LEAGUE TEAMS HAVE STRONG PLAYER LINE-UPS

The Northeastern Michigan Baseball league will get officially underway May 17 with Alabaster opening at Twining with the 1924 champions. The beautiful silver trophy donated by the Bay City Bus company, will be officially presented to the Twining team before the game. Harrisville will help the Tawas club open the season at Tawas Beach.

Indications point to the Northeastern Michigan baseball league playing the fastest ball in Michigan outside of Detroit the coming season, as the Twining club have on their roster such players as Clayton, the rangy semi-pro hurler, and Warren, the fastest man at short in the league last season. Alabaster will go to bat with the best hurling staff in the league, with such well known hurlers as Tate, Halligan, Moux Benson and Elmer Benson, the side wheeler, float ball artist. Woods, lately of the Chicago University, will be covering the hot corner for Alabaster, and from time to time as events demand, Fosse, late star of the Beloit college, will do the back stopping for this team. The Tawas club came into the league with the strongest team in the history of the twin cities with Miles Main, the ex-Detroit hurler on the mound, and Roney Roach, late of the Washington Senators, covering short. Jack Johnson, a past performer with the Saginaw team of the Mint league will be covering the territory in center-field.

The Harrisville club of this league will stage something unique in organized baseball in having the Rev. Father Delahanty doing the hurling with the old semi-pro Potts as a battery mate. Father Delahanty was the main hurler on his team while attending college and assures the Harrisville boys that he will give a good account of himself in this league. Klmaster, the past semi-pro, will be covering the center garden for the Harrisville club.

It is the intention of the league officials from time to time as the occasion presents to have teams from the Mint league, fast semi-pro teams from Detroit and Chicago, and also the celebrated House of David "Long Hairs" meet picked teams from this league.

At that time kerosene was practically the only petroleum product marketed through stations such as East Tawas, but since the automobile became one, if not the most important method of transportation, the sale of gasoline occupies a large percentage of Mr. McElheron's time. During the past few years, Mr. McElheron's son, Earl, has become very active in the work which now takes his entire time.

Following an established custom the Standard Oil company has recently presented Mr. McElheron with a gold service pin, a token of their appreciation for the long and efficient service rendered, not only to the company, but to the people of East Tawas and vicinity.
