Four teams, Alabaster, Harrisville, Tawas and Twining make up the league this year and from the names handed in it is easily seen that the fans have some good baseball in store for them.

All Tawas games will be played at Tawas Beach. On account of the condition of the Fair grounds, with the back-stop and bleachers torn down and the ground in bad shape, it was decided by Manager Roach not to attempt to play there this year. It would mean an expenditure of several hundred dollars and would take most of the summer to get the ground in condition to play good baseball.

The team practices every Tuesday and Thursday at 4:00 o'clock and every man who plays baseball is asked to come out and help put the boys in shape. There will be no practice on May 3 but it is expected that a game will be scheduled for May 10 at Tawas Beach.

Tawas is host to Harrisville on the 17 and Alabaster goes to Twining on that date.

It will be entirely up to the fans as to whether baseball is a success here this season. With the proper spirit by the rooting section we are sure that the personnel led by Manager "Roxy" Roach will give a good account of themselves. Let's boost.

### SCHRECK ADDRESSES THE LUNCHEON CLUBS

R. G. Schreck, supervisor of the Michigan National Forest at East Tawas, during the week of April 20, addressed the Rotary and Lions clubs at Bay City and the Karavan club at Saginaw. Mr. Schreck's subject was the Michigan National Forest. He reviewed the history of the forest, its acquisition by the federal government and its subsequent development and also told of the government's plan for acquiring an additional 3,000,000 acreage in Michigan. He stressed the important economic function of forestation and urged more care in guarding against fires.

E. A. Sherman, associate U. S. forester, of Washington, D. C., also spoke to the Bay City lions. Mr. Schreck's three addresses were very well received as was also the one by Mr. Sherman.
