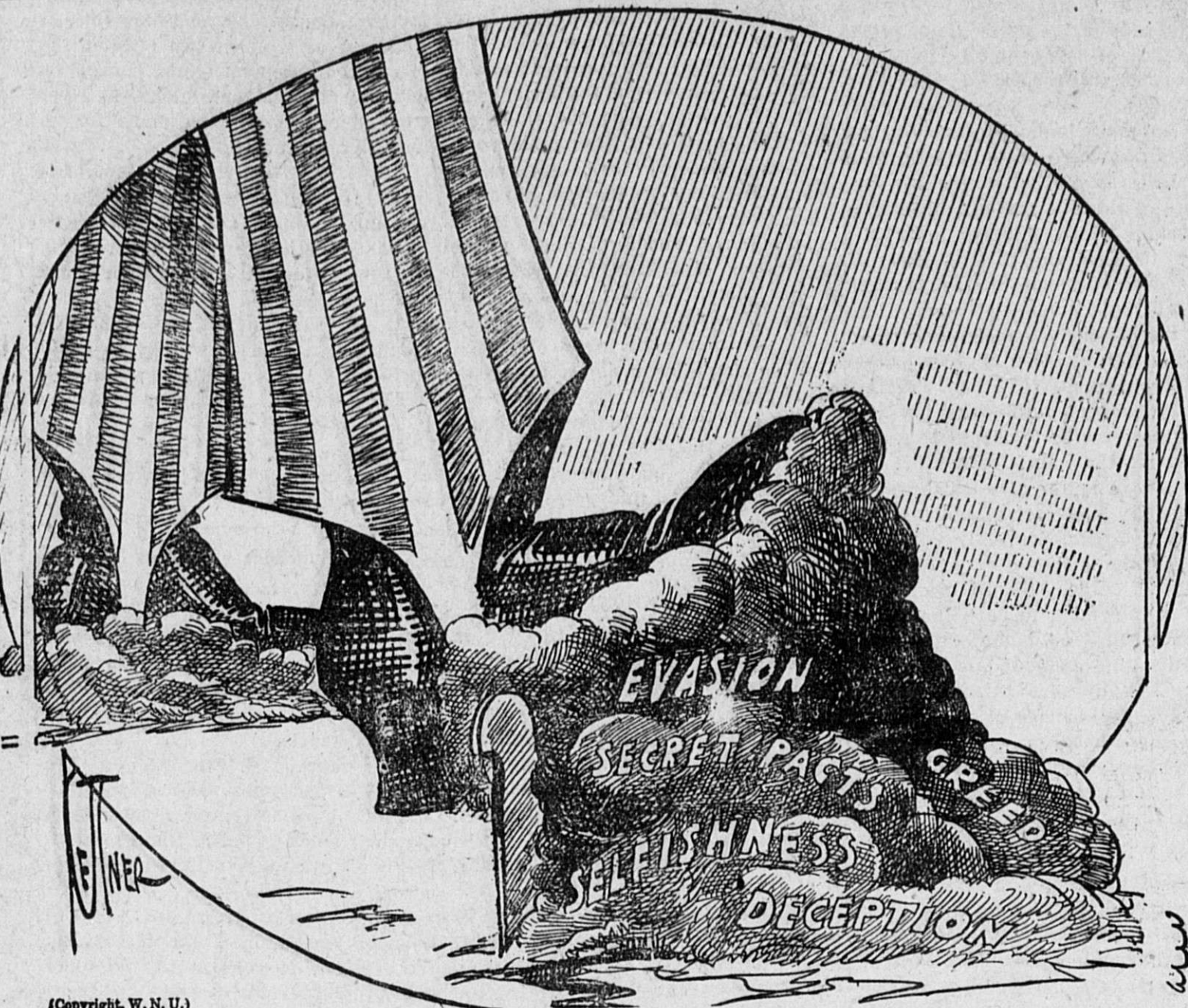

Places Jesus Christ on Plane with Heathen Gods and Myths Worshipped by Ignorant Savages

Upon request of a number of the readers of the Herald and of the judge himself, we are publishing here with a letter written by Judge Albert Widdis of the 23rd judicial circuit, and which appeared in a publication in Detroit called "The Little Stick." Copies of this letter, which the paper that published it calls "sensational" were sent by Judge Widdis to Governor Sleeper and several members of the state legislature, and copies were also submitted to some of the state papers, but was published only in the above noted publication.

