

BANK ROBBERS ARE AFRAID OF STATE

Michigan is getting the name of a hard state for bank robbers to operate in. While the desperadoes have been successful in escaping after robberies in the larger cities in a number of instances, the robbing of a bank in a smaller town has almost invariably been followed by pursuit and arrest of the criminals.

One of the most notable cases dur ing the past year ended in the arrest of a gang accused of robbing banks at Springport and Gregory Three of the alleged bandits were identified by persons who were in the Springport bank when the robbery occurred. In this case the robbers made a clean getaway but were later rounded up by state police.

A clue was turned up in Detroit by state police there which resulted in g raid being made at Battle Creek by state police and local authorities in which the suspects were taken. This was possible because of the co-operation between various units of the state police and local officers.
