WHY WE ARE AT WAR







HOME CANNED GOODS WILL NOT BE SEIZED

East Lansing, Mich., Sept. 25 .-"There is no truth to many widespread rumors that the government intends to confiscate home canned goods for its use," stated R. J. Baldwin, Extension Director for the Michigan Agricultural college, in a press notice sent out today. "Many rumors have been circulated," said Mr. Baldwin, "to the effect that the government has been urging the canning, drying and preserving of fruits and vegetables so that they will be in convenient form for the government to handle and transport when it takes them away from the people. "Many people seem to have the

opinion that the government intends to take away from each family all canned goods except that actually needed by the family itself. "No such course has ever been con-

templated by the government. On the contrary, both the department of agriculture and the food administration are strongly urging housewives to can and preserve, especially at this time, all surplus fruits and vegetables in order that each household may have a cheap and plentiful supply of food."