It is unnecessary for us to comment on this letter, as it speaks for itself in the minds of sane, right-thinking men and women. But there is one sentence contained in the letter upon which we cannot forbear to say a word. This sentence is contained in the fourth "result" of the teachings he advocates, wherein it says: "No virtue will be lost; but our propensity to engage in noxious exaggerations of Christ Jesus will be contemned."
 The dictionary definition of contemned is: "to despise; to view with contempt or disdain; to scorn." And further in the definition occurs this sentence: "Scorn marks the sentiment of a little, vain mind; disdain, of a haughty and perverted mind." In view of these definitions we sincerely doubt whether many readers of the Herald will contemn the ages old stories of Christ Jesus, whether exaggerations or not.

Dear Sir:
 Much has been written concerning the abolition of separate schools. The injury worked by separate schools appears very small when compared with that done by separate churches. To help clear the entire and well-nigh intolerable situation, I suggest that the legislature, at the special session to be called, pass a law requiring the subject of Ancient Religions to be taught in all public and separate schools.
 For the pupils will learn that there have been at least seven hundred and fifty christis; that according to his adherents, the coming to earth of each of them was prophesied; that each of them was born of a virgin; that each was born in a manger, or cave or in some other humble place; that each of them was a remarkably clever, brilliant and precocious boy and showed signs of coming greatness; that each of them was a great miracle worker; that each of them was meek and lowly in spirit and administered unto the oppressed; that each of them suffered at the hands of

FACTS ABOUT THE TELEPHONE
The center of telephones in the United States is in Indiana.

There is enough telephone wire in use in the world at the present time to reach all the way from the earth to the planet Mars.

If Europe had as many telephones as the United States in proportion to population, the total number of telephones in Europe based on January 1, 1921 figures would be nearly 60,000,000 instead of 5, 289,606.

Leaving out every city of a population of 50,000 or more, and counting only the telephones in the smaller cities and in the towns and rural districts, there are yet more telephones in the United States than in all the rest of the world put together.

One of the longest submarine telephone cables in the world was recently laid across the English Channel, connecting Great Britain and the Netherlands. It is approximately eighty nautical miles in length and will provide telephone service between London, Amsterdam, Rotterdam and The Hague.

In 1880, four years after the invention of the telephone, there were only about 60,000 telephones in use in all the world, and about 50,000 of these were in the United States. Now there are over 22,000,000 telephones in the world, of which over 14,000,000 are in the United States.

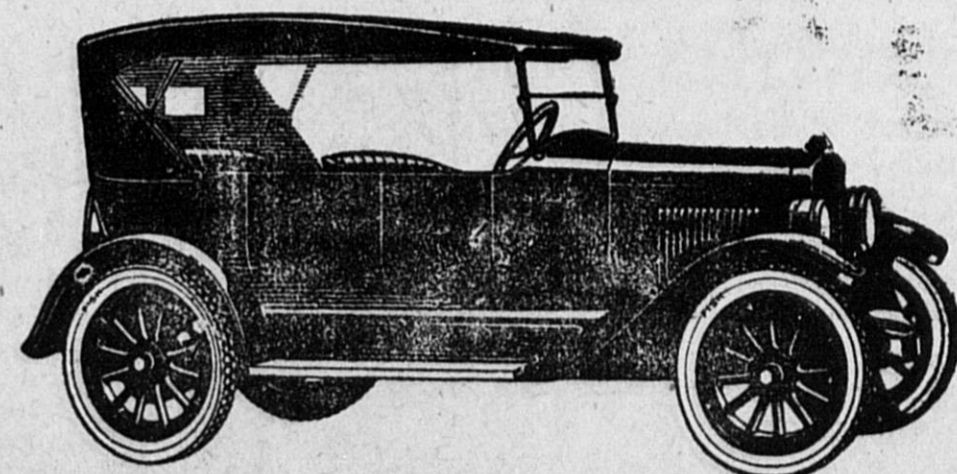
