POSTAL RATES TO CHANGE APRIL 15

Postmaster Martin C. Musolf has prepared for the Herald a summary of the new postal rates which will go into effect this month.

The following changes in classification and rates on mail matter will be made effective April 15, 1925.

First Class—All written or sealed mail, 2c per oz., or fraction thereof. The rate on private mailing cards, 2c each. The price of government post cards not affected by the change.

Second Class—All newspapers and magazines. The rate of postage on this class of mail when mailed by other than publisher or news agent, shall be 2c for each 2 oz. or fraction thereof when less than 8 oz. The parcel post rate will apply on all over 8 oz. in weight.

Third Class—This class includes all books, circulars and other matter wholly printed, and merchandise including farm and factory products up to 8 oz., and the postage thereon shall be 1½¢ for each 2 oz. or fraction thereof except the rate of postage on books, catalogues, seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, scions and plants not exceeding 8 oz. shall be 1c for each 2 oz. or fraction thereof.

Fourth Class—The weigh of mail matter in this class shall be in excess of 8 oz. and chargeable by the pound as before with an additional charge of 2c for each parcel, except those mailed on rural routes, there the rate remains the same.

Special Delivery

The special delivery fee on matter weighing not over 2 pounds will be 10 cents. For mail weighing over 2 pounds but not over 10 pounds, the fee will be 15 cents. For mail weighing over 10 pounds the fee will be 20 cents.

Money Order Fees

For money orders not exceeding \$2.50—Fee 5 cents.

\$2.51 and not exceeding \$5.00—Fee 7 cents.

\$5.01 and not exceeding \$10.00—Fee 10 cents.

\$10.01 and not exceeding \$20.00—Fee 12 cents.

\$20.01 and not exceeding \$40.00—Fee 15 cents.

\$40.01 and not exceeding \$60.00—Fee 18 cents.

\$60.01 and not exceeding \$80.00—Fee 20 cents.

\$80.01 and not exceeding \$100.00—Fee 22 cents.

Registered Mail

The fee for registering articles of the first class for indemnification of \$50 or less will be 15 cents. For indemnification over \$50 but not over \$100 the fee will be 20 cents.

The fee for registering articles of the third class, indemnified not to exceed \$25, will be 15 cents.

The registration fee for articles of any class addressed to foreign countries will be 10 cents.

Return Receipts for Insured or Registered Articles

A fee of three cents will be charged whenever the sender requests a return receipt on a registered or insured article addressed to a domestic destination.

Insurance Fees

Third or fourth class matter may be insured against loss, damage or rifling. These fees apply to parcels addressed to domestic destinations and to Canada, but to no other foreign country.

Indemnification not over \$5, insurance fee, 5 cents.

Indemnification not over \$25, insurance fee, 8 cents.

Indemnification not over \$50, insurance fee, 10 cents.

Indemnification not over \$100, insurance fee, 25 cents.

C. O. D. Fees

Collection of not more than \$10—C. O. D. fee 12 cents.

Collection of not more than \$50—C. O. D. fee 15 cents.

Collection of not more than \$100—C. O. D. fee 25 cents.

Special Handling

A charge of 25c will be made on parcels on which the shipper wishes extra care in handling. Parcels of this class shall receive the same care in handling, transportation and delivery as is accorded first class mail.
