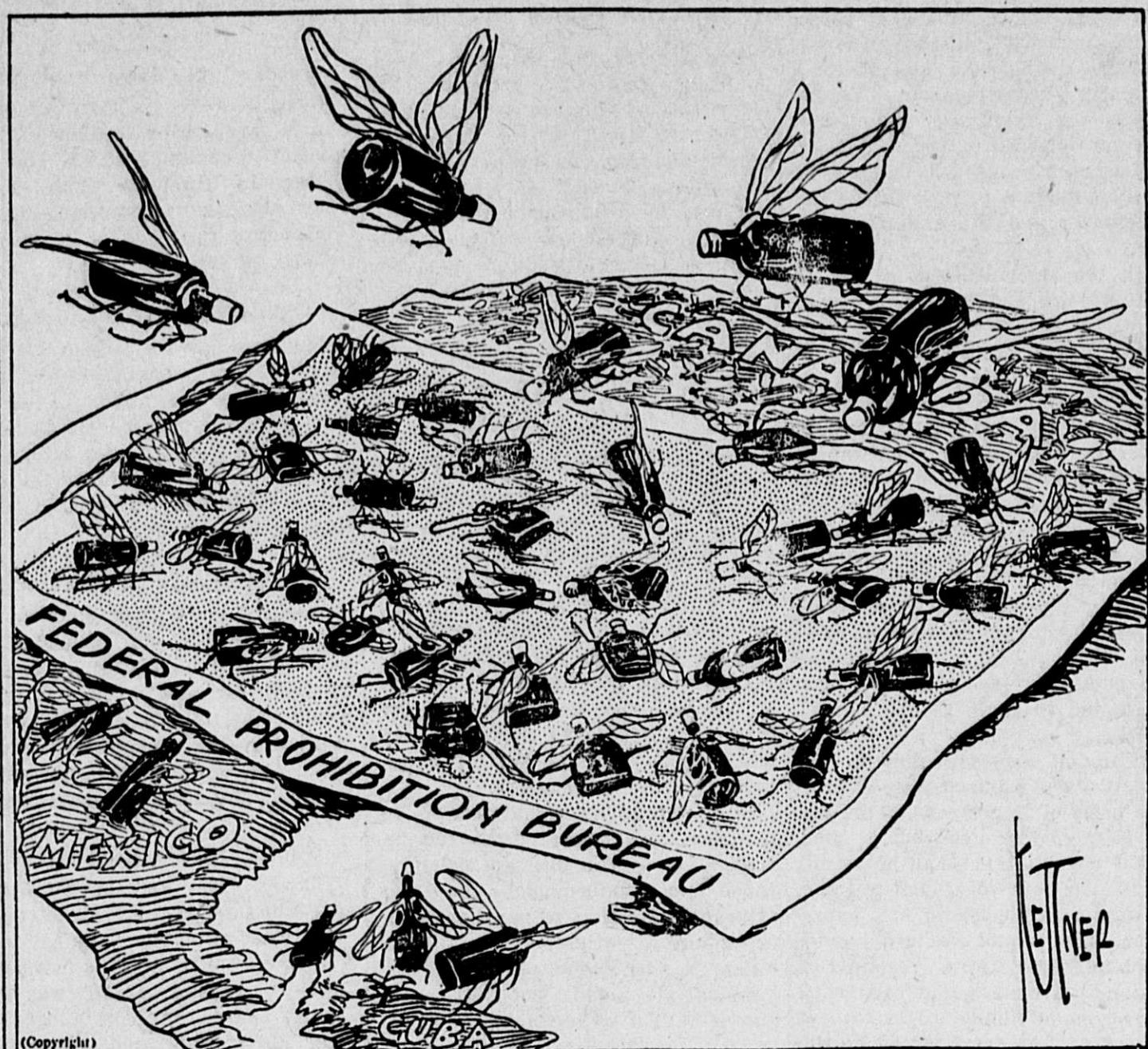

### "TAG DAY" FOR COUNTY NURSE

The Ladies' Literary club of East Tawas will have a "Tag Day" at the Iosco county fair on Thursday, Sept. 14, for the purpose of raising money to be used toward the employment of a county nurse for Iosco county.

The ladies hope to enlist the co-operation of the local chapter of the Red Cross and also of the board of supervisors in this proposition and secure the services of a full time nurse for this county. It is a most commendable enterprise and should enlist the aid of every citizen who has the health of his community at heart. A county nurse is a regular institution in many counties of this state and wherever they are employed the people would not be without them.

The immense benefit accruing to the children in the schools of Iosco county from the physical examination conducted two years ago by a physician from the state health department may be pointed to as an illustration of the benefit of health work of this nature, and a county nurse would carry on the work started by this survey and also other health work throughout the county.

