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### DEATH OF MRS. CHAS. FOWLER

Mrs. Charles Fowler died at her home in this city on Tuesday evening, Aug. 29, after an illness lasting about two years. Mrs. Fowler had suffered with gangrene, and also with paralysis. She had the first stroke of paralysis some time ago and partially recovered from its effects. The second stroke came last Saturday evening and left her with the whole left side paralyzed, and on Monday morning the third stroke rendered her entirely helpless. The end came Tuesday afternoon at 4:55 o'clock.

Martha Rachel Boomer was the second daughter of William and Phoebe Boomer. She was born July 10, 1872, in Caradoc, Canada, and at the age of about five years came with her parents to Tawas. After remaining here for a time the family moved to Lapeer county, where they resided for five years and then returned to Tawas where she has since made her home.

On December 24, 1890, at the age of 18, she was united in marriage to Charles Fowler. To this union ten children were born, eight of whom preceded her in death. The remaining two are Clarence Fowler of this city and Mrs. Geo. Redman of Lapeer county, who with the bereaved husband and her aged mother, Mrs. James Williams, survive her. She also leaves one brother, Serenas Boomer of Saginaw, and four sisters, Mrs. Birt Fowler and Mrs. B. C. Bowen of Tawas City, Mrs. Will Lake of Oscoda and Mrs. John Bowen of Gypsum, O. Relatives and friends from out of the city who were here to attend the funeral were: Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Redman, Mr. and Mrs. Will Lake, John Bowen, Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Fowler of Saginaw, Mrs. Edith Guest of Flint, and Chas. Williams of Pontiac, and Mr. and Mrs. Fred Berlin of Saginaw.

During her long residence in this city Mrs. Fowler has made a host of friends who, with the bereaved family, mourn her loss. She was a faithful and loving wife and mother, a kind friend and neighbor and will be sadly missed among her large circle of friends.

Funeral services were held from the Baptist church on Thursday at two o'clock in the afternoon and the remains were laid to rest in the Tawas City cemetery.

### THE PIONEER PICNIC

The Iosco County Pioneer picnic was held at the Orange hall and Baptist church on the Hemlock road on Thursday, August 25, with a large attendance including many of the older pioneers of the county.

The Hemlock road people had arranged a splendid dinner in the Orange hall, after which a program was rendered in the Baptist church, consisting of singing "Iosco," the history of Wilber by Miss Amy Abbott, two songs by Clyde Berube and an address by Mrs. M. B. Ferrey of Lansing. Mrs. Ferrey strongly urged the getting together of a history of the county before it was too late to get the material, and a committee was appointed to confer with the board of supervisors with regard to having a history written.

The list of the pioneers who had died during the year was read and the following resolutions offered in their memory:

"Whereas, The Supreme Ruler of the Universe has taken from earth to the skies 33 of the pioneers of Iosco county during the year since the last meeting of the society; therefore be it Resolved, That we deplore the depletion of our society by these numerous deaths, through which our county loses many useful and influential citizens and the Pioneer Society is deprived of a fund of valuable information concerning early history that can be obtained from no other source;

Resolved further, That this Society extend our sympathy and sorrow to the relatives of these deceased persons and that these resolutions be spread upon the records of this Society. Dated August 25, 1921
