



#### NEW ELECTION LAW

Another important law which was passed last year and is now in effect is the new registration law for voters at elections and primaries. The new law provides that persons eligible to registration can do so in the future at any time by calling at the office of the township clerk. Persons who wish to vote at the forthcoming spring elections either in the city or township should bear this fact in mind and dent of Iosco county for about fifty leave their name with the city or townships clerks.
