GEORGE CULHAM

George Culham, a highly respected resident, passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Joseph Watts on Saturday, June 13 at the age of 83 years and four months. Mr. Culham was born in Sheffield, Ont., February 11, 1842. He was united in marriage to Mina Richards also of Sheffield, on May 12, 1867. Mrs. Culham preceded him in death three years ago. Ten children were born to this union, all of whom survive him. They are Mrs. Jos. Watts, Mrs. W. E. Laidlaw, of Tawas City, Mrs. Edward Graham of Whittemore, Henry Culham of Wolverine, Mrs. George Fashelt, George, Jr., Gordon, Leo and Allan all of Cabri, Sask., and Mrs. A. M. Kirby of Decatur, Ill., a sister, Mrs. Thomas Moffatt of Galt, Ont., forty six grandchildren and twenty great-grandchildren.

The family moved to Tawas in the fall of 1886 and have been residents of Isoco county since, with the exception of six years spent in Saskatchewan, Canada.

The children were all present when the end came. Mr. Culham was a member of the Baptist church and also member of Mr. Prescott's Bible class, that he always attended when his health would permit. He was a kind and loving father and will be greatly missed by his family.

Funeral services were held at the Baptist church on Monday with Rev. H. Z. Davis officiating. The music was furnished by Miss Graham, Miss Hamilton, Mr. Colby and Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton. Six old friends of Mr. Culham acted as pall bearers. They were Reuben Wade, Jas. Hamilton, David Davison, Thos. Bradley, Malcolm McLeod and Geo. Pringle. The remains were laid to rest in the family lot in the Tawas City cemetery.

MRS. ELIZA JANE PETERS

Eliza Jane Rawson was born in Sentrailia, Ill., December 22, 1859. While she was still a small child she moved with her parents, Rev. and Mrs. Rawson to Marlette, Michigan. On July 4, 1876 she was united in marriage to Oliver J. Peters of Marlette and to this union twelve children were born of whom two daughters preceded her to the great beyond.

Mr. and Mrs. Peters moved to Emery Junction in 1901 and remained there until her health was broken and in December 1920 she went to Saginaw to live. She remained there until July 1922 when she went west for her health, remaining at Salt Lake City, Utah and at Tonopah, Nevada, but finding that the west did her no good she returned to the home of her daughter with whom she has made her home for nearly two years.

Mrs. Peters departed this life June 12, 1925, the cause of death being pneumonia, at the home of her daughter.

VANDERBILT MEN AWARDED ROAD JOB

Menzie & Bellinger of Vanderbilt last Saturday were awarded the construction of the Hale-Long Lake road. Work will begin at once.

Thirteen bids were made on this road job, the lowest and winning bid being \$73,135.66. The improvement will consist of grading, construction of the necessary drains and drainage structures and surfacing to a width of 12 feet with Class B gravel.

This road is located in a section of the county which has had roads which were nearly impassable a large portion of the year and has been contemplated for a number of years. When this and the proposed connecting link in Ogemaw county is completed it will give through gravel to Rose City.

