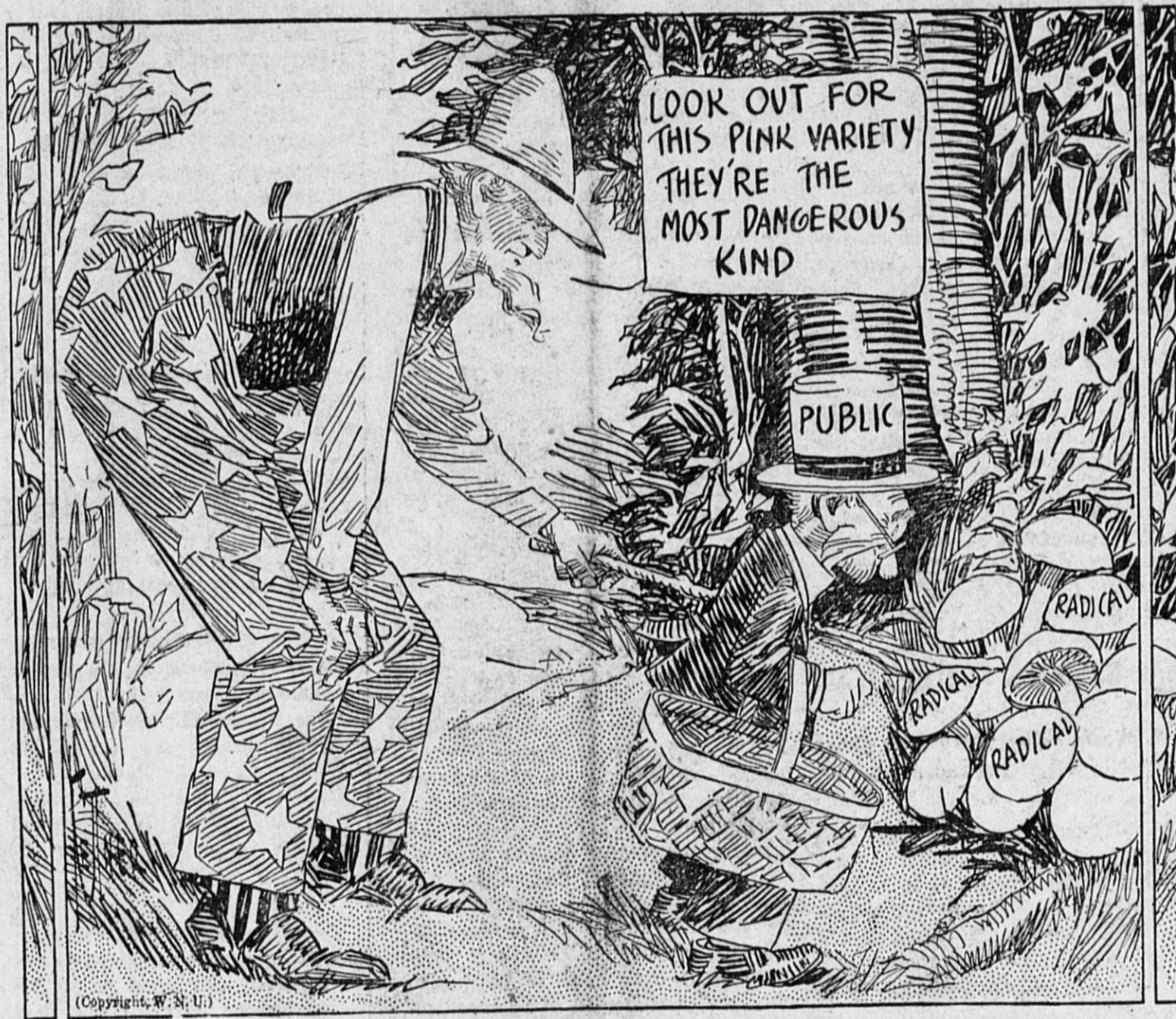

DR. L. H. BEELER, CONVINCING SPEAKER

From the best platform in America, Dr. L. H. Beeler, former dean of the Chicago teacher's training college and more recently president of North Dakota state normal college, has addressed the thinkers of America. A more earnest and convincing speaker and a man with a greater desire to serve is not to be found on the lecture platform. His address, "Houses Without Fronts," on the fourth night of the Chautauqua will mean much to the community and it is to be hoped that every person interested in progress and development of the community will be there, for they will gain much and through them the community will be bettered.