If you are approached next Thursday by one of the solicitors for this enterprise, buy a tag and pay for it as liberally as you can, and thus help along a most commendable work.

### PRIMARY ELECTION NEXT TUESDAY

Next Tuesday, Sept. 12, the people of Michigan will again be called upon to nominate candidates for congressional, state and county officers to be voted for at the November election. There are few contests outside the republican party, but within that party there is sharp competition for many offices.

For United States senator there are four candidates, Charles E. Townsend, the present senator who seeks renomination, Patrick H. Kelley, John G. Emery and Herbert F. Baker. The last named has the support of a large portion of the labor element and the farmers, and is conceded to be Senator Townsend's strongest competitor.

For representative in the lower house of congress, Roy Woodruff has no opposition in any party, and is therefore sure of renomination and election.

In the race for governor, there are three candidates, Alex J. Groesbeck, who seeks renomination, Richard H. Fletcher and Theodore M. Joslin. There has been a great deal of criticism and dissatisfaction throughout the state in regard to the administration of Mr. Groesbeck and many political prophets predict the nomination of Mr. Fletcher.

For lieutenant governor there is but one candidate, the present incumbent, Thomas Read.

There are two candidates for the nomination for state senator from the 28th district, Horatio S. Karcher of Rose City and John Schmidt of Reed City.

For representative in the state legislature from the Iosco district, Francis B. DeWitt is a candidate for renomination for a second term and is opposed by L. S. Little. Mr. DeWitt gave good service during his term just closing, and as it has always been customary in this district to give a representative a second term, he will undoubtedly be renominated.

In the contest for sheriff, W. J. Robinson is a candidate for a second term and is opposed by Collie Johnson, who in former years has served as sheriff for eight years or more. Mr. Robinson has given excellent service in the office for the past two years and should be entitled to a second term without question.

The candidates for the other county offices are as follows: For clerk, Frank E. Dease and Thomas Galbraith; for treasurer, W. Harry Price; for register of deeds, Geo. A. Pringle; for prosecuting attorney, John A. Stewart and Clark H. W. Snyder; for circuit court commissioner, Nicholas C. Harting; for drain commissioner, Robert C. Arn and Edward O. Putnam; for coroners, Herbert W. Case and Louis N. Gagner; for surveyor, John W. Applin; for county road commissioner, William J. Grant and R. A. Bentley.

In Iosco county there will be but four officers to be voted for by the democrats. Woodbridge N. Ferris is a candidate for the nomination for

### SOME EXPENSIVE PARTRIDGES

Last Sunday John Martindale, deputy state game warden, arrested Eugene Fifield and Robert Martin, both of Bay City, on the charge of shooting partridge out of season. The men had shot two birds each and were caught in the act by the game warden.

Fifield and Martin were arraigned before Justice Davidson of this city on Monday, plead guilty and were fined \$25 for each bird, together with the costs, amounting in all to \$114.30. Partridge are good eating, but that is a rather expensive price to pay just for the pleasure of shooting them without even getting a taste.

J. H. Hall of Oberlin, Ohio, was also arrested by the game warden on August 29th, charged with catching undersized brook trout. He paid a fine of \$10 with \$5 costs for his poor judgment as to measurements. Mr. Hall is a professor at Oberlin college, but told the judge that he thought the fish he caught were the legal size (seven inches) whereas they measured only about four inches.

The state central committee of each political party shall, at least thirty days before the September primary herein provided for, cause to be forwarded by mail to the chairman of the county committee of such party a copy of the call for the state convention showing the number of delegates to which such county shall be entitled in the state convention of such party; and the said state central committee shall apportion such delegates to the several counties in proportion and according to the number of votes cast for the candidate of such party for secretary of state in each of said counties, respectively, at the last preceding November election. The name of the candidate for delegate to the county convention shall not be printed upon the official primary election ballot, but one or more such names may be placed on such ballot by printed slips pasted thereon by the voter, or the names may be written in. The county committee shall in its call for the county convention indicate whether delegates are to be selected by precincts or by wards. In cities having no wards or only one ward, the delegates to which such cities are entitled shall be elected from the entire city, or by election precincts as the county committee in its call for the county convention shall indicate. The chairman of the township, ward or city committee, as the case may be, shall notify by mail each person elected as a delegate to the county convention of his party.  
 Suggestions Relative to Voting  
 Separate ballots for each political party will be provided. The elector must name the political party of his choice when asking for a ballot and in marking his ballot must make a cross in the square to the left of the name of each elector for whom he desires to vote, and can vote for only one candidate except where two candidates are to be elected, in which case he should vote for two.  
 Relative to Registration—Please note that all provisions of the primary law are done away with, and if you are not already registered in the precinct where you reside, you must register under the provisions of law as set forth in the registration notices posted in connection with this notice of primary election.
