Board called to order by Chairman Schroeder. Roll call. Present—Supervisors Colby, Colvin, Degrow, Dixon, Dickinson, Evans, Friedman, Flynn, Hale, Light, Londo, Mielock, Piper, Putnam, Small, Schaaf, VanPatten, Westcott, 18. Quorum present.

Grant Twp., 6-4-22 To the Hon. Board of Supervisors: At a meeting of the township board of Grant township Harry VanPatten was appointed to fill the office of supervisor to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Leon Biggs. Harry VanPatten qualified at the same meeting.

N. C. Miller, Chas. Deming, Thomas Scarlett, Township Board. Mrs. Mary Fraser, Deputy Clerk.

Moved by Small, supported by Dickinson, that a seat be given Mr. Harry VanPatten on this board and that he act on all committees on which Leon Biggs was appointed. Motion prevailed.

Supervisor Harry VanPatten then took his seat on the board. Mr. Shreck addressed the board in regard to the roads in the national forest reserve, asking the board to appropriate \$3000.00, an equal amount to what the Federal government has offered, to build roads on the plains.

Moved by Putnam, supported by Flynn, that the matter of raising three thousand dollars (\$3000.00) be made a special order of business at 2 o'clock. Motion prevailed.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of the County of Isosco. Be it resolved, That we are opposed to any attempt to create a state drainage department or the appointment of a state drainage engineer, or the appropriation of any funds in connection with the same or the passing of any law or amendments relating thereto.

Tawas City, Mich., June 27, 1922 The board of supervisors of Isosco county in meeting assembled offer the following: In consideration of the fact that taxes in Isosco county for the past several years have been comparatively high and have in many instances become a burden to the property owners, particularly in the farming townships of the county. That said taxpayers seek relief from such high rate of taxation, demanding of their respective supervisors that taxes this year be reduced as much as possible.

That inasmuch as the proposed "Pink Drain" as laid out by our county drain commissioner will affect a majority of farm lands in this section of the county and that inasmuch as said drain will entail considerable expense and will increase taxes in all the surrounding district a very considerable.

Be it Resolved that this board of supervisors in meeting assembled go on record as opposed to any such activity especially this year, and until

such time in the future as sufficient relief from high tax rate has been had.

Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be forwarded immediately to the state highway commissioner and to the county drain commissioner.
