



THE PATH OF FIRE

Eighty-one million acres of desert mark the progress of forest fire destruction in the United States. All the tracts which go to make up this total, in one continuous area, would cover There is always the chance that it the state of Wyoming, and one-third of Colorado, more than one-sixth of the present timbered area in the United States.

Not once, but repeatedly have fires swept over the land taking first the mature forests, then the seed, young growth and weeds which remained or sprang up in their place, even the soil itself, leaving nothing but barren, rocky wastes.

The reclaiming of these wastes now depends upon human efforts. Every possibility of nature is exhausted. Forests must be set out and given years in which to grow to such a size that they again can begin the slow but necessary process of soil building, Whereas when one has a written inwatershed protection and lumber production.

The reclamation of these deserts is a fitting sequel to their destruction, for here too in the destruction the hand of man may claim its glory. Of all the fires which burn annually in our forests, more than four-fifths are the results of human cause and most of these due to pure carelessness.

A little greater care with cigarette and cigar stubs and camp fires will eliminate a large part of this waste and the annual cost of fire fighting.

TN THESE days almost every sort of invitation comes to us over the telephone. A few years ago it would have been regarded as in bad form to ask friends to dinner in this way most of us. There might be a slight and a hostess would not have invited her friends to a card party over the telephone, but now in most sets and in most localities this sort of thing is permitted.

That organization, while on a hike of 500 miles, was supplied with birds, and part of the day's program was to send messages from the battalion headquarters at San Antonio. Mr. Delhauer has recently adopted a bamboo whistle that may be attached to the pigeon's tail as a protection against the attack of hawks while in the air. The whistle is very light and makes a shrill noise, thus frightening off any bird of prey that wanders too near the message bird. In Panama it is said that such a whistle is a necessity on account of the prevalence of pigeon hawks. It is an invention of the Chinese. Mr. Delhauer said that in China it is not an uncommon thing for the natives to re-

lease whole flocks of pigeons and other birds, each with a whistle tied to its tail. As the birds fly about the great number of whistles produce aerial