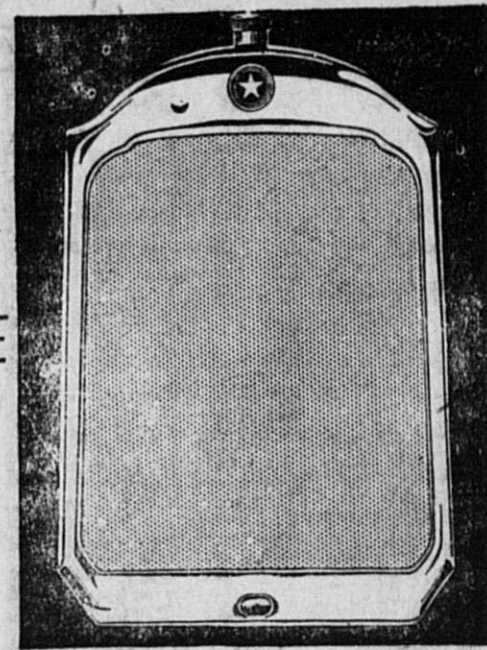

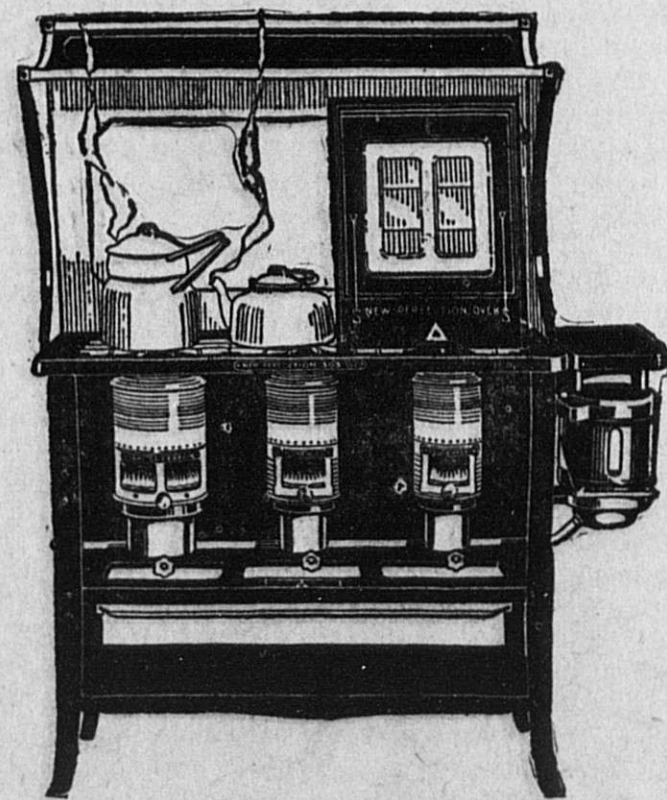

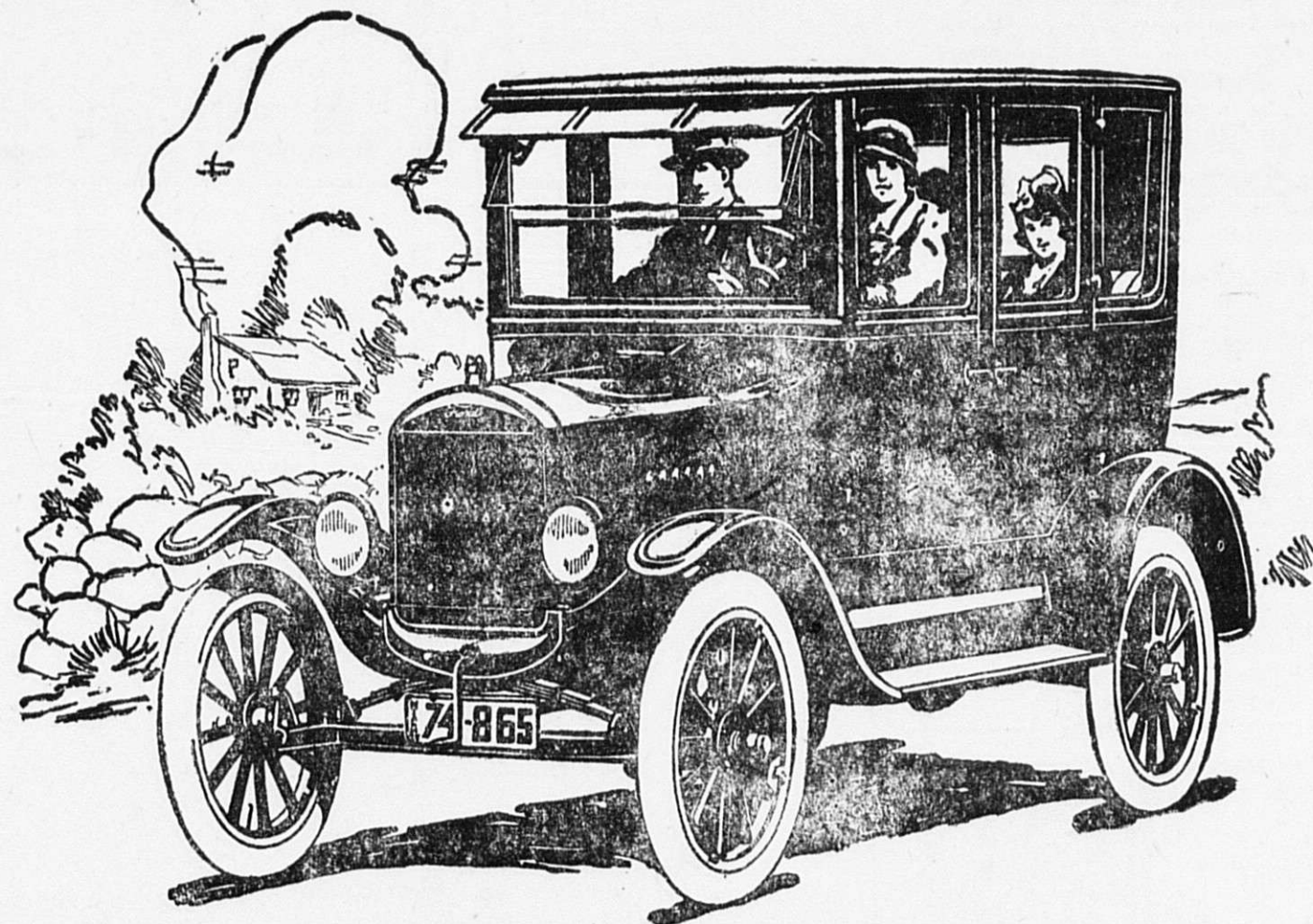
