Ordinance No. 69  
An ordinance to be termed the Annual Appropriation Bill, making provisions for and appropriating the several amounts requested to defray the expenditures and liabilities of the city of Tawas City for the ensuing fiscal year.

The City of Tawas City ordains:  
Section 1. That there shall be raised upon the taxable property of the city of Tawas City the following sums: The sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) which amount so raised shall be placed in and constitute the contingent fund; also the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) which amount so raised shall be placed in and constitute the general street fund; also the sum of Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$750.00) which amount so raised shall be placed in and constitute the fund to take care of special bridge orders; also the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) which amount so raised shall be placed in and constitute the fund to take care of interest on bonds.

Section 2. The foregoing appropriations and provisions are made and requested to defray the expenditures and liabilities of the corporation of the city of Tawas City, Mich., for the ensuing fiscal year, payable from the several funds heretofore mentioned and set forth, and it is hereby determined that the above amounts are necessary to be raised by levy and to be assessed upon the tax rolls of said city for the year 1920, and to be paid into the several general funds the object and purpose of which is heretofore specified and set forth, together with the amounts appropriated for the object or purpose of each of the general funds. This ordinance is in conformance with Chapter XXX of the compiled laws of 1915.

Section 3. This ordinance is enacted and ordered to take immediate effect.

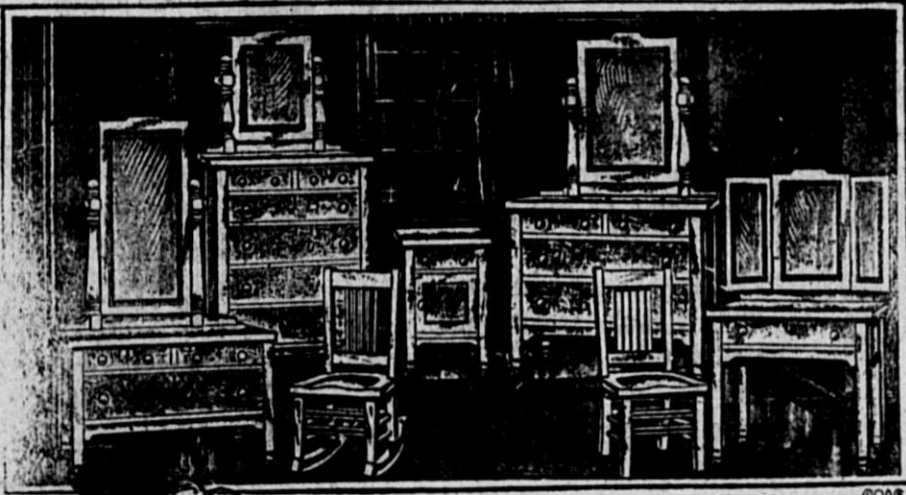

 To the qualified electors of the City of Tawas City, Michigan:  
 Notice is hereby given to all men and women electors of said city, that in conformity with the statutes of the State of Michigan relating to registration, I, the undersigned clerk of said city, will, upon any day except Sunday and a legal holiday, or the day of any election, receive for registration the name of any legal voter in said city not already registered, who may apply to me personally for such registration, or who may make such application by mail or messenger using the provisions of Act No. 7, Public Acts of 1919, except that I can receive no names for registration during the time intervening between the second Saturday before any general or special election or official primary election and the day of such election.

October 23, 1920, Last Day for General Registration for Election No. 2  
 All electors not already registered and intending to vote at said election should make application to me on or before the 23rd day of October, A. D. 1920.  
 Notice is further hereby given that I will be at Tawas Butter Co. Office on Oct. 9 and Oct. 16, 1920 from 8 o'clock a. m. until 8 o'clock p. m. on each said day for the purpose of reviewing the registration and registering such of the qualified electors in said city as shall appear and apply therefor. The name of no person but an actual resident of the precinct at the time of registration and entitled under the constitution, if remaining such resident, to vote at the next election shall be entered in the registration book.

**Registration of Absentee by Oath**

 Any registered and qualified voter who has removed from one election precinct of a city to another election precinct of the same city shall have the right, on any day previous to election day, on application to the City Clerk, to have his or her name transferred from the registration book of the precinct from which he or she has removed to the registration book of the precinct in which he or she then resides. Such elector shall have the right to have such transfer made on election day by obtaining from the board of inspectors of election of the precinct from which he or she has removed a certificate of transfer and presenting the said certificate to the board of election inspectors of the precinct in which he or she then resides.
