TION AGAIN OPERATED After long years of abandonment the former state sub-experiment station at Grayling is again in op-

At the April session of the state board of agriculture, at the request Development bureau authorized the expending of a small amount of money in carrying on in an authenstration work at the old

grounds. This work is to be under the direction of Dean Shaw, director of the experiment station, and Dr. M M. McCool, professor of soils, in cooperation with the Northeastern Michigan Development bureau.

On our way we came in contact with scenes of destruction of various little towns and the trenches used by the French and American troops. While pushing the Hun from the great city of St. Mihiel. As we landed the city appeared to be a heap of stone, and the sight was enough to boil the blood in the veins of any human being. After a short stay, we headed toward Verdun, but before going into details of this great and most historic city I must say that the ground between the above mentioned cities in a sight that cannot be explained. While on our way we passed over the hill so often read about No. 204. Here is where our eyes never blinked. 
