MRS. HERMAN BERG Mrs. Herman Berg nee Lietz, was born in Germany on the 30th day of October, 1857, and died at her home in Tawas township on Monday morning, October 31, 1921, aged 64 years and one day.

In the year 1871 she was confirmed in the Lutheran faith. In 1879 she was married to August Hinz. For six years they lived in Germany, coming to America in 1885 and making their home in Tawas City. Her husband and one child preceded her in death.

In 1893 she was united in marriage to Herman Berg. This marriage was blessed with three children, two sons and one daughter. One son and the daughter preceded their mother to the Great Beyond.

The deceased leaves to mourn her loss the husband, one son, Otto, a half-sister, Mrs. Daniel Krumm, and two cousins.

Funeral services were held from the home at one o'clock and from the Emmanuel Lutheran church at two o'clock on Thursday afternoon, Nov. 3, Rev. Aug. Kellberg officiating. Interment was made in the Lutheran cemetery.

LOCAL VETERAN CLOSE COMPANION OF HERO

Readers of the Herald have undoubtedly read in the daily papers the exploits of Sergeant Samuel Woodfill, now stationed at Fort Thomas, Ky., who has been named by Gen. Pershing as the greatest individual fighter in the A. E. F., and who has been appointed to represent the infantry department of the army as one of the bearers of the unknown American soldier who will be buried with appropriate ceremonies in Arlington national cemetery on Armistice day, November 11.

Sergeant Woodfill, who at the time of the engagement in which he showed his bravery held the rank of lieutenant in the Sixth Infantry, attacked single handed a series of machine gun nests near Cunel, killing the crews of each in turn and despatching the last of the enemy with a pickax. In hand-to-hand conflict he despatched 19 Germans and brought in three men as prisoners.

A fact which will be of interest to Tawas readers in connection with this feat, is that William Fitzhugh of this city was at the time personal runner or despatch bearer for Lieutenant Woodfill, and was with him on his daring exploit into the enemy lines. There were three men in the party, Woodfill, Fitzhugh and another man, but with characteristic bravery the lieutenant ordered his men to remain in the rear while he tackled the enemy machine gun nests single handed.

For his act of bravery Woodfill was promoted to a captaincy and in addition to the Congressional Medal was awarded the Legion of Honor (cavalier) and the Croix de Guerre with palm by France and the Order of Prince Danilo I (fifth class) by Montenegro.

QUARTET OF BURGLARS CAPTURED

For some time past the stores and other business establishment at Whittemore, Prescott and Turner have been the victims of numerous burglaries, losing merchandise of various kinds. Sheriff Robinson of Iosco county and Sheriff Merrill of Ogemaw county have both been quietly working on the case, and last Friday and Saturday rounded up a quartet of young men who are responsible for the various crimes. John Miller and Herbert Myers of the Keystone district and George Nichols of Emery Junction were taken into custody by Sheriff Robinson and are now in the county jail. Fred Miller, who it is said is the leader of the gang, was located in Detroit and was arrested there and held for Sheriff Merrill of Ogemaw, who went to that city and brought him to West Branch.

Miller, it is stated, has been identified as one of the men who broke into the Eymor store at Prescott on Oct. 18 and stole a quantity of merchandise. A portion of the stolen goods taken from the various stores was discovered at the home of George Nichols who the officers believe did not actually participate in the robberies, but received and secreted the stolen goods.

The charge placed against the men will probably be that of breaking and entering in the night-time, which will mean a stiff sentence if they are convicted.

NOTES FROM COUNTY SCHOOL COMMISSIONER

A school room is one hundred per cent Junior Red Cross when fifty cents has been paid for a year's subscription to the Junior Red Cross News. Each child in the room will receive a Junior Red Cross button, and the paper will be received by that room for the school year.

The following schools of the county are 100 per cent Red Cross now: Baldwin No. 3, Burleigh Nos. 3 and 4; Grant Nos. 2 and 3; Plainfield Nos. 4, high room No. 5 and No. 6; Reno Nos. 2 and 3; Sherman Nos. 2, 3, 4 and 5; Tawas Nos. 3 and 9; St. Joseph's school, Emmanuel Lutheran school, Tawas City school.

The total amount received for the Foch school fund and forwarded to the superintendent of public instruction was \$23.37. This is an average of one cent per child, which was the amount asked to apply on the cost of building two new school buildings in France.

