The civic committee of the 20th Century club was instrumental in obtaining the rock for the marker. It was taken from the John Sullivan farm in Baldwin township and weighs two tons. A bronze plate was set in the face of the rock which bears the following inscription:

"Kanotin-Iosco. Erected 1923 by the citizens of the county to commemrate the organization in 1840 of Iosco county, and the establishing in 1856 of the first post office in the county by Gideon O. Whittemore as postmaster. 'History is the essence of innumerable biographies.-Carlyle."

Several addresses were made and were well received. That of Mr. Hartingh was particularly fine and in keeping with the times and history.

many, April 6, 1863 and at the time and 25 days old.

At the age of 6 he came with his Day Sports and a Merry Midway parents to the United States and resided at East Tawas, where he received his education in the Public School..

When he was 9 years of age, his \$200.00. father died and a few years later his mother remarried to John Klinger. of East Tawas, then the family moved on a farm in Baldwin township.

June 6, 1887 he was united in marriage to Miss Pauline Checky of East Tawas, formerly of Germany and to this union ten children were born, two preceding him in death, Julia, oldest daughter, died June 18, 1914 and Edward, oldest son, died of wounds in France, Nov. 14, 1918.

Mr. Karziske has enjoyed very good health, until Sept., 1922 when he became affected with cancer on his lip. He then began taking radium treatment in Detroit, after the cancer on his lip was thought checked, another one was discovered under his chin. #### SARAH

CARAH-lately by fashionable consent spelled Sara-is derived from a good old Biblical name and received its right to sturdy religious significance since it first attached to the wife of the patriarch Abraham.

It is derived originally from a verb meaning to fight or to rule and name of Abraham's spouse Sarai (quarrelsome) was thus converted into Sarah (the princess). If we may judge from the example of the bride of Tobias, the daughters of Sarah were occasionally called by her name and Zare is used as an eastern cen from the assumption that this race was descended from Sarah, but their belief is not substantiated.

Sara Beauchamp was one of the first famous women to bear the name. Sarrota de Multon, who lived much earlier, was really Sarah, given an Italian translation. Sarah was not popular in England until after the Reformation, when the contraction Sally had enormous vogue. At the same time it was adopted as an equivalent for no less than three Irish names, Sadobm, Sorcha and Saraid.

France quickly adopted Sarah, but insisted on omitting the final "h" that Biblical translation gave it, evolving from it another equally popular form -Sarotte. Sally and Sallie have greater vogue today in this country than any other derivative; in fact, they outweigh the more formal and uncompromising Sarah in a country which favors contractions and dimin-

Sarah has never had great vogue collector. among the poets, who have favored the more approachable Sallie and written graceful little ditties to the fluffy young person we all visualize as a typical Sallie.

"BANTING"

WHEN in 1863, William Banting, a distinctly corpulent upholsterer of London, decided that he was getting too much fat and made a resolution to refrain from sweets, potatoes, bread and meat, except in small quantities, he probably had no idea that he was going to introduce an entirely new word into the English language.

Banting's system of diet was nothing new. It was based merely upon the recommendations of various physicians that an elimination of starchy foods would tend to reduce his weight by preventing the addition of more fat and by wasting away the fatty tissues already present. But it was not long before he found that he had lost twenty pounds, then forty, and finally more than eighty. So amazed were his acquaintances by the change which had come over the merchant-a change which was mental as well as physical, because the reduction of his weight made him more alert and vigorous-that they insisted that he tell them the "secret." Soon it became noised all over London that, if one were to follow the "Banting system" which, in the course of time, shortened to "Banting" and, finally, the capital letter was dropped and the word admitted to the English language -though the majority of dictionaries insist upon referring to it as "Bantingism," and insist that the verb "to bant," though commonly used, has no foundation whatever.
