ARMENIAN RELIEF CAMPAIGN

The annual campaign for the relief of the thousands of sufferers from Turkish oppression in the Near East has been inaugurated in Iosco county this week. C. A. Pinkerton has been appointed chairman for the county and has selected the following committees to work with him: Tawas City: N. C. Harting, F. F. Taylor and Jas. E. Ballard; East Tawas: Jas. E. Dillon, L. G. McKay, John McCray and C. R. Jackson; Oscoda: A. R. Weir, Bud Chrysler and Will McGillivray; Whittemore: H. J. Jaques and C. H. Ridgley; Hale: R. D. Brown and Grant Shattuck.

Miss Satenik Hatchadourin, an Armenian young lady who came to this country about a year ago to complete her education in American universities, has been in the county this week assisting in the work of organization and explaining the urgent need of help for the starving people in her native country. Miss Hatchadourin, in conversation with the writer, stated that she has devoted her time to this work instead of following her original plan, because she considers the saving of her people of more importance just at present than her education, and that, indeed there would be no need of preparing herself to go back and teach the Armenian children unless they are first saved from starvation.

The amount apportioned to Iosco county this year is \$1157. In view of the fact that this is the only campaign for funds in progress this year, whereas last year there were three or four, the amount should be raised without any trouble. The people of the county are urged to contribute liberally in order that the people of this oldest Christian nation may be saved from as much suffering as it is possible to spare them.

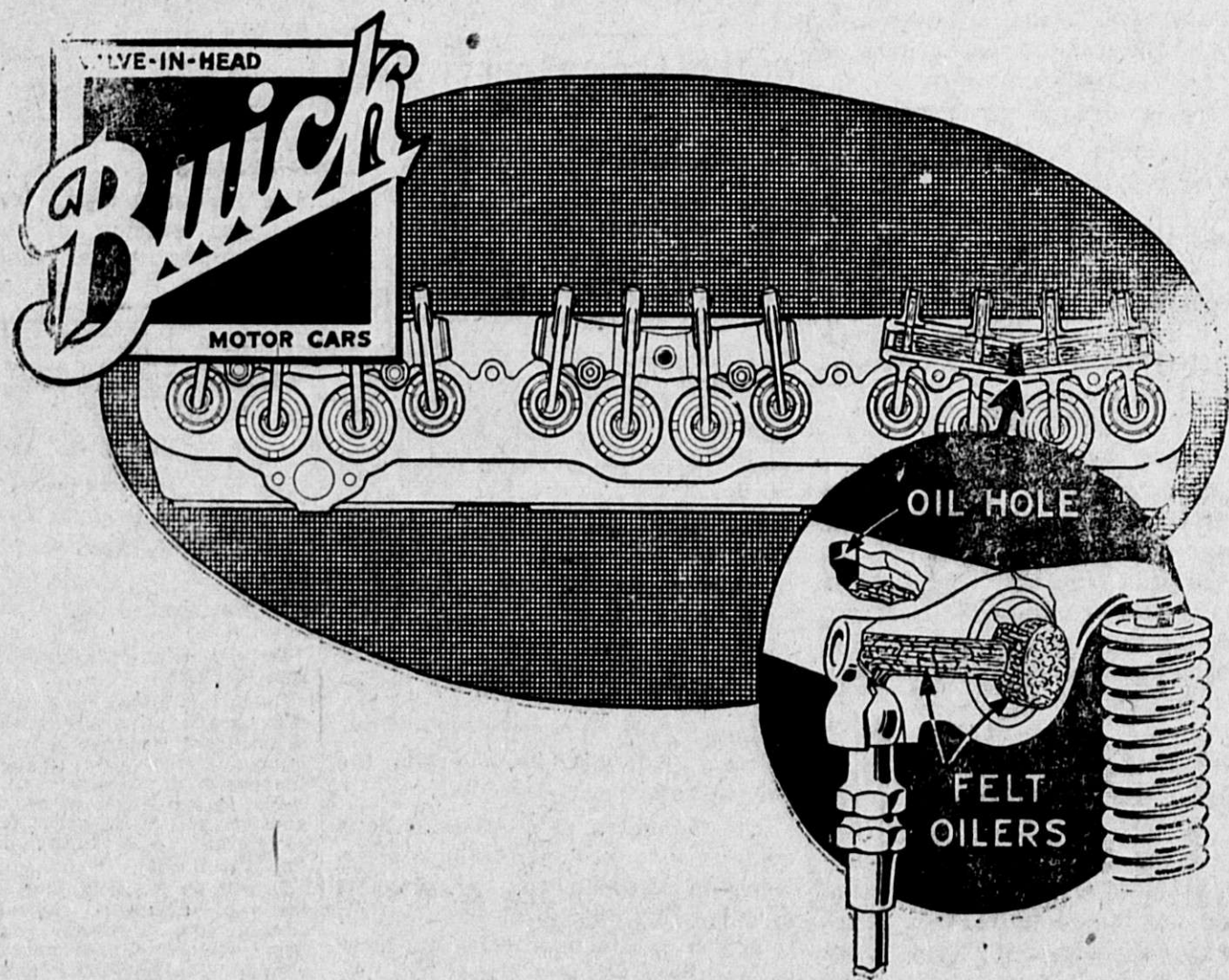

LAST OF THE "TWELVE DAYS"

Epiphany, Originally, Was Celebrated Rather Than Christmas, According to Some Authorities.

