LITTLE MOTHER'S LEAGUE ESTABLISHED IN EAST TAWAS SCHOOL

Through the co-operation of the East Tawas school authorities with the Michigan Department of Health, it has been possible to establish in the school as a part of the school curriculum, Little Mother's Leagues for the girls in the seventh and eighth grades.

The purpose of Little Mother's Leagues are:

I To teach girls to help with younger children in the home.

II Through these girls to educate the parents.

III To prepare girls for motherhood.

III By these means to help reduce the number of deaths of little children and to raise our health standards.

The importance of this movement may be found in the following facts: In New York City in 1921 where a million people are crowded together on one island, and where often a thousand people live in one block, and where sometimes whole families live in a single room, and where for blocks and blocks there is not a tree or a blade of grass, only 71 babies out of every 1000 born, died before they were one year old. But in Michigan where there is plenty of room for everyone to live, and so many green trees and flowers, in the same year, a state which you would expect to be much healthier, 79 babies out of every 1000 born, died before they were a year old.

Eight more babies out of every 1000 born were saved in New York than in Michigan. What is the reason for this?

In trying to find out why New York has done better than we have, we are told by the people, who are looking after such things, that one reason is because they have "Little Mother's Leagues."

"Little Mother's Leagues are clubs of girls. They are being started all over Michigan, except Detroit and Grand Rapids and some other places, which already have them. The members of the clubs are girls who want to learn how to take care of babies, how to feed them, bathe them and dress them; and how to do some of the things to help them keep well; and what to do if they get sick. In this way the girls are helped not only to care for their little brothers and sisters, but to be prepared for the time when they may have homes and children.

It is just those things in babies lives, which some people might think were little things, which make so much difference between their being healthy and being sickly, just by keeping all our babies as healthy as we can, we may have a share in cutting down that number 79.

The "Little Mother's League" pledge is as follows:

"In joining the 'Little Mother's League,' I pledge myself to the service of babyhood; to do what I can at any time to help little children to grow up strong and well and fitted for good citizenship."

"We don't want any one to join the League unless she really means to do her best to live up to this pledge.

The league in East Tawas meets as a regular class in East Tawas school every Friday afternoon from 2:40 to 3:30 p. m. Mothers are invited to attend.

The establishment of a similar league was attempted in the Tawas City school, but owing to the fact that the class schedule could not be adjusted, it has been impossible to start a "Little Mother's League here this semester.
