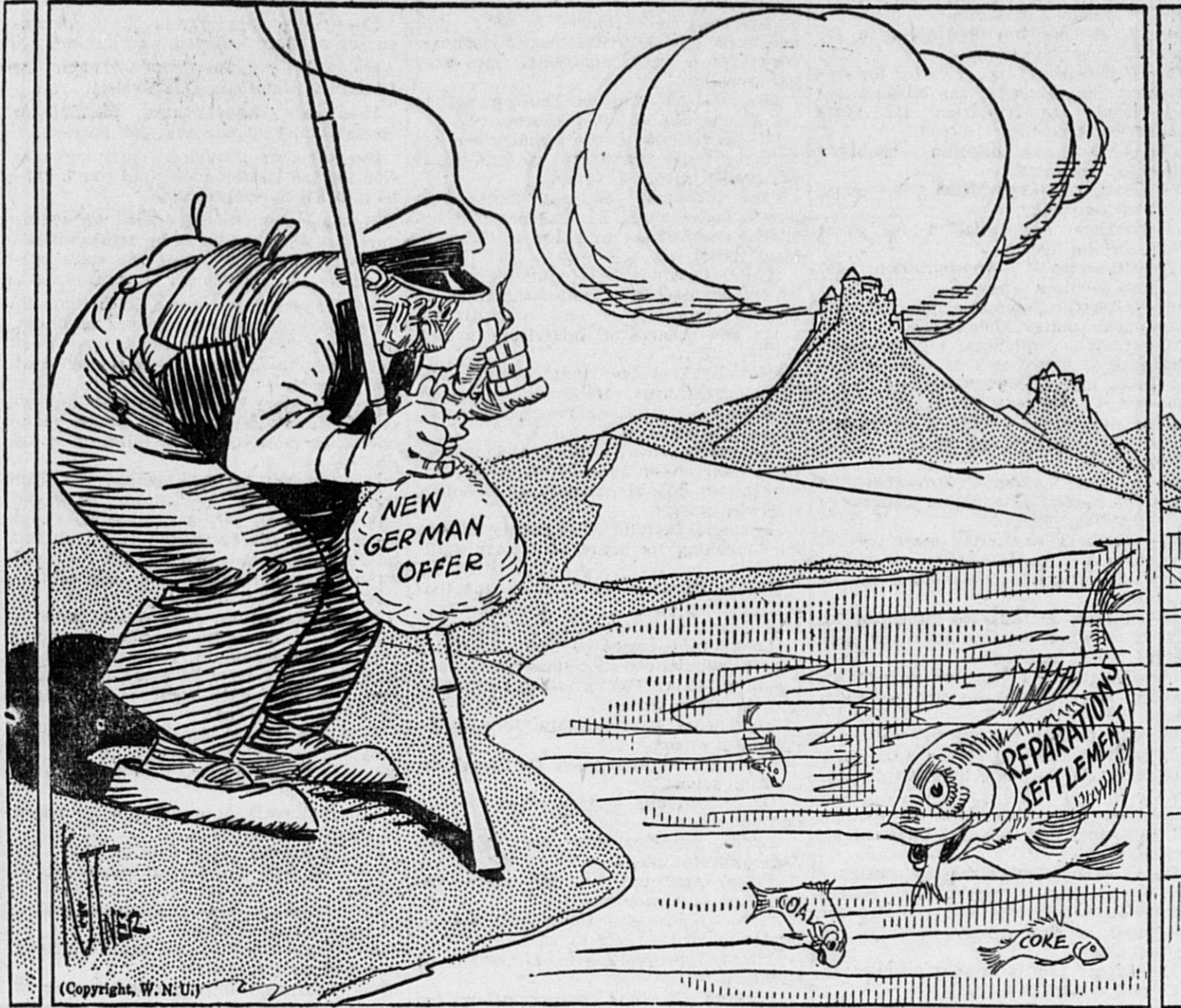

### STATE WILL SEND HEALTH UNIT HERE

Michigan's traveling health unit of eight persons will spend a week in Iosco county. This unit which represents a new idea in public health activity, is being sent by the Michigan department of health at the request of local groups to various counties of the state to carry on health institutes.

Since the formation of the group in September, 1922, approximately 10,000 persons a month have heard Dr. Frank A. Poole and Miss Melita Hutzel talk on personal and public hygiene. During the coming weeks these two health department lecturers will give about 30 talks to men's and women's clubs of the county and to school children.

The clinic is limited strictly to diagnostic work. Dr. F. L. Rose, and Dr. Florence Browne centering their attention on the examination of children and infants and Dr. Pinckney making examinations of actual and suspected tuberculosis cases. All three doctors recommend the attention of family physicians when disease or defects are discovered.

A clinic for ex-service men is held from 4 to 5 o'clock. In several instances the work of the clinic in discovering physical handicaps contracted by discharged soldiers while they were in the army has led to the grant of government disability payments.


