## TAWAS CITY TO HOLD FARMERS' DAY; BIG EVENT

### Beatrice Creamery Co. Will Present Guernsey Heifer to Clarence Curry

Farmer's day which will be held at Tawas City on Saturday, April 18 under the auspices of the Beatrice Creamery company and the business men of this city will be a red letter day to Clarence Curry of Tawas township. He is the winner in the Beatrice Junior helpers' contest and on that day he will receive the prize awarded to him which will be a registered Guernsey heifer.

In order to make the day interesting Prof. O. E. Reed of the M. A. C. and various other speakers have been secured. Special contests will be held and prizes awarded during the afternoon. A program will appear in the next number of the Herald.

The Beatrice Creamery who are interested in the development of the dairy industry put on a junior helpers contest last year.

For the purpose of the contest, the territory in which Beatrice Creamery company purchases cream, which is some 28 or 29 states, was divided into 17 separate districts. The winner in each district was offered as his reward the choice of a purebred dairy calf, breed and sex of calf to be the winner's own choice. In District No. 16, which comprised the cream buying plants of the Beatrice Creamery company at Detroit and Tawas City, the winner was Clarence Curry, Tawas City, who worked for the Beatrice Creamery company at Tawas City.

The Beatrice Creamery company felt that the presentation of the calf to Clarence Curry of Tawas City might be made in conjunction with the cooperation of the Tawas City Park association, it being recognized that the giving away of pure bred stock was more or less of an unusual event put on in Tawas and would attract to the town on the presentation day a vast number of farm folks, interested in the affair.

The Auditorium at Tawas City is admirably suited for the carrying out of the presentation. The present arrangement calls for the presentation of the calf at 1:30.
