They show that the country will never get on a normal basis of prices by continuous increases in wages, which simply raise all prices higher. Some of the more broad guaged labor leaders are of the same opinion, and they are pointing out to their followers that constant increases in wages only react against the wage earners, and in effect make them profiteers on each other. But these conservative labor leaders find it difficult to get a hearing. The members of their unions are more ready to listen to the leaders who promise to get higher wages for them.

SWEET CLOVER AND VETCH Mr. J. W. Nicolson, crop specialist was in the county studying the two crops mentioned above. They are the two biggest paying crops in Iosco county at the present time. Vetch is omething every farmer should grow who is on lighter soil, because it is a soil builder, and there is a tremendous demand for the seed. If you will want any seed to try out this year it must be secured at once, as the demand is such that it will be disposed of within a week. There are thirteen growers in the county of which the agent knows, and there should be three hundred. The income per acre often runs up to \$75 or more in addition to the crop it is raised in, such as rye, winter or spring wheat.

If you wish to see some sweet clover or wish to know that it will do ask Mr. Oscar Fahselt on the Plank road or Mr. Follett or Mr. Salisbury at Hale. Weeping Stove Pipes.

Weeping stove pipes, from the joints of which a tarlike liquid leaks out, is often a difficult trouble to remedy. It is due to insufficient draft. The smoke moving slowly through the pipes condenses, and the liquid so formed oozes out at the joints of the pipes. Sometimes having the pipes on an incline, upwards towards the chimney, will increase the draft. Some find that a little opening in the pipe next the chimnet, with a sliding cover, increases the draft up the chimney, when open, and so causes the smoke to pass out quickly. It all comes to this: Increase the draft and the heat of the pipes, and so cause the smoke to pass out so quickly that it cannot cool and condense in the pipes.
