The International.

Elsewhere in this issue appears a short resume of Michigan winnings in the grain department of the International. Michigan swept away a majority of the premiums offered on rye with the celebrated Rosen rye, and also a majority of the premiums offered on soft red winter wheat with the celebrated Red Rock wheat. Other states won most of the corn and hay premiums, but Michigan had good exhibits in each. The vetch industry was represented by seed grown in Iosco county. Michigan livestock proved to be good enougt to be right up among the winners. In every degrain, and in attendance and interest the 1919 International, the Twentieth largest and best ever.





The knight then turned to the ladies. who sat at a table apart, and "bade her who was master over her husband," sing a carol. The legend says that forthwith "the women fell all to singing, that there was never heard such a catter-walling piece of musicke."