The school officers' meeting is to be held November 18, beginning at 9:30 a. m. at the Community building, East Tawas. The new law requires that all necessary traveling expenses of all members of the board be paid from the general fund of the district. Miss Isabelle M. Becker, assistant superintendent of public instruction, will represent the state department.

A notice has been received that a fraudulent magazine salesman calling himself McDode and supposed to be representing the American Magazine Sales Co. of New York City, is working among school people of the state. Teachers are warned to beware of him.

An extension class under the jurisdiction of the State Normal College at Ypsilanti has been organized among the teachers of Iosco county. The first class will meet Friday evening, Nov. 18. Mr. H. Z. Wilber, former deputy superintendent of public instruction, will be the instructor.

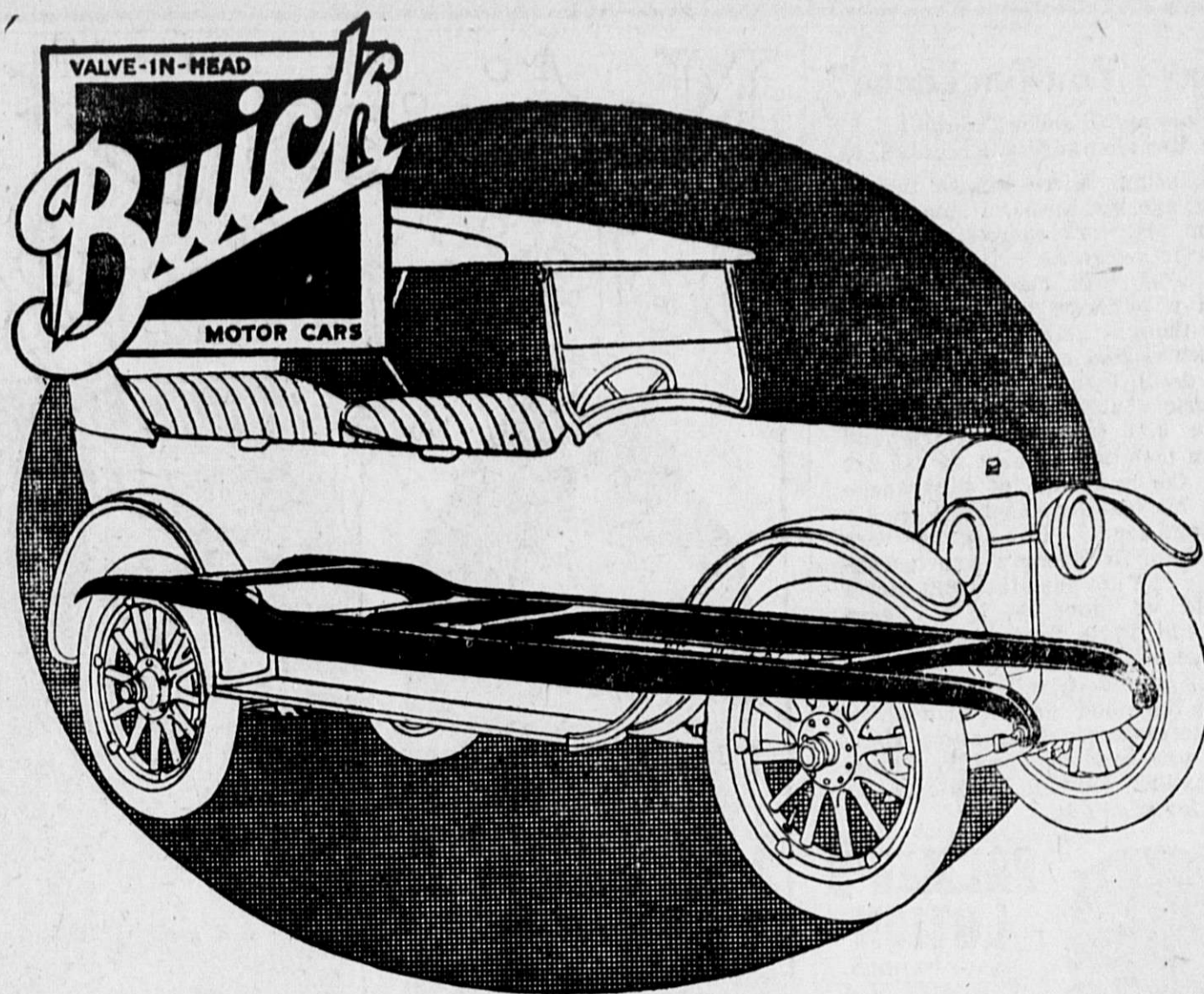
