A SAD AFFAIR

The community was shocked Tuesday morning when it was learned that John Laing of East Tawas had committed suicide at the county jail, where he had been under the surveillance of Sheriff Robinson.

Mr. Laing had been in ill health for about four years, and recently had developed serious symptoms of mental trouble, due in part, it is said, to religious influences exerted upon him by some of his neighbors. Last Sunday morning he came to the home of John B. King in this city, where he remained until Monday, a deputy sheriff being with him Sunday night.

On Monday he was about the county jail most of the time, though not confined. Monday evening Sheriff Robinson remained with him until a late hour, when he expressed a desire to go to bed. Mr. Robinson showed him to a room and kept watch of him until about four o'clock in the morning, at which time he was apparently sleeping soundly. The sheriff was called away, returning about seven o'clock. He went to the room with breakfast for Mr. Laing and found him dead, having hung himself with his suspenders.

In the absence of the coroner, Justice Tait was called and decided that an inquest was not necessary, the facts being plain. The body was then taken to the home of Mr. King, where the funeral was held Thursday.

Mr. Laing was an old and well respected resident of the Tawas and it is with much regret that his many friends learn of his tragic demise.

DEATH OF JOHN S. LAING

John Laing was born in Kirkcaldy, Scotland, August 28, 1861, and died in Tawas City on Tuesday morning, Nov. 29, 1921, being 60 years and three months of age.

In 1886 he was married to Agnes Robertson of Falkland, Scotland. Six months later they came to America and remained about six years, returning to Scotland in 1892. Three years later they again came to America and came to Tawas City, where they made their home until five years ago when they moved to East Tawas. Two sons were born to them, Joseph, who died at six months of age, and David, who resides in Flint.

Mr. Laing was employed as a blacksmith in the D. & M. car shops until about two years ago when failing health compelled him to give up his work. He was a man of sterling character and during his long residence in the Tawas made a host of friends who join in extending sincere sympathy to the bereaved family.

The funeral was held from the home of Mr. and Mrs. John B. King in this city on Thursday, Dec. 1, at 11:30 a. m., Rev. S. S. Cross officiating, and the remains were laid to rest in the Tawas City cemetery.

Gentlemen:—Your committee on county farm beg leave to report that on October 7th we visited the county farm, examined the farm and buildings and took an inventory of the crops, stock and implements. We found the farm and buildings in good condition. The new addition to the house is practically completed with the exception of the installation of the heating and lighting plants and the water plant, and we understand that work on these units is going forward as fast as possible. Indian Lake road constructed but not yet accepted by the state. Road No. 10 one-1 Sections A and B, trunk line, was completed. county's share, \$3,622.88.

The bridge across the AuGres river was completed. County's share, \$12,538.65; also filling in at Tawas river bridge and approaches were constructed and completed at a cost to the county of \$703.83.

At this date the building and repairs are practically completed, with the exception of the heating, lighting and water plants, arrangements for which have been made.

Following is an itemized account of the expenses to date, which have been paid:
