





HOW TO SAVE MONEY WHEN SHOPPING

"Oh, look, my beautiful blouse is all ruined!" Have you not often said that, when you removed your coat or suit and found that the color of the lining had come off on your waist?

If you had remembered when buying the suit-coat to take along a clean, white cotton handkerchief and rub it briskly over the lining you might have saved yourself this disappointment. If any of the color comes off on the handkerchief, the fabric is not fast to friction.

Do you know how Uncle Sam sometimes tells how a piece of military cloth is fast to perspiration or not? By placing small samples in the shoes of marching soldiers, or under the saddles of those on horseback. A few days' test in this way will prove beyond a doubt the degree of fastness. So if you are buying material for lining, underwear, or a dress or blouse, the best way to test it is by wearing a sample next to the skin

Another test you can easily make for fastness to perspiration is to steep a sample in acetic acid for a few min utes. If the color does not fade then, you will be safe in making the pur-

If you want to tell whether any goods are proof against "spotting," sprinkle a sample with water, and then dry before brushing off. If there is any change in either the color or luster, do not buy it for a suit or dress, as it will never be practical for street wear or general outdoor use.

The only way to tell whether good are fast to washing is to actually wash a sample in hot soap suds, and then compare it with the original material. Sometimes in buying a colored fabric to make up in combination with a white piece of goods, you want to know if the colored material will "bleed." COMPANY GOOD THINGS

CAPON is most delicious eating. The following recipe may be varied as to stuffing and sauce. Oyster stuffing is especially good: Roast Capon With Savery Stuffing.

Cook the liver of the capon with one or two chicken livers in very little water and press through a colander, Moisten one pint of bread crumbs with the water in which the livers were cooked; press out superfluous moisture, and add while hot, six tablespoonfuls of butter, one tablespoonful of chopped parsley, six chopped mushrooms, seasoning to taste and lastly bind with one well-beaten egg. Fill in a hot oven, allowing fifteen to eighteen minutes to a pound for a

Truffle Sauce. Rub through a colander with two tablespoonfuls of butter, one-fourth of a pound of truffles, heat in a saucepar with one ounce of lean ham finely chopped, and a sprig of parsley minced. Add one and one-half cup fuls of brown stock and thicken with one and one-half tablespoonfuls of arrowroot, blended with cold water.

Mushrooms in Pepper Cups. Remove the stems from green peppers, cut a slice from the top and take place each pepper on a slice of toast and fill with mushrooms broken into and bake in a hot oven fifteen to twenty minutes. Season with butter and