EPIPHANY is the last day of the "Twelve Days" of which Christmas is the first. Authorities on this subject tell us that originally it was

Epiphany which was celebrated rather than Christmas. It was the baptism of Jesus (or the spiritual birth) which interested the early church fathers rather than Christmas (or the physical birth). In some circles in early Christianity the baptism appears to have been looked upon as the true birth of Christ, the moment when, filled by the spirit, He became the Son of God.

For some time the two events were celebrated together on January 6. Gradually the western church began to stress the physical birth, and eventually the two events were celebrated separately, December 25 being fixed upon as the date for the Nativity. In the East, the celebration of the two events continued for some time after the separate feast of Christmas had been instituted. The Church of Jerusalem stood out until the Seventh century, refusing to adopt the new feast. The Armenian church knows nothing of December 25, and still celebrates the Nativity with the Epiphany in January. Epiphany is a greater festival in the Greek church than Christmas.

Such in bare outline is the story of the spread of Christmas as a separate festival.

Christmas Customs, Wrapped in Dim Traditions, Bright With Happiness and Beauty.

ASIDES the presents wrapped in crackling white tissue paper, bright with scarlet ribbon that will be put into eager hands from Christmas trees, there are countless other gifts of the season, writes Elizabeth R. Kingsley in the Cleveland Plain Dealer. These come wrapped in the dim traditions of hundreds and thousands of years, they have traveled from far away countries, they are bright with the happiness and beauty of long-ago Christmases—they are our Christmas customs.

Christmas carols have come to us from the Holy Land itself, the Christmas tree from the East via Germany. Santa Claus has sped from Holland on the reindeer loaned him in the Far North, our stockings hung first in the chimneys of France and Belgium; even the Christmas cards with their cheery greetings have crossed the ocean from England. Perhaps the only purely American product is the Christmas turkey.

CHRISTMAS TREES FOR MICHIGAN

One million Christmas trees will be used by the people of Michigan on Christmas day, 1921, which is the estimate established by officials of the United States Forest Service. Approximately 50,000 trees will be used in the city of Detroit alone. One million trees based on 700 trees per

acre, which is the number now being planted on each denuded acre of sand plains land in the Michigan National Forest, is sufficient to restock 1429 acres of Michigan idle land that formerly grew timber for the entire country. Never before in the history of the country was there such a demand for Christmas trees as there appears to be for the coming Christmas

holidays. The old Christmas traditions brought to this country by the Pilgrims are now becoming so firmly rooted that every family is endeavoring to have their Christmas tree, which will occupy the place of honor in the homes throughout Michigan from the period of December 24 to January 1, 1922.

The demand for Christmas trees has been considerably increased because of the great number of Community houses established throughout the country since the close of the war. Also various clubs and other organizations are beginning to add cheer to their Christmas holidays by allowing a large decorated forest tree to occupy a prominent place in their establishment. The trees mostly desired and which appear to better advantage as Christmas trees are spruce and balsam. They are more symmetrical and uniform and their branches grow more numerous and dense, which makes their decoration a very simple and easy matter. American Legion Posts and Salvation Army headquarters throughout the state are selling trees at various points in every city of any material size and their price enables even the poorest families to have their Christmas trees.

Almost the entire stock of Christmas trees used by Michigan will come from the timber lands of both the upper and lower peninsulas and eastern Wisconsin where spruce grows abundantly on swamp areas, where it is a very common occurrence to find growing per acre from three to five thousand trees. Some trees will also be secured from nurseries and growers of evergreens. If the trees for Christmas purposes will be selected judiciously by the people the annual Christmas crop of one million trees will not be a serious loss. In all cases, however, the trees should be obtained from areas where trees are growing in abundance and where thinning will be beneficial to the remaining trees on the ground. In no case should trees be cut from open areas where there are not sufficient trees in the near vicinity to make up for the loss.

THOMAS N. MCGILL
The Herald noted a couple of weeks ago the death of Thomas N. McGill, a former resident of Tawas City and East Tawas, and who was for several years city marshal of Tawas City. He had a great many friends here who learned with deep regret of the loss of this kindly, honest friend and neighbor.

On November 29th Mr. McGill was struck by an automobile as he was about to board a street car in Vancouver, Wash., where he has resided since 1914. He was thrown to the pavement and so severely injured that he died three hours later without regaining consciousness. He is survived by his widow and five children.

Thomas Needham McGill was born in 1846 at Peterboro, Ontario, Can. He came to Michigan in 1868, settling first at Saginaw. In 1872 he came to East Tawas where he operated a salt block for the Emory Salt and Lumber Co. Mr. McGill was one of the pioneer salt makers of the Tawas shore. In 1873 he was married in Saginaw to Miss Isabella Chapman of that city. In 1888 he moved to Alpena, returning to Tawas City in 1891. In 1914 Mr. and Mrs. McGill and their daughter, Laura, moved to Vancouver, Wash., to join a son and brother, James A. McGill, who had become established there. In that city on Nov. 29th last Mr. McGill met his death.

Of the six children born to Mr. and Mrs. McGill, James A. Laura, M. Bert, Henry T., Margaret and Edward W., five are still living, Bert having died in 1885. Laura M. McGill is with her mother at the family home in Vancouver, Wash. James A. McGill is now in Los Angeles, Calif. Henry T. McGill is located in Tacoma, Wash. Margaret, now Mrs. Leo Culham, is at Swift Current, Sask., Can. and Edward W. is at Seattle, Wash. Of these Laura, Henry and Margaret were born in East Tawas, and all are well known here. To them and to the sorrowing wife we extend our most sincere sympathy.
