

**EXAMINATION FOR U. S. FOREST RANGER**

The United Civil Service Commission announces an open competitive examination for forest rangers on Oct. 23, 1923. Vacancies in the Forest Service Department of Agriculture, in the states in which this examination is held, and in position requiring similar qualifications will be filled from this examination.

The entrance salary for this position is ordinarily \$1220 a year. Appointees whose services are satisfactory may be allowed after the first month, the increase granted by Congress of \$20 a month.

All citizens of the United States between the ages of 21 and 35, who meet the requirements, both men and women, may enter this examination; appointing officers, however, have the legal right to specify the sex desired in requesting certification of eligibles. For this position in the Forest Service men are desired. The age limits do not apply to persons entitled to preference because of military or naval service.

Examinations are held yearly for filling vacancies in the Forest Ranger force and they are given in the headquarters of all Forest supervisors. Information can be secured from him or the Civil Service Commission.

In the state of Michigan, the examination will be held at the office of the Forest Supervisor, East Tawas.

**Coal in Consumption.**
