are distinct. A voter may vote against prohibition and at the same time against "home rule." But if he should vote for prohibition and for home rule, the two votes would nullify each other. A vote for "home rule" represents a weakening of the prohibitory powers of the counties. It represents a step down from the present prohibitory status of many places in the state.

The term "home rule" itself is misleading. County rule is "home rule." So would state-wide rule be "home rule." "Home rule" is the power of the unit asking for it, to rule itself. Counties asked for that power, and got it; they now have it; they have used it wisely. Now the people of the state, by petition, have asked that a vote be taken on state-wide rule as regards the liquor question.

"Home rule" is, of course, the liquor interests' own proposition. They are behind it. But the voter is not in a dilemma. If he does not approve prohibition, he is not thereby compelled to approve "home rule." If he cannot vote to change matters as the prohibitionist would like them to be changed, he is not therefore under the necessity of voting to change matters as the liquor interests would like them to be changed.

If a man votes "No" both on prohibition and "home rule," he votes to retain the present system.

If a man votes "Yes" on prohibition, he votes to change the present system on the side of abolition.

If a man votes "Yes" on "home rule" he votes to change the present system on the side of destroying the present county power to regulate, on a county basis, its own saloon problems.

### MARKET SERVICE FOR LIVE STOCK SHIPPERS.

East Lansing, Mich., Oct. 24.—Jas. N. McBride, Markets Director, Michigan Agricultural college, has been advised that often times market conditions for the surplus live-stock in the remote sections from markets are not entirely satisfactory. To help solve the problem the Michigan Director of Markets, announced that in cases where carloads can be furnished and the animals can be properly marked for identification, consignments can be made to commission houses in Detroit or Buffalo, whose names and addresses will be furnished upon application to the director. Local railway agents are generally glad to furnish information as to rates and weights.

The director reports that there is a call for stockers in the southern counties of Michigan and reliable buyers will be advised as to where stock can be had. The director suggests that community action can often locate carload lots, which will be to the advantage of all concerned.

Both farmers and buyers interested in the sale of livestock are urged to communicate with the Markets Department of the Agricultural College at East Lansing.

The department is prepared to ren-

der a similar service in connection with potatoes, beans and other crops.

### MacGillis Makes Statement

To Iosco County Voters:

Necessarily in political campaigns, inquiries are raised and misunderstandings should be corrected officially, by the candidates, in generous spirit. I have been asked whether or not it is true that I am affiliated with any faction in this county. I here and now state with such definiteness as to leave no room for controversy, that I am not allied with any faction in this county or district. This statement should forever set at rest any and all inquiry in that direction. I will give my reasons, in part, for withholding from factional connection. If elected circuit judge, I should accept the investment of that office with a mind free from factional bias. Often the judge is, later, the arbiter of matters growing from factional struggles. It will be well for the cause of justice if he is not prejudiced in advance by participation in the very factionalism which enters into the cause which he is to judge. If there is a better way than this, then I am open to conviction. The rare quality of preserving one's mind free from community contests and factional strife is a recognized qualifying attribute of a judge. Is this not sufficient as a reason for my desire to remain free from all factionalism? I believe that it is. There let it remain. Friends nor enemies could ask more.

In answer to other matters inquired of, I will state that I am a protestant, was reared a protestant by protestant parents. I was born in Harrisville, Alcona county, Jan. 1, 1875. I have always been a resident of the 23rd judicial district.

# And Vote "No"

On the So-called "Home Rule" Amendment, Which Destroys County Local Option---It Reads:

A proposed amendment to Article VIII of the constitution, by adding a section thereto, to be known as Section 30, and to read as follows:

"Section 30. Every incorporated city, every incorporated village and every organized township (meaning thereby all that part of a township outside the limits of an incorporated city or village located partly or wholly therein) shall each have the right to determine by a majority vote of the electors thereof, whether or not there shall be prohibited therein the manufacture and sale of malt, brewed, fermented, vinous, distilled or intoxicating liquors.

Appropriate legislation shall be enacted to enforce and make effective the provisions of this section and, until such legislation is enacted, existing local option and regulatory laws on this subject shall continue in force; but no existing law inconsistent with the provisions of this section shall continue in force after January 1, 1919."

Your committee on Drains and Ditches respectfully submit the following as their report:  
On Oct. 2nd we met and proceeded to view drain known as Alabaster & Whitney drain, now under construction, said drain beginning in Whitney township, Aracene county on section line between sections 12 and 13, and terminating in Alabaster township at the south 1/2 post between sections 12 and 22. The distance between the two points mentioned is 1434 rods. At the outlet of said drain we find that that portion is partly caved in on account of the cut being through a sand ridge. We believe that portion should be reclaimed as soon as possible for the general benefit of the drain. That portion of drain from cave in to where it enters what is known as the Au Gres swamp, we found in good condition. From that point to where the dredge was at work, the drain was only partly finished on account of cave-ins. The contractor informed us that he would complete said portion as soon as the surface would freeze enough to prevent cave-ins.  
Total cost of drain is \$15,772.42. We are informed that this drain will be completed by Jan. 1, 1917.

On the same day we also proceeded to view the work being done on Gregory drain located in Sherman township, which is being widened, deepened and straightened, and we found that about 1/2 mile had been completed according to specifications.

We also find that the outlet of the Elm Creek drain which is the outlet of the Gregory drain, needs cleaning in order to give a free flow of water to said Gregory drain. Total length of Gregory drain including Stone extension is 1,566 rods. Total cost, \$2,936.92.

## What Michigan Farmers Think About The Saloon Men's Fake "Home Rule" Amendment

Therefore Resolved, by the Executive Committee of the State Grange, acting for and with the full authority of that body between its annual sessions, that the action of the said person is entirely out of harmony with the sentiment and intent of the State Grange and that until state-wide prohibition of the liquor traffic becomes an actual fact, we are unalterably opposed to any decrease in the unit of territory for local option below the county and call upon every member in our order and every lover of sobriety, good government and clean manhood to work earnestly and persistently from now until the polls close on the evening of November 7 against this misleading and pernicious measure and we urge every voter to vote "NO" on this so-called "Home Rule" amendment, which is but another attempt to destroy what we have already gained in the fight against the saloon.

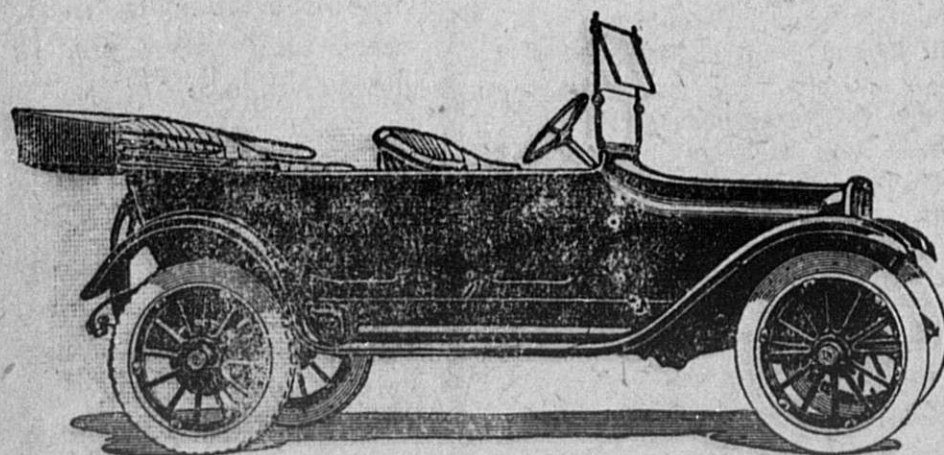