Arrangements are being made to have Dr. Beeler address a noon luncheon on the day that he is here. In addition to Dr. Beeler's address the Chautauqua brings to us Hon. W. C. McCullough in a national problem lecture, "The Challenge of Democracy," a foreful message delivered by an able orator; a most instructive lecture entertainment by George W. Ray, explorer, and world famed as "Livingstone of South America."

Entertainment features of the assembly include the great spectacular dramatic production "The Storm" in four acts; the Theresa Sheehan Concert Co. in an afternoon and evening program; the Davies Opera Co. in the comic opera "Olivette," and a vocal recital; the Barnaby Entertainers in two artistically presented programs, and Green and his band in two great concerts.



Hale Baptist Church Notes

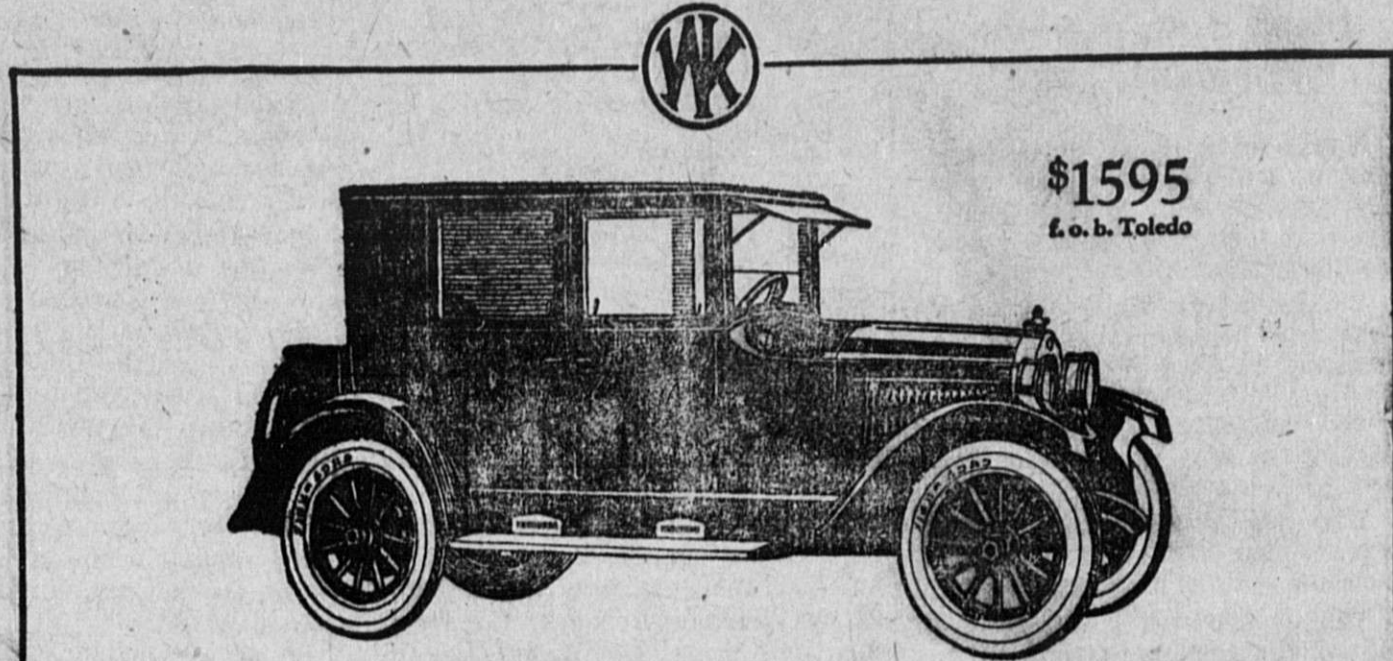
Sunday school at 11 o'clock, the usual hour. Let each scholar realize their obligations as members of the school and make every effort to be present and on time. The last bell means the song service.
