> "If any person offering to vote shall be challenged as unqualified by any inspector, or any elector qualified to vote at that poll, he shall be sworn to answer truthfully all questions put to him touching his quaifications as an elector. Any one of the inspectors may administer the oath to a person whose vote has been challenged. Any inspector or qualified voter at that poll, may question said person as to his constitutional qualifications as an elector. If the answers to questions put to such person shall show that he is a qualified voter at that poll, his ballot shall be received: otherwise not. If any one of his answers concerning a material matter shall not be true, he shall, on conviction, be deemed guilty of perjury."

The Division Surgeon has impressed the State Board of Health with the necessity for keeping the communicable diseases under strict control, now that we are at war. > The law requires physicians and citizens to supply the information and Health is unable to know where to direct its efforts for disease control. Physicians and citizens who know of the presence of any of these diseases should report at once to the Health Officer in the jurisdiction in which the case may be. The regulations of the State Board require the isolation of all cases, and health officers and citizens should comply with these regulations in order that the wide prevalence of these diseases may be reduced. The presence of these diseases among our soldiers will not help win the war. In case no physician is called to diagnose the case, it is the duty of the householder in ment having been a student in wirewhich the case exists, to make the report to the health officer. While there is a penalty attached for failure to make the reports, the state board of health would rather appeal to the patriotic sense of duty of the citizens, rather than resort to legal action. 


